

Brief Biographical Information on Harvey Shaw

Harvey Shaw was born on July 6, 1795, in Tinmouth, Vermont. His father, Ichabod, was 28 and his mother, Rebecca, was 19. He had five brothers and one sister. He married Margaret M on March 10, 1825, in Surry, New Hampshire. They had three children during their marriage. He died on June 30, 1878, in Wallingford, Vermont, having lived a long life of 82 years.

Mr. Shaw was a justice of the peace from (1840-1874), serving Rutland County for 34 years.

Greeting:

In accordance with chapter ninety-four of the General Statutes of Vermont, you are hereby appointed Agent for the town of *Wallingford* to sell spirituous liquors within and for said town, for medicinal, chemical and mechanical purposes only, from the date of this instrument, till the first Monday in May, A. D. 1867, unless this appointment is sooner revoked. You will be required to observe the following rules:

1. Before acting under this appointment, a definite bargain must be made in writing between you and the selectmen of your town, fixing the salary or compensation for your service. (See Act of 1864.)
2. The compensation must not be the profits, nor any percentage of the receipts for your sales, but a definite sum to be paid from your town treasury. (General Statutes, Chap. 94.)
3. No liquors must be obtained of you, nor on the premises of your agency, except such as are furnished you by your selectmen, and at prices fixed by them. And all money received by you for sales, must be paid to your town treasury. (See Act of 1863.)
4. No such liquors must be sold by the glass, nor drank on your premises.
5. You will keep a suitable book, ruled in seven columns, properly headed, in which you will write in the first column the date of each sale; in the second, the name of each purchaser; in the third, his residence, if not in your town; in the fourth, the amount of liquor sold; in the fifth, the kind; in the sixth, the price received; in the seventh, the purpose for which it is wanted.
6. All persons obtaining liquor of you must state the object, to be either medicinal, chemical or mechanical; and if you have any reliable information that any person has obtained such liquor of you on a false representation, and has used, or furnished it to be used, for the purpose of drinking, you will report such information to the proper civil authority for complaint.
7. Your book must at all times be subject to the inspection of the selectmen and other civil authority of your town, and proper requests from other citizens for such privilege should be respected.
8. You will keep a record of all liquors placed in your charge by your selectmen, and make a report to the County Commissioner and Selectmen on the first Mondays ^{of each month} ~~in August, November, February and May~~, of the total amount of sales for each preceding ^{month} ~~quarter~~, and on the first Monday in February will prepare a report of the value of all liquors received by you to that date, the total receipts of sales for each quarter, and the total value of liquor then on hand, and present such report to your selectmen for approval, previous to the annual town meeting in March.
