"HISTORICALLY SPEAKING"

"Historically Speaking" can be seen on Channel 15 every Wednesday at 4:00 p.m., Thursday at 1:30 p.m. and Friday at 7:30 p.m. Videotapes of the following episodes can be obtained from Channel 15. Call (802) 747-0151 for further information.

Episode # 28 - Jim Davidson hosts a conversation about history in Vermont with Gainor Davis, Director of the Vermont Historical Society. The conversation ranges from the nature of history to its proper role in the schools and the importance of state and local historical societies.

Episode # 29 - Dorothy Whitford hosts Donald Wickman who presents an illustrated history of the American Revolutionary activities at Mt. Independence during 1776-1777. The program includes colored views of the site features today and a number of historic colored images of the officers, men and places involved in the events of 1776-1777.

Episode # 30 - Jim Davidson hosts Michael Seward, local antique dealer, and Dorothy Whitford, who loaned a number of pre-WWII toys to the Society, in a discussion of some samples from the exhibit at the Society entitled "Traces of Holidays Past". Michael provides an historical view of the objects selected while Dorothy adds a number of personal notes about the toys.

"GETTING AROUND"

On 22 SEP 01 Jim Davidson represented the Society at the fall regional meeting of the Council of Local Historical Societies at the Wallingford Historical Society. He also represented the Society at a workshop on Communications offered by the Vermont Historical Society at the Pittsford Historical Society on 2 OCT 01. He brought back to the Society a manual on Communications produced by the Vermont Historical Society. A copy is available at the Society.

On 18 OCT 01 President Helen Davidson and husband Jim represented the Society at a breakfast presentation by Mark Fenton, nationally-known consultant on Walking Programs. The Society has a walking tour package that goes from Main Street Park down Center Street to Merchants Row, thence to Washington Street and east up to Main Street and back to the Society. The tour emphasizes the movement of the town center from Main Street Park down Center Street to the area near the 1850 railroad center. The walk up Washington Street re-enforces the changes in residential types in a reverse chronology. This tour is used with school groups visiting the Society but certainly could be used for other groups and individuals. It takes about one hour to complete the loop.

On 20 OCT 01 President Helen Davidson and husband Jim attended a conference at the Vermont Historical Society in Montpelier on the topic "So What! - Why Does History Matter". On 20 NOV 01 they attended a Vermont Museum and Gallery Alliance-sponsored open interchange on the topic of "Home Schoolers and Historical Societies and Museums".

RESEARCH ACTIVITIES AT THE SOCIETY

Three students from the Lothrop School in Pittsford and their teacher have been meeting with Jim Davidson at the Society on Friday mornings. They are doing research on the French-Canadian families who came to Rutland in the 19th Century. They are developing an historical presentation for the Vermont History Day competition in April 2002. They have been particularly focusing on the Valiquette family.

The Proper Victorian Ladies from Massachusetts spent 7 and 8 DEC 01 at the Society in research for local material for their presentation at First Night.

PROGRAM FOR SENIOR CITIZEN COUNCIL

On 6 NOV 01 Jim Davidson presented a program on "The Care of Photographs" for the Senior Citizen Council at the Godnick Center. A sampling of prints from the Society's glass plate collections was also shared.

PROGRAM FOR THIRD GRADE AT CHRIST THE KING SCHOOL

On 14 NOV 01 Jim Davidson visited a Third Grade class at Christ the King School to offer a program on the development of the Rutland community from 1761 to 1800. The class has been studying the local community. Jim reports that the program was well-received, the children had numerous questions, and most important of all, they would like the Society to come back again.

EDEN PARK MUSIC PROGRAM

Jim Davidson continues to visit the people at Eden Park on a monthly schedule to provide a program of recorded music from the past.

CLEANING CREW

This fall a volunteer group of Society members gave the main level of the Society a thorough cleaning. They also began cleaning the upper level library area. This group has agreed to provide periodic maintenance cleaning of the Society's facilities. CEMENT CREW

On 8 OCT 01 a "cement crew" of volunteers mixed cement and filled cracks in the walks and the building foundation where needed.

EXHIBITS

The Society currently is continuing its exhibition on "Eight Generations of Rutland's History". It also is offering "Covered Bridges of Rutland" and a seasonal exhibit of dolls, children's tea sets, a doll house, children's books, actively seeking additional volunteers. Both toy soldiers, early children's iron vehicles and a collection of Christmas and New Year's postcards.

The Nickwackett Firehouse materials and the Sanborn Insurance Map of 1890 Rutland are also still on exhibit.

FIRST NIGHT

Rutland First Night celebration on New Year's Eve. This year the Society will offer recorded music for dancing and listening in the atrium of the Asa Bloomer State Office Building from 4 to 6 p.m. and again from 8:30 to 10:30 p.m. The program entitled "Swinging Through the Ages" will offer dance music of the 20th Century from Charleston and swing to rock and roll.
