The third part is 34 minutes long. It includes malls, snack and meal stops, hops, five and ten cent record stores. President Eisenhower's visit to Kennedy's Rutland. President Assassination, the Rutland Swimming Pool on North Main Street, and Cinderella's Sweets candy shop at the corner of Center and Wales Streets.

OUTREACH

On Saturday, October 1, the Society made a series of video presentations at the Rutland Train show that was held this year at the College of St. Joseph Athletic Center. Doreen McCullough demonstrated the Society website, Jim Davidson showed the "Rutland In Retrospect" digital disc and Carolynn Ranftle presented the "Rutland Newsliner" digital disc.

On October 15 the Vermont Historical Society held its 63rd Annual Meeting of the League of Local Historical Societies and Museums at Castleton University. The Rutland Historical Society was a co-sponsor of the meeting and was deeply involved in all the local arrangements.

The Rutland Historical Society provided presenters for seven of the twelve sessions.

Jim Davidson, Carolynn Ranftle, and Doreen McCullough made presentations at the session entitled "What Can Digitizing Do For Your Society?" Jim talked about the role that digitizing has played at the Rutland Historical Society. Carolynn focused on the digitizing of photos and Doreen talked about how much digitizing can be done on the typical home computer and scanner.

"Have You Used Public Access Television?" was a session presentation by Jim Davidson and Kevin Christopher, President of the Vermont Access Network. Kevin discussed the free training and equipment available at most Vermont public access stations. Jim talked about practical ideas gleaned from his broad experience of 15 years as an independent producer at PEG-TV in Rutland.

A session entitled "Developing Virtual Walking Tours" was presented by Ben Burdge of the Rutland Historical Society who produced an award-winning 50 minute Virtual Walking Tour for the Society. This can now be viewed on the Society website. Ben demonstrated some of the elements and benefits of producing long and short virtual walking tours.

"Managing Society Assets" was a session by Robert Ranftle of the Rutland Historical Society. Rob-ert is chairperson of the Society's ad hoc committee dealing with Society assets and emergency plan-ning. His presentation described the effective and safe management of assets including ideas and options for facilities management, record keeping, risk management, information technology, and emergency planning.

"Creating A Door To The World Through Your Website" was presented by Doreen McCullough, webmaster of the Society website. Doreen traced the evolution of the Society website as an example of how an organization can use a website as a research and content tool for a worldwide audience.

Carolynn Ranftle of the Society presented the "Past Perfect And Beyond" session. This included an emphasis on determining cataloging priorities for an organization and different levels of cataloging. Report possibilities and various questions from the audience rounded out the presentation.

Michael Messier of the Society chaired a session entitled "New Options For Energy and Communication." Michael reviewed various options for telephone and internet services. Phillip Allen of Same Sun of Vermont outlined some of the solar options available and Dan Mackey of Green Mountain Power Corporation discussed heat pump options for heating and cooling buildings.

The Society is fortunate to have such knowledgeable and talented members and thanks them for sharing with the over 80 attendees at this meeting.
