### VERMONT ETV'S SERIES ON FARMING IN VERMONT WILL PREMIERE 31 OCTOBER 1994

Vermont ETV producers have been at work for over a year on a nine-part series covering the history, issues and everyday concerns of Vermonters who make their living from the land. Five documentaries, followed by four "town meetings" that were videotaped on location in historic spots, explore the role of farming in the state's economy, its challenges and opportunities, and the uncertain future of a traditional way of life. The series premieres over one week, Monday 31 October 1994 through Friday 4 November 1994 at 9 p.m. each evening, with the town meetings scheduled for Tuesday evenings in November.

This new series is funded by a grant from The Rural Development Administration.

#### **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

The Rutland Historical Society, presently celebrating its 25th year, has been like a beehive full of activity since July 1993. The completion of renovations in our new home leads us to more projects and challenges as we prepare exhibits, catalogue and shelve books and begin the slow and tedious process of accessioning the materials accumulated over a period of five years while we were without a building.

The celebration of our Grand Opening on 18July 1993, was blessed with a warm and sunny day. The attendance was good and many people marveled at the beauty of our new home. The exhibit, "A Place Called Rutland", has been viewed by many visitors. It presents a pictorial history of early life and business as Rutland slowly moved toward becoming a city. Robert Beauchamp was emcee for this event. Curtis Johnson of the Vermont Division for Historic Preservation and U.S. Senator James Jeffords both presented brief remarks pertaining to our celebration. Mayor Jeff Wennberg also spoke and cut the ribbon for the opening. A tent was set up in the parking lot for the dispensing of refreshments and the First Republic Brass band provided music.

Teachers and their students were invited to visit the Society throughout the year. A walking tour of Center and Washington Streets, conducted by James Davidson, presented a brief history of the many old houses in that area.

Once we were in our new home it seemed as though a thousand and one things had to be done right now. Priorities were scheduled and we tried to follow them as planned. Needless to say, some goals were not attained and remain as challenges for the future.

Capital improvements that were made include: the purchase of a computer and printer, the lease of a copy machine, the renewal of the slate roof, and the purchase of window film to reduce heat in summer and contain heat in winter. Hopefully, the necessary capital improvements have been made and our treasury will have a needed breather.

The transfer of the Society's Farm Museum collections, located in two barns at the Fairgrounds, was finalized. They are now part of the Rutland County Agricultural Society until such time as the State Fair ceases to operate, then ownership reverts to the Rutland Historical Society.

The Annual Meeting of our Society was held at the Franklin Conference Center on 21October 1993 at the Howe Business Center. Victor Rolando, the featured speaker, presented a program on "Heavy Industry and 19th Century Rutland County".

During the year we held workshops on "Video and Collections" by Gloria Gil, "Archival Materials Organization" by Polly Darnell and "Collections Inventory" by Michelle Pagan. All of these serve as guides for us to set up programs for the care and extended knowledge of materials in our Society.

This year the Annual Meeting of the League of Local Historical Societies was held on 30 April 1994 at Grace Congregational Church under sponsorship of the Vermont Historical Society and the Rutland Historical Society. This was thus a very busy time for the Society.

We express many thanks to the Rutland Recreation Department for the fine job of mowing our lawn. Thanks are also extended to Mayor Jeff Wennberg and City Treasurer Ron Graves for their kind advice and support of our Society. (continued on page 4)
