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
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Research In Progress

POLICE STATION PROPOSAL

On 5 August 1997 the Special Aldermanic Committee of Rutland City met with the Board of Directors of the Society at Nickwackett to discuss the proposed police station being planned for the property between the Society building and the present fire station.

The Society had concerns about parking spaces, access to its bulkhead and the location of its propane tank. There was also some concern about the effect of this proposed construction on the water table.

Tom Carpenter has been appointed by the Board of Directors to represent the Society in all discussions and negotiations regarding this proposal. Tom has suggested that if the planned building could be turned, so that

the side became the front, then most of the Society's concerns might be eliminated. The architect will examine this possibility.

We will keep the membership informed of further developments.

VIDEO PROGRAMS

The Exhibit Committee has produced a half-hour video program on the Flood of 1947 which aired numerous times in June and early July on Channel 15, the public access channel. The flood's 50th anniversary was on 3 June 1997.

The next program in preparation deals with the photographic work of Charles Hayles at the beginning of the 20th Century. A Quarterly on Charles Hayles will be issued in September. The video program should also be released in September.

VISITS TO THE SOCIETY

Senior residents from the Meadows at East Mountain visited the Society's exhibits in June. In August an Archeology Workshop from the Chaffee Art Gallery visited the Society. Members of the Exhibit Committee provided a walking tour of Rutland and a slide program on the history of transportation in Rutland. The class also had an opportunity to view the current exhibits of the Society.

Library and Archives Committees have been meeting regularly on Wednesday mornings and Thursday evenings, respectively, to work on processing materials that have been collected. Those interested in helping are encouraged to attend at these times.

PAINTINGS RETURN

Paintings which have been in Colorado at the studios of St. Paul and Alyward for cleaning and restoration have all been completed and returned except for the Currier and Ives print "Firemen Racing To A Fire". This item has acid stains which Mr. St. Paul is working to remove.

The paintings completed include: Benjamin Franklin Mason paintings of Mr. and Mrs. Moses Strong, a painting of Harriet (Mead) Porter, a painting of Mrs. John Cramton, and a James Hope painting of the West Rutland marble quarry of Sheldons, Morgan and Slason. The frames of these paintings were also restored.

The Exhibit Committee will be exhibiting these items during the next year.

CHARLES B. MEAD INFORMATION SOUGHT

The Publications Committee is seeking a picture of Charles B. Mead of West Rutland (1843-1864) who died in the Civil War in 1864. The Committee will be publishing some of his Civil War notes and know that he had his photo taken in uniform and had numerous copies made. Hopefully one of these still exists somewhere. The Committee would also like any information on local members of Company F of the 1st U.S. Sharpshooters to which Mead belonged.
