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### REPORT

### To the Governor and General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

GENTLEMEN :- We herewith submit our sixteenth biennial report. Owing to the prescribed space now allowed us this report cannot contain all the details and information which our former reports have contained. The two years from July 1, 1916 to June 30, 1918, have been the most strenuous in our history chiefly owing to the constantly increasing price of everything going into the maintenance of the Home, but it is due to the great efficiency and wise economy of the present Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Martin, that the cost has not exceeded the amounts hereafter detailed. The productions of the farm for consumption in the Home have very materially increased as you will find by comparing the Superintendent's Report and Farm Account with the same items in former reports. The entire appropriations made by the State for maintaining the Home, including cost of buildings and support of inmates, had amounted June 30, 1918 to \$393,000, a sum less than most of the States had to expend in purchase and equipment of land and buildings before they could care for any inmates.

The number of inmates has not very materially changed in the past two years, there were on the roll June 30, 1916, sixtysix; June 30, 1917, seventy-one; June 30, 1918, sixty-seven. The whole number of inmates cared for since the Home was opened in 1887, to June 30, 1918, has been 852, the whole number of deaths during that period has been 355.

It has been our custom to recite in detail all bills incurred during the biennial period that the people might know exactly how we were expending their funds, but to conserve space we in this report give only the monthly totals. The bills are made in duplicate; besides entry in full on the books of the Home, a duplicate copy is retained in the files at the Home. Every bill is examined and endorsed "correct" by the Superintendent and approved by two Trustees before payment is made by the treasurer. Trustees Cushman and Henry have performed this service each month during the whole biennial period. The books and files of bills are always open to the inspection of any citizen of the State.

We have discharged the trust confided to us by you as economically and efficiently as we could and have still kept the idea of an actual Home for these decrepit old men.

### Terms of Admission

Section 1. Until the Home is filled to the number therein to be supported, and thereafter when a vacancy exists, any soldier, or sailor, of the war of the rebellion, or who has served for the United States in any war, who is sick, or disabled, by wounds or old age, and who is destitute of other means of support, and who has been honorably discharged from the military or naval service of the United States (preference being given to those soldiers and sailors who helped to fill the quota of Vermont, or who can claim birth or eitizenship in Vermont), may be admitted to the Home upon the recommendation in writing of any member of the Board of Trustees, addressed to the Superintendent. All admissions to the Home (except those temporarily made by the Superintendent) shall be probationary.

Section 2. The Board of Trustees at the annual meeting held July 9, 1913, passed a resolution authorizing the Committee on Admissions to admit Veterans who are receiving a pension from the U. S. Government of twenty dollars or more per month and who have no wife, child, parent or other person living that are dependent upon them, upon the agreement of such veterans to pay to the Home not less than one-half of such pension, said veteran to be cared for as are the regular members during their good behavior and prompt payment of said one-half of pension received.

### Rules of Admission

Section 1. Applications for admission shall be made on forms provided by the Home. The applicant must have been a Vermont soldier or sailor, or have gained a residence in the State and hold an honorable discharge.

Section 2. Applicants may be admitted on approval of the application by the Superintendent and one member of the Committee on Admissions.

Section 3. In cases out of the ordinary the question whether the applicant should be admitted shall be passed upon by the entire committee and the applicant whose application has been disapproved of by the Superintendent and one member of the Committee on Admissions shall, on request, be entitled to have his application passed upon by the full Committee; the action of said committee shall be at all times subject to the approval of the Trustees.

Section 4. If the Home is not filled to its capacity, other honorably discharged soldiers or sailors than those named in paragraph one of this Section may be admitted if the Committee on Admissions find the man a suitable person to become a member of the Home.

Section 5. An applicant with any degree of insanity cannot be admitted. The Surgeon of the Home, on request of the Superintendent, shall examine applicants, and his findings shall be final and conclusive as to the question of applicant's sanity or insanity.

Section 6. An applicant having been a member of another Home cannot be admitted to this Home until the expiration of six months, without the approval of the President of the Board of Trustees.

Section 7. An applicant who has property, or means of support, will not be admitted without the vote of the Committee on Admissions.

Section 8. Soldiers or sailors who have been dishonoraby discharged from any Home cannot be admitted, except by vote of the Committee on Admissions.

### Surgeon's Report

To the Hon. Hugh Henry,

President of the Board of Trustees:

As physician to the Vermont Soldiers' Home I herewith submit my report covering the two years ending June 30, 1918.

At the time of my last report, June 30, 1916, there were seventeen patients in the hospital. During the two years covered by this report fifty-three new patients have been admitted, making a total of seventy that have been cared for during the past two years.

Of this number, twenty-one have been discharged as cured or relieved, thirty-four have died, and fifteen are still in the hospital.

The causes of the thirty-four deaths were as follows: arteriosclerosis 11, heart disease 7, pneumonia 2, alcoholism 2, nephritis 2, toxemia 2, apoplexy 2, hemorrhage from ulcer of the stomach 1, alcoholic neuritis 1, paralysis 1, tuberculosis 1, cancer 1, poisoning 1.

Of the patients now in the hospital, one has catarrh of the stomach, one has senile debility, one is blind, one has paralysis as a result of apoplexy, two have cystitis, two are crippled from fractured legs, two have rheumatism, and five are there because of general debility due to age.
