NORTHERN RAILROADS: VERMONT AND HER NEIGHBORS

Vermont ETV launched a new production *Northern Railroads: Vermont and Her Neighbors* on 4 December. If you missed the show or would like to take a return trip, the program will be repeated on 10 December at 7:30 p.m.

The program provides a nostalgic look at the age of steam in northern New England. It was produced by Frederic Fischer, whose video credits include a series of three nostalgia-history films for Long Island's public TV station under the title "New York the Way It Was."

Fischer interviewed historians, townspeople and former railroaders and amassed a tremendous array of film footage and beautiful old photos to capture the era. Railroads in the special include the Central Vermont, Rutland, Boston and Maine, St. Johnsbury and Lake Champlain, and the Woodstock. There is also a trip on the inaugural run of a tourist excursion train through Crawford Notch in northern New Hampshire in September of this year.

Hundreds of people, including your Rutland Historical Society, offered information to help with this project. Fischer says that some of the people he met were, in a way, "witnesses" - they'd done it or written about it or been through it. Of tremendous help were Burlingtonian Robert C. Jones, who has written over a dozen books on railroading, and Mark Smith of Huntington, a steam expert, who publishes railroad books and a guide to steam excursions. The beautifully evocative photographs by Philip Ross Hastings bring the era alive.

RUTLAND CITY SCHOOL REGISTERS (1899-1963)

The Society has recently received, from the Rutland City School Department, School Registers from 1899 to 1963. This is over 34 shelf feet of records which identify the schools, the teachers in the classrooms, and the names of the students in the classes. The records from 1915 to 1919 are missing. With this exception the records are very complete.

If you wish to recall the name of that student who sat next to you in the fifth grade in 1930 or you have forgotten the name of your fourth grade teacher maybe we can help you. The Society is open on Mondays from 6-9 p.m. and Saturdays from 1 to 4 p.m.
