"HISTORICALLY SPEAKING" ON CHANNEL 15 IN RUTLAND

The Society produces "Historically Speaking" on cable Channel 15. A new program is produced each month. The series includes interviews and historical pictorial material in a rather flexible TV magazine format. The programs can be seen every Wednesday at 4:00 p.m., Thursday at 1:30 p.m. and Friday at 7:30 p.m. DVDs of past episodes can be obtained from Channel 15, Rutland Regional Community Television, 1 Scale Avenue, Suite 108, Rutland VT 05701-4460. Episode # 86 - This program features a presentation of still pictures of the Long Trail Lodge by David Wright of the Middletown and Rutland Historical Societies. David and his family were intimately involved in the Lodge for many years and David is able to relate many stories connected with the history of the Long Trail Lodge. The Lodge not only had a close connection with the Long Trail but was also a major meeting place for many Rutland groups. Host of the episode is Jim Davidson.

Episode #87 - In 1941 the Farm Security Administration sent photographer Jack Delano to Rutland to photograph the Rutland Fair. This assignment was intended to photographically document rural life in Vermont. Additional photos by Delano can be found on the website of the Library of Congress. They provide an excellent view of Vermont rural life on the eve of the U.S. entry into WWII. Michael F. Dwyer provides the selection and narration for the program. Jim Davidson is host of the episode.

Episode # 88 - For over 30 years Aldo Merusi was the chief Rutland Herald photographer. His widow left a large collection of the negatives of his photos to the Rutland Herald. Dr. Richard Brown has been placed in charge of a project to scan these negatives to provide viewable prints and to attempt identification of the people, places and events in the photos. The Rutland Historical Society has agreed to help in the identification process. This episode is the first attempt to brings some of the photos to the attention of the public through the medium of television. It is hoped that the public may help in the identification process. The program includes a brief biographical notice about Aldo Merusi and his work. Jim Davidson hosts the program.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Rutland Historical Society continues to flourish in its 39th year, and the Society headquarters on Center Street remain a hub of activity. Here is a summary of some of the highlights of the Rutland Historical Society's past year.

- Publications: News From Nickwackett, the Society's newsletter, is published four times a year and provides a summary of recent activities as well as upcoming events. Newsletters are mailed with copies of the Society's award-winning publication, Rutland Historical Society Quarterly. One of the new 21st Century innovations is for the last Quarterly of the year to be a calendar illustrated with images from the towns that once comprised the old Town of Rutland. Helen Davidson has also continued to write a weekly column entitled "Tidbits From Then and Now" which is published in "Sam's Good News".
- Historically Speaking: At press time, 88 episodes of the popular half-hour television program have been created. In May 2007, Jim Davidson, producer of Historically Speaking, received, on behalf of the Society, PEGTV's Romeo Award for Best Show. In the near future episodes will not only continue to be broadcast on Channel 15 but they will also be able to be viewed through streaming video accessible through PEGTV's web site. Our television programs, along with the web site described below, bring the Rutland Historical Society to a much greater audience than would have been possible without the advancements in information technology.
- Web Site: The Society's web site may be accessed at www.rutlandhistory.com. It features a variety of areas where the viewer can learn about and interact with the Society. The Historical Miscellany and Tidbits from Then and Now areas feature continually changing material. Many people in pursuit of genealogical information interact with Society volunteers through the free Message Board. Last year there were over a quarter of a million visits to the Society web site.
- Programs: The Society continues its long tradition of providing live programs. The Winter/Spring 2007 programs included a presentation on multi-ethnic Rutland at the Diamond Run Mall as part of the Martin Luther King Day celebration; a PowerPoint lecture on the Rutland Railroad; remembrances of former mayor, John Cassarino; and a round table discussion about the Rutland Royals pre-war baseball teams.
- Parades: Members of the Society, accompanied by Nick, the Nickwackett squirrel, once again participated in both the Halloween and the Loyalty Day parades.
- Other Events: On New Year's Eve 2006, the Society continued a long tradition of providing recorded music at the Asa Bloomer Building as part of the First Night celebration. The Society celebrated Rutland's railroad heritage at the the 2007 Vermont History Expo in June at Tunbridge, Vermont. An eye-catching banner showing the Rutland railroad yard of 1879 was a highlight of the Society's booth. Numerous programs have been presented by Society members during the year at engagements for local groups.

It also should be mentioned that numerous visitors to the Society during its public hours have been served by Society members too numerous to name. None of these services could have been provided without the efforts of a core of volunteers who give unselfishly to the Society. In addition to the Board of Directors and Officers, additional members host the Society's public hours and do work on the various Society committees. As donations of papers, photos and artifacts continue to be donated, three Collection groups meet weekly to add these items to the Society's ever growing collections. Thank you all.
