"HISTORICALLY SPEAKING" ON CHANNEL 15 IN RUTLAND

The Society continues to produce "Historically Speaking" on Channel 15. A new program is produced each month. The series includes interviews and historical pictorial material in a rather flexible TV magazine format. Episode #13 - Tom Carpenter hosts George Bates of the Loyalty Day Parade Committee in a discussion of the history of the Loyalty Day Parade. The program includes still photos of Rutland parades from the Civil War era into the 20th Century. Rutland has always loved a parade and has always been a great parade city. The program also includes a series of wonderful video clips from Loyalty Day parades of the 1990's.

Episode # 14 - Jim Davidson hosts a program with Marissa Johnson, a senior history major from Castleton State College, as his guest. Marissa volunteered at the Society during the Spring Term to gain some hands-on experience in a local historical society. The Society provided experiences with archives, library materials, artifacts, exhibits, publications and hosting. Marissa shares her experiences which are illustrated by a series of still photos. The program provides an interesting overview of the multitude of volunteer activities that take place at the Society.

Episode # 15 - Tom Carpenter hosts Jim Proctor, State Commander of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, in a far-ranging discussion of the Sons of Union Veterans and their activities. The discussion includes a focus on the Ripley Camp (or post) which is based in Rutland and its activities. Jim Proctor was the leader of the Rutland Camp for the last few years prior to becoming state commander. Other camps are in Montpelier and Chelsea, Vermont.

VMGA DISCOUNT ADMISSIONS

The Rutland Historical Society is a member of the Vermont Museum & Gallery Alliance which is offering members of local societies who belong to the VMGA a 10% discount on admission to VMGA institutions that charge admission. The discounts apply to admission only. Most Vermont institutions (165) are members of the VMGA as well as 12 others in New Hampshire, New York and Massachusetts.

A single person membership gets a single 10% discount. A Mr. and Mrs. membership will get two 10% discounts. As the Society does not normally issue membership cards, those interested in the discount should call ahead to obtain a proper identification card and a list of institutions offering the discount.

RUTLAND RAILWAY ASSOCIATION LEASES CENTER RUTLAND DEPOT

Through the generosity of William Carris, son of the late Henry Carris of Carris Reels, the Rutland Railway Association, Inc., a public nonprofit organization, has leased use of the Center Rutland Depot railroad station for use as exhibit space for model railroads and historical railroad artifacts.

HO-scale and N-scale model train layouts are planned for the east end of the building. At some future date, the Association may establish model train layouts of other gauges such as Lionel and American Flyer. The other half of the station will be used as a museum of historical railroad artifacts. The RRA has assumed custody of Henry Carris' railroad collection, and will be working to exhibit it as part of the planned displays.

The Association's meetings are currently held on the second Thursday of each month at 7:30 pm in the Center Rutland Depot. Guests are welcome. Membership is open to the public. GENEXCHANGE OFFERS FREE ONLINE DATA

Genealogical research by computer on the web is now one of the hottest new research tools that is offering new sites and services daily. Some sites offer free services and some offer services for a fee. Recently the Society received a notice from GenExchange which is the third largest genealogy project online. Opened in September 1996, the GenExchange is a site dedicated to ensuring permanent free access to genealogical data. The GenExchange project seeks to preserve raw genealogical data online where it is indexed and searchable using one of dozens of search engines. The GenExchange is a not-for-profit organization whose members and volunteers work to transcribe records into databases for free permanent use by all.

Any type of genealogically significant data can be found at the GenExchange. The amount of data in any given county depends on the work of volunteers interested in those materials. HISTORY OF ST. PETER'S PARISH, RUTLAND, VERMONT

In 1970, Father Patrick T. Hannon completed a hand-written history of St. Peter's Parish in three volumes after several years of research. The work remained unpublished until this year when St. Peter Parish published it. Father Hannon's work has been edited and updated by Society members Jim and Helen Davidson.

The 166-page work includes over 40 full-page pictures. An extensive index makes the work useful for those seeking family history. Although the work is primarily a church parish history, it includes the activities of parish social and athletic organizations. SLIDE PROGRAM

The Society has a series of slides which have been developed into a flexible slide program on several aspects of Rutland's history. A number of versions of this program have been offered. In April the Twilight Homemakers visited the Society for a program, In May the Society brought a slide program to the Godnick Center for the Senior Citizens' organization. In June the Poultney D.A.R. Chapter came to the Society for a slide program on Rutland's history.

SCHOOL VISITS

During May and June there were a number of school visits at the Society. Second and Third Grades from the Rutland Public School system stopped to briefly acquaint themselves with the Society. In June, Sixth Grade classes from North Clarendon Elementary School came for a slide program and walking tour.
