SPRING PROGRAMS

The Program Committee is pleased to announce two great programs for the spring season. Both programs will be held in the Fox Room of the Rutland Free Library and will be co-sponsored by the Society and the Library.



Wednesday 29 April at 7:00 pm. "Major League Baseball Challenges Rutland, 1916 – 1920" – Dick Leyden, Society For American Baseball Research.

Rutland baseball during the "deadball era" was competitive to the point that major league teams wanted to come to Rutland to play. Dick will share some of the excitement of Rutland baseball during this era.



Wednesday 20 May at 7:00 pm. "Mining Historical Weather Records Across Vermont" – Dr. Lesley-Ann L. Dupigny-Giroux, Vermont State Climatologist and professor in the Department of Geography at the University of Vermont.

Dr. Lesley-Ann will provide an overview of Vermont weather research, focusing on the history of Vermont weather. We all talk about the weather but what do we really know about Vermont's weather history. Please join us to find some answers to your history of Vermont weather questions. There will be a short question and answer period after the presentation.

NEW ACQUISITIONS

In the last six months the Society has received three large collections of Rutland materials:

- 1. The City Treasurer's Office recently underwent a reorganization of the old records stored in the basement of City Hall. A number of materials were removed for disposal. The Treasurer's Office worked closely with the Society to sort out historically useful materials for the Society.
- 2. A large collection of Burditt Family materials were acquired from Manchester, Vermont, where a niece had maintained family and business records from the Rutland activities of the Burditt and related families.
- 3. A collection of Rutland's Chaffee and Smith Lumber Company records (1890s to 1950s) was recently offered to the Society. The collection was massive in volume. The materials had been acquired by former Professor Holman Jordan. The Castleton History Department decided it could no longer house this collection.

Episode # 102 – "Rutland's Greatest Fire: The Bates House Fire 1906"

On 18 February 1906 this fire consumed all the buildings on the northeast corner of Merchants Row and Center Street and halfway up the north side of Center Street. Although there were no deaths in the fire, the amount of destruction has not been rivaled in Rutland's history. Chuck Piotrowski narrates a pictorial tour of the fire and its results.

Episode # 103 – "Resources for Rutland History: 1850 – 1890"

Jim Davidson, Society Curator, reviews a wide range of resources available to understand Rutland's history in the era 1850 – 1890. He also makes some suggestions on how to work through the maze of material in a most effective manner.

"NOTES FROM THE PAST" ON CHANNEL 21

"Notes from the Past" focuses on political and economic issues of the past that have a relevance to similar issues today. A new show is offered each month. Episodes can be seen each week on Mondays at 6:30 pm, Wednesdays at 3:00 pm, Fridays at 6:30 pm and Saturdays at 8:00 pm.

Episode #3 - "The Division of Rutland".

The original Town of Rutland today stands as four municipalities: the towns of Proctor, Rutland, West Rutland and the City of Rutland. This program presents the history of that division and discusses its impact on today.

Episode#4-"A History of Transportation in Rutland".

Trains, autos and airplanes have all impacted the social and economic history of Rutland and leave issues to be resolved.

Episode # 5 – "The Communication Revolution".

Early communication was by the printed word whether by book, newspaper or correspondence. Then came the electronic devices: telegraph, telephone, radio and television. What happens to the email and cell phone business records of the future?
