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
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THE 30TH YEAR CELEBRATION

"HISTORICALLY SPEAKING" NOW ON CHANNEL 15 IN RUTLAND

In June "Historically Speaking" began on Rutland's cable access Channel 15. The Committee began with a new show every other week but has now adapted that schedule to a new show every third week. The series includes interviews and historical pictorial material in a rather flexible TV magazine format. The programs can be seen every Wednesday at 4:00 p.m., Thursday at 1:30 p.m. and Friday at 7:30 p.m.

Videotapes of the following episodes can be obtained from: Rutland Regional Community Television, P.O. Box 500, Rutland VT 05702-0500. They are \$10 for each episode. Make checks payable to the above. You must provide a self-addressed padded bag with postage. Channel 15 provides the tape. Personal pickup is available. Call (802) 747-0151 for further information.

Episode # 1 - Elaine Purdy, President of the Society, and Jake Sherman, Chairman of the Board of Directors, discuss the range of Society activities. The program includes some pictorical material of Society activities.

Episode # 2 - James Cassarino, leader of the First Republic Brass discusses the history of the organization. The program includes a number of video clips from First Republic Brass concerts. There is a discussion of Rutland's musical history and some pictures and commentary on the Society's summer dance program.

Episode # 3 - This program, entitled "A Climb To the Star," features still photos of the interior of the Congregational Church tower from the entrance of the church to the top of the tower. The program ends with a series of beautiful panoramic views of Rutland from the tower. Architectural features of the church, in and out, and some historic photos are included.

Episode # 4 - Pat McCormack, Program Chairperson, and Jim Davidson discuss the 30th Anniversary Celebration of the Society. The program includes a brief biography of Julia Dorr and a reading of two of her poems with illustrations by Zulma DeLacy Steele, Julia's daughter.

Episode # 5 - Jim Davidson narrates a video that was created from a single glass plate panorama of Rutland which was taken from the tower of the Congregational Church in 1890. The first half of the program prepares the viewer for the tour by a study of the 1890 maps of the Rutland stores and businesses.

Episode # 6 - Morris Tucker narrates a series of still photos which sample the items and activities that can be found at the Farm Museum at the Vermont State Fair in Rutland.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The year 1999 marked the 30th anniversary of the founding of the Rutland Historical Society. Members celebrated with several projects and programs aimed at increasing public awareness of the Society's service to the community. A drive to increase membership was successful and included enrollment of some 40 new sponsors. Membership now stands at approximately 600.

The Library and Archives committees were able to reconfigure and improve storage on the second floor thanks to the purchase of steel shelving made possible by a generous gift. The Society continued to present programs at the Fox Room of the Rutland Free Library. Fall programs included: Dr. Joanna Gillespie on oral history; Len Lumsden on the battlefield site at Hubbardton, and Heaton Bullock on the last days of the Rutland Railroad. Donald Wickman presented a review of his book "Letters to Vermont From Her Civil War Correspondents to the Home Press" at the annual meeting.

At that time Bernard Donahue was recognized for his years of service to the Society. "Bernie" has worked on memberhip, program and exhibit committees. He shares his knowledge of Rutland City with visitors as museum host and tour guide and is always on hand when help is needed.

Spring programs were presented by Carol Curry on restoration of wedding gowns; Michael Dwyer on genealogy and computers; Charles Fish and Sherwin Williams on the Williams Farm and Holman Jordan on Lake Bomoseen.

Exhibits at Nickwackett Fire House headquarters included: Co. A Vermont National Guard in camp during the Spanish American War, 1898; Rutland Chamber of Commerce in the Fabulous Fifties and the life and Native American collection of Ella Bean Livingston. These three exhibits coincided with the publication of Quarterlies on the same subject. Don Wickman wrote about "Henry Ripley Dorr in the Splendid Little War of 1898" Angela Hinchey edited Mrs. Livingston's "1919 Diary of a Trip to the Gila National Forest" and the Quarterly editors compiled the history of the Chamber. Paul Crossman wrote on the "Development of Rocky Pond" for the fourth Quarterly. In an effort to control expenses, the Quarterly and the Newsletter are now being mailed together.

Temporary exhibits were set up at the City Water Filtration Plant open house May 1 and at the opening of the Jeffords Welcome Center at the new Rutland Train Depot on March 1. The railroad exhibit was returned for display at the Society.

The Friday night dance programs were held at the Senior Center throughout the summer and school groups and others continued to take advantage of museum and walking tours. A new undertaking for the Society was the inauguration of "Historically Speaking", a half-hour television program on Channel 15. The show, which is designed to be both entertaining and educational, will change every few weeks. Another new venture is an informal weekly column written by Vice President Helen Davidson for a local weekly publication.

The Society is grateful for its many faithful, hard-working volunteers and is continually seeking the enthusiasm and input of newcomers.
