# "HISTORICALLY SPEAKING" ON CHANNEL 15 IN RUTLAND

The Society produces "Historically Speaking" on cable Channel 15. A new program is produced each month. The series includes interviews and historical pictorial material in a rather flexible TV magazine format. The programs can be seen every Wednesday at 4:00 p.m., Thursday at 1:30 p.m. and Friday at 7:30 p.m. Videotapes of the following episodes can be obtained from Channel 15, Rutland Region Community Television, P.O. Box 500, Rutland VT 05702-0500. They are \$10 for each episode. Make checks payable to the above. You must provide a self-addressed padded bag with postage. Channel 15 provides the tape. Episode # 51 - Tom Carpenter hosts Michael F. Dwyer in a program on "Greek Immigration To Rutland". The program examines the conditions that brought Greek families to Rutland at the close of the 19th Century. The program also profiles some of the early Greek families in Rutland including their names and occupations. There is also a brief history of the founding of St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church in Rutland.

Episode # 52 - Jim Davidson presents a program on George Schmitt, Rutland pioneer aviator. This program is filled with old photos of Schmitt's very short career. It also includes some items from Schmitt's diary, extracts of which his brother Charles published in the "Oread", the Rutland High School magazine of the time. These diary entries were only recently discovered purely by chance. George Schmitt began flying or attempting to fly in 1910. By 1912 and 1913 he began to set records for flights. During the winter of 1912-1913 he flew numerous successful flights in the Caribbean and Central America. In September he returned to fly at the Rutland Fair where he suffered a fatal crash on 2 September 1913.

#### NEW SHELVING AND NEW ARRANGEMENTS

The Society has finished the assembly and installation of six new shelving units in its upper level archival storage area. Two new units will provide space for the newly acquired Rutland Municipal Court records which have nearly all been shelved. One unit is housing the Society's Special Library Collection and one unit is housing the Society's working tools. Two units are dedicated to future expansion. The addition and rearrangement of shelving units has provided the Society with a much better use of storage space and a more efficient workflow. Court records that belonged in Bellows Falls, Brattleboro and Montpelier have been moved to those local historical societies by Tom Carpenter and Jim and Helen Davidson.

#### THE TRUE STORY OF HIDALGO

The tales of the West by Frank T. Hopkins have been embodied with the "imprimatur" of "true story" by the new Disney Studios movie "Hidalgo". Jim Davidson of the Society was involved in thorough research that proved that the great Galveston, Texas, to Rutland, Vermont, endurance horse race in 1886 never happened.
