

#### **NEW EXHIBIT**

A new exhibit entitled "Once Upon a Time..." will open at the Society on Saturday 1 APR 1995 at 1:00 p.m.

The exhibit focuses on the lifestyles of Rutland's past, particularly between the Civil War and 1920. Topics include early autos, the Rutland City Band, Wayne Bailey and his dog Nero, purportedly the largest dog in the world at that time, and Julia Dorr, Rutland's first lady of letters.

The exhibit also offers items from the world of both men and women. This includes silver, fans, hats etc. A family album of pictures of the time will also be available to the viewer.
