Episode # 80 - Jim Davidson hosts Michael F. Dwyer, President of the Rutland Historical Society, in a program entitled "Multi-Ethnic Rutland". By focusing on the 1910 Census and its ethnic information, the program demonstrates that Rutland has had a rather large and diverse number of ethnic groups. The first individual considered is Eliza Johnson, wife of Charles Johnson, a barber, who was part of the Rutland black community. The program also discusses George Haddad who was born in the Lebanon district of Syria and Sam Lung, a Chinese laundryman who came to Rutland.

Episode # 81 - Jim Davidson hosts Tom Giffin, President of the Vermont Old Cemetery Association, in a program on "The Restoration of Old Cemeteries". Tom is joined by Chris Book, Chairman of the new Cemetery Committee of the Rutland Historical Society. Both guests are commissioners of the Rutland City Cemetery Commission.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT

Membership Committee

Robert Perkins has been appointed new chairperson of the Membership Committee and new Membership Secretary. Under Bob's leadership the Society has moved the membership database from an old Apple computer to a Personal Computer Microsoft Excel file. Some membership policies and procedures have been modified and all have been carefully documented.

First Year Members

Memberships are on an annual, calendar year basis. However, a person who becomes a new member after mid-year will be credited with membership for the following calendar year as well.

Grace Period

In the past the Society has not had a clear policy on carrying members who fall behind in their annual dues payments. There will now be a one-year grace period during which Quarterlies will continue to be sent to members who are no more than one year late in payment.

Two For the Price of One

In order to save money on printing and postage the Society has long offered joint memberships to married couples (e.g., Mr. & Mrs, John Doe) at the individual membership fee. The Society now offers the same advantage to any two people (not necessarily a married couple) at the same address who are willing to share the single Quarterly. Each person becomes a member in his or her own name. (e.g. Mary Doe, and John Doe).

Student Members

The Society has long had a reduced membership fee for students, aged 18 and under. The Society now offers the reduced membership fee to students regardless of age.

Complimentary Memberships

The Society policy on complimentary memberships has been formalized and documented. Complimentary memberships are now offered to a selected list of public officials and to all schools and colleges, both public and private, in the area of the original Town of Rutland. In addition, on an individual basis, the Board may offer a complimentary membership to an individual or an organization that has provided a significant gift or service to the Society.

Memorial Memberships

Memorial memberships, which have never been used, will no longer be offered, but the Society would, of course, be pleased to accept a gift in memory of, or in honor of, someone.
