NEW EXHIBITS

The Exhibit Committee has developed the following series of new miniexhibits: (1) The Nickwackett Fire Station Exhibit is a rearrangement of a previous exhibit but still focuses on the functions of the old Nickwackett Fire Station. (2) <u>Gen. Edward H.</u> <u>Ripley Family Exhibit portrays the</u> post-war life of the family at their home in Mendon. E.H. Ripley was a Civil War General from Rutland who was in charge of the occupation of Richmond at the end of the Civil War. An exhibit pamphlet gives a brief biography of the General. (3) The 1890 Rutland Sanborn Insurance Map Exhibit presents detailed maps of the commercial areas of Rutland and West Rutland. Directories of these places are available in the Society Library for use with the maps. (4) The Howe Scales Exhibit

shows examples of scales which were made in Rutland from 1877 to 1982. An exhibit pamphlet gives a brief history of the Howe Scale Company. (5) The Flood of 1947 Exhibit provides a pictorial display of the flood and its damage. An exhibit pamphlet gives a Herald reporter's eye witness account of the events leading up to the flood and the following day. (6) The 19th Century Ladies and Their Finery Exhibit shows two paintings of Rutland ladies that the Society had restored. A display case of period finery supplements these portraits.

On Tuesday 20 May 1997 the Program Committee will present "On the Civil War Trail In Vermont" by Jack Anderson. The program will be held at the Fox Room of the Rutland Free Library on Court Street in Rutland at 7:00 p.m.

EXHIBIT COMMITTEE REVISES ITS OPERATIONAL POLICIES AND EXPANDS ITS MISSION

For several months the Exhibit Committee has been discussing and revising its mode of operation. In the past exhibits have been designed to present materials on a single theme throughout the exhibit area. This policy has made the work of the Exhibit Committee extremely time-consuming especially when the exhibit changed twice a year. The Exhibit Committee seemed to be on a never-ending tredmill of going from executing an exhibit to planning and designing the next exhibit with little time for any other activity.

Unfortunately, only small numbers of people come to the Society to view the exhibits. A few years ago when the Society presented a video program on Cable Channel 15, the Public Access Channel, hundreds of people watched the program or one of its many repeats. Since then the Exhibit Committee has discussed the advantages of reaching many more people through this medium. But time has always been a deterrent to action.

With this background in mind the Exhibit Committee decided to revise its exhibit operational policies and expand its mission. The Board of Directors of the Society has given its approval to the Committee to test these policies and expanded mission.

Accordingly, the Committee has designed a six mini-exhibit plan which includes: (1) an exhibit on the building which will be relatively permanent; (2) an exhibit on a person or persons; (3) an exhibit on a place or places; (4) an exhibit on things (this would include organizations such as a business, school, club etc. in addition to material objects); (5) an exhibit on an event and (6) an exhibit showing some of the cultural and artistic treasures in the Society's collections. Each exhibit has a small brochure describing the content of the exhibit and in many cases presenting a brief history of the exhibit topic. The six mini-exhibits are designed to be independent so that just one exhibit can be changed as necessary. The plan allows much greater flexibility as exhibits can be opened, closed and coordinated as circumstances may dictate.

The time and energy saved through this new approach should free up time for the members of the Committee to develop and execute appropriate video programming. (SEE PAGE 2 FOR EXHIBIT COMMITTEE REQUEST FOR HELP FROM PEOPLE WITH VIDEO SKILLS OR INTERESTS).

LETTER CONCERNING "FOR THE BUDGET"

We recently received the following information from Michael Barbieri, a long-time member of the Society, regarding our last Quarterly.

"The main reason for this note concerns the latest issue of the *Quarterly* about Charles Mead -- which, by the way, I found very interesting since reading primary sources, especially dealing with the local area, is my true love. There is a comment at the end of the preface which says: The meaning of the phrase 'For the Budget' remains unknown. Well, I may have the answer to that uncertainty. I have seen a mid- to late-17th century reference to a 'Budget or Pocket to

hang by their sides' (or something to that effect) meaning a pouch of some kind. Also, I have a copy of Captain Francis Grose's Lexicon Balatronicum: A Dictionary of Buckish Slang, <u>University</u> Wit. Pickpocket Eloquence published in 1811 which defines 'Budget' as 'A wallet'. The word is from the French bougette, diminutive of bouge --'leather bag'. Mead is apparently referring to the pouch or book he keeps his papers in. Unlike many other entries which seem to have had specific purposes in mind and which purposes he noted (i.e.: Grammar Exercise), I would bet that those entries 'For the Budget' were done purely for the enjoyment he experienced when writing. It's only a guess but, as with much historical research, an educated guess."
