"HISTORICALLY SPEAKING" ON CHANNEL 15 IN RUTLAND

The Society produces "Historically Speaking" on cable Channel 15. A new program is produced each month. The series includes interviews and historical pictorial material in a rather flexible TV magazine format. Episode # 65 - Jim Davidson hosts Michael F. Dwyer in a program commemorating the men and women who served the country in World War II. The program also covers life on the home front in a war that was a total war for survival. Michael lists the names of those serving from Rutland. Now, 60 years removed from the end of World War II, it would be so easy to dismiss this generation that many have called "The Finest Generation" as just another piece of history. This program is devoted to an effort to see that we never forget what this generation contributed. There was not a household that was not in some way directly touched by the war.

Episode # 66 - Jim Davidson hosts Monty Buttlerfield of the Rutland Railway Association and Linda Doty, Chairperson of the Proctor Fall Festival in a presentation on Rutland Railroad Day 2005 and the Proctor Fall Festival which were held on 24 September 2005. The program discusses briefly the history of the Rutland Railway Association and the Proctor "Our Yard" project. Details of the events of the day are thoroughly discussed. The day included a train trip from Center Rutland to Proctor and back to Center Rutland. The program emphasizes the partnership aspects of the day's events. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

The Rutland Historical Society is open for public use on Mondays from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. and on Saturdays from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Materials for research purposes are welcomed as additons to the Society's collections relating to the original Town of Rutland and its successor municipalities of Proctor, West Rutland and Rutland Town and City. Volunteers meet three times a week to accession materials. Volunteer members also assist local and out-of-town folks seeking genealogical and historical information. The Society offers special arrangements for individual visitors and groups.

"Historically Speaking" continues to be shown three times weekly on public access cable television station Channel 15. Subjects presented this year include programs dealing with "Political Messages in Ordinary Objects" with Dr. Kevin Thornton of UVM; "History of the Rutland Courts" with Jim Davidson and Dorothy Whitford; "Information To Be Gleaned from Late 19th or Early 20th Century Photos" with Michael Dwyer; "Discussion with Rutland Society members concerning the Society's New Web Site"; "Rutland History Days" with Tony Romeo, Sons of Union Verterans, Ripley Camp #4 and Mary Goulette from the Downtown Rutland Partnership; "The Family Photo Album as Social History" with Jim Davidson and Michael Dwyer; and "The Making of "The North and South: A Woman's Perspective' with Anna Whooley".

Other activities included participation in the Vermont History Expo presenting a Rutland and Vermont covered bridge exhibit with our local covered bridge expert, Robert Cassidy, as well as well as Anna Whooley's dramatic monologue of two women of the Civil War Era. The Society also provided a musical setting for First Night headquarters on New Year's Eve, took part in the Halloween and Loyalty Day parades and provided walking tours of Rutland for visiting groups, local school students and for Rutland History Days.

The first Elwert Essay Contest, held to commemorate the service to the Society by Fred and Eleanor Elwert, was completed in March. First prize was won by Kahner Dowdy, Grade 6 of the Rutland Area Christian School, for her essay on the "Berwick Hotel Fire". Elizabeth Lambert, Grade 6, won second prize and third prize went to T.J. Engler also of Grade 6. Certificates of participation were also awarded. The contest is open to middle school students, grades five through eight, in any public, private or home school within "the original Town of Rutland". This is an annual contest.

Helen Davidson, Past President, was honored by the Society at the Annual Meeting for her excellent weekly "Tidbits From Then and Now" published in *Sam's Good News*, a local free weekly paper. Helen is one of our most dedicated volunteers and has been producing this column for over six years.

Quarterlies published this year were "Lost Buildings of Rutland Revisited, A Calendar" by Jake Sherman"; "July Guns of Colonial Patriots II: The Battle of Hubbardton Revisited" by Carmine Pacca; and "The 1908 Diary of Charlotte Chaffee" in two parts edited by Helen Davidson.

Programs for the year included "Rutland Silver" by David Perrin; "The Future of Vermont History" by Kevin Graffagnino, President of the Vermont Historical Society; "History, Politics and the Schools" with Lincoln Fenn; a demonstration of the ELMO for the Twilight Homemakers; a presentation of historical research materials for a Vermont History class from the College of St. Joseph; video and exhibit tours of the Society for school children; "Proctor: 100 Years Ago and Today" presented by Maureen Dobart of the Proctor Elementary School; "Sam Slick, a 19th Century Peddler" presented by John Peterson, a social studies teacher at Rutland High school and "The Vermont Marble Company Strike of 1935-36" by Mary Fregosi, retired history teacher from Rutland High School and present Chairperson of the Board of the Society.

An important project for the Society has been the production of a Web Site which opened in February 2005. Those paticipating have been Karen Sanborn, Chairperson, Robert Perkins, (continued on page 2)
