# "HISTORICALLY SPEAKING" ON CHANNEL 15 IN RUTLAND

The Society produces "Historically Speaking" on cable Channel 15. A new program is produced each month. The series includes interviews and historical pictorial material in a rather flexible TV magazine format. Episode # 55 - Jim Davidson hosts Michael F. Dwyer in the seventh of the series of episodes on the genealogy of ethnic groups in Rutland. This episode discusses the immigration of Swedes to the Rutland area. The program exposes the myth that most Swedes were farmers. The important role of the Lutheran Church in preserving the records of Swedish families is highlighted. The program also explains the confusing elements of Swedish names which can be daunting to the uninitiated.

Episode # 56 - Jim Davidson hosts Jessamyn West, Outreach Librarian at the Rutland Free Library, in a program on how to begin using "Heritage Quest", a web site that is available free to library card holders. This genealogical resource can be used from the comfort of your home if you hold a library card. This is one of many free services offered by the Rutland Free Library and will be of great interest to those pursuing family history research. Access to the manuscript U. S. Census records is one of the great benefits of "Heritage Quest". Check the Rutland Free Library's home page for further information.

Episode #57 - Jim Davidson hosts Dave Knipes, local circus and carnival historian, in a program on the Rutland Fair from the 1930s to the 1960s. The program centers on the "World of Mirth Shows" at the Rutland Fair and includes numerous photos of miniatures of the complete "World of Mirth Shows" as they appeared at the Rutland Fair. These miniatures are the work of Dave Knipes.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

The Society's facilities are open for public use on Mondays from 6:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. and on Saturdays from 1:00 P.M. to 4:00 P.M. New materials relating to the original Town of Rutland, the present City of Rutland and the Towns of Proctor, Rutland and West Rutland are welcomed as additions to the Society's collections. Accessioning and cataloging is accomplished by three groups of volunteers who each meet once a week. Volunteer members also assist local and out-of-town folks seeking genealogical and historical information. Special arrangements can be made for individual visitors and groups upon request.

"Historically Speaking" continues to be shown three times weekly on public television station Channel 15. This year the Society received an Award of Excellence from the Vermont League of Local Historical Societies for its cable television program series which now numbers over 50 programs. The Society will soon be making these videos available for public loan through the Rutland Free Library. Programs this year dealt with: "The Influenza Epidemic of 1918"; "Ghosts of Vermont"; "Korean War Experiences"; Greek Immigration To Rutland"; "Aviator George Schmitt"; "President and Mrs. Calvin Coolidge"; "The Vermont History Expo in Tunbridge"; and "Swedish Immigration To Rutland"; "How To Use Heritage Quest"; and "The World of Mirth at the Rutland Fair".

Fall live programs at the Society included: "The John Phair Murder Case, 1874"; "A History of Early Automobiles, Garages, Dealers and Operators in Rutland" and "An Axe to Grind: Lizzie Borden Revisited". Spring programs included: "Redeeming the Integrity of the 7th Vermont Regiment"; "How to Use 'Heritage Quest', an Online Genealogical Resource (at Rutland Free Library) and "Rutland On Fire: the Fires of 1868".

Other activities included the visits of nearly 250 6th grade students from the Rutland Intermediate School to the Society. Carmine Pacca, Jim Davidson and Robert Perkins provided walking tours of Historic Rutland for these students. A video and exhibit discussion were also presented. Society members made visits to city classrooms; participated in local parades and the celebration of First Night. Society volunteers have presented programs at the Pittsford Historical Society; Linden Terrace; Eden Park; The Meadows and Gables and for the Rutland County Retired Teacher's Association this past year.

Exhibits this year included a collection of arrowheads from the Otter Valley area which was on loan; portraits of some of the leading citizens of bygone years; a floral history of 19th and 20th Century Rutland homes and gardens and the "World of Mirth Carnival" in miniature, created and loaned by Dave Knipes.

A recent addition to the Society's collection has been the Municipal Court records of Rutland from the early 1870's to the 1960's. These have been organized and are now available for research. The records contain places of birth, home addresses and are from both civil and criminal files. The Society has recently received bound volumes of the Rutland Daily Herald from 1887 to 1905. We welcome gifts of historical materials and most of all the gift of volunteer service from those who would like to become involved in an interesting and valuable public service.
