

THE ARCHITECTURE BOOK

"The Historic Architecture of Rutland County" was published in May by the Vermont Division for Historic Preservation. Curtis B. Johnson was the Editor and Elsa Gilbertson the Assistant Editor, both of whom are employed by the Division. It took many years to bring the book to fruition but the 500 page volume sets an example that will challenge all the other county architectural histories that will follow.

The society offered to its membership a one time opportunity to purchase the book at less than retail price. We had a very good response with 115 members sending orders which totaled 75 County volumes, 57 just of Rutland City, 22 for West Rutland, 25 for Rutland Town and 31 for Proctor.

The book is the first of a planned series covering each county in the state. It includes a history of the county and of each individual town with town maps and historic district maps. Also included is a guide to Vermont architecture, a comprehensive style guide and a glossary of architectural terms, both illustrated with local buildings.

Hundreds of city buildings which are listed in the State Register of Historic Places are given by street and number, and many of them are pictured. With the book as a guide there could be some rewarding Sunday afternoon walks or drives. Maybe some of our special architectural heritage would be recognized and better appreciated.

Without an operating home base the society cannot take orders but both the complete county volume and the individual town pamphlets are available at Book King in the Opera House on Merchants Row.

The State Law relating to automobiles provided for registration, regulation of speed and licensing of oper ation. The registration cost \$2.00; an operating license was also \$2.00. The speed limit was fixed by law at 15 miles per hour outside of a city and 10 miles within the village or city limits. An unlicensed car operator could drive lawfully if accompanied by a licensed chauffer or operator.

The registration for the whole state totalled 372, including eight motorcycles. There were also three women licensed as operators. The numbers one and two registration plates were owned by Mr. Charles C. Warren of Waterbury. He purchased his first Haynes-Apperson automobile in 1899. It was a four-cylinder machine, produced by the Packard Motor Car Company.

There were 14,910 miles of public highway in the state in 1905. An automobile running at the speed limit of 15 mph would require 41 days to cover all that distance. (Remember, these were unpaved roads.)

Moving Daze

whole roomful of our collection had to be moved, so again plenty of up and down stairs. In addition we had to move many bound volumes of the Rutland Herald from the third floor of the Rutland Free Library to storage at the law office of our chairman, Herb Ogden, Jr.

While we would prefer not to have to deal with historic Rutland material right now, if there is no other solution to your disposal problem let us know. We would not want to miss important historical items.

Diaries, collections of letters, scrapbooks, post cards, Manning's City Directories from 1978 to now and before 1900, family pictures including the family home identified and dated if at all possible. NEVER write such information on the item itself, instead attach, with a plastic paper clip, an explanation on a separate sheet of paper.

Paintings, business records, playbills, school records, photographs of events, street scenes, buildings outside of downtown, interiors, etc., etc. We cannot take three dimensional artifacts, except for very small items because we do not have the room. We might want to borrow from you for an exhibit but not to own.

SING A LONG was a financial success but a washout artistically. It really poured just at the time people would have been coming to the armory, our substitute site in case of rain. The show went on nevertheless for 20 participants. It was only the second time in 7 years we've had rain.

We took part in the <u>Loyalty Day</u> parade, Sunday, May 7th. While waiting for the parade to start we chatted with David Zsido, a member of our society and also of the Green Mountain Heavy Haulers, an antique truck association. He told us that they proposed to sell caps with their logo and would donate the profit to the Nickwackett Building Fund. They did just that and presented a check for \$500 in mid August. No moss was growing under their feet!

New Books

• Speaking of history books, the society's history of Rutland is moving along slowly. Dawn Hance of Rutland has done a monumental job compiling, with help, the genealogy of the early families. It will be the first volume to be printed probably late next year. The history of Rutland to about 1860 has been written, also by Dawn, and is being edited by Jean Ross and Eleanor Elwert. Tom Carpenter, our treasurer, is entering it into the computer.

For both of these volumes we are especially interested in obtaining portraits, paintings or photos up to c. 1860 which were not used in our picture history, "Rutland in Retrospect".

Our plan all along was to have a new history of Rutland, at least partly done, by the city's centennial in November 1992.

- Another book just published by one of our members, Warren Dexter, and Barbara Castle Hanson, is "Vermont, Wilderness to Statehood, 1748-1791". It is profusely illustrated and may be obtained from Book King for \$15.95.
- A third new book by Robert E. Laird of Chasanna Drive, Rutland, is "Maximum Effort a First Hand Account of a WW II B29 Crew and Their Bomb Group". Available at Book King, \$16.95.

Still on books - the society wants books, pamphlets, articles, whatever, by Rutland, West Rutland and Proctor authors, past and present. We would very much like to have the first two works by Julia C.R. Dorr written under her pseudonym Caroline Thomas. They are "Farmingdale" and "Landmere".

• Also, speaking of "Rutland in Retrospect", it was a great success but there are no plans to reprint it. With many new people arriving in the area we are often asked if we have copies, which of course we don't. So, if any of you are clearing out "stuff" and know "K in R" is "too good to throw out" we would be glad to have your copy - in good condition - given to the society as a donation, for resale by us, or we will pay you \$10 for it.

Richard P. Thull - died February 1, 1988 age 71. He was a retired salesman for Melody Radio and TV and a security officer at Rutland Regional Medical Center.

Hugo W. Melen - died May 10, 1988 age 85. He owned a monument engraving business. He was the last surviving stone cutter who helped build the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Washington.
