### THE ADAIRS of WALLINGFORD, VERMONT CHARLES ADAIR ROBERT ADAIR JOHN R. ADAIR

revised fall 2014, no Adair FAG

John R. Adair was son of Robert Adair, a marble stone cutter, born in Scotland and grandson of Charles Adair, b in Scotland, a stone cutter and marble dealer.

John R. Adair, of Wallingford, established the Wallingford Monument Works in 1877. He employed three or four men. The Adair marble quarry in South Wallingford was opened in 1857 by J. Adair & Brother. They also had a mill of six gangs and employed at one time in the quarry, mill, and dressing marble, seventy-five men. This quarry furnished some of the marble for the customs house in Charleston, SC. The quarry was worked one season by Loren Waldo, about 1867 and was idle for a time after that. (*Hist. Rutland Co.* p.186)

"In South Wallingford, on the west side of Route 7, there is a vein of marble where three quarries once operated.... The third quarry, run by J. Adair and brother, was just north of the village and opened in 1857. The Adairs used the marble mostly for headstones, which they hewed and carved by hand. There was a dam in the creek near this quarry, built so that it could be used as a bridge, and ox teams drew marble blocks from the Adair quarry across it, through a saw mill yard to the East Road and to the finishing mill. Around 1864, Mr. Adair built a marble mill, but that business did not success. By early 1900's, none of the three quarries was operating. John R. Adair, son of the quarry owner, was proprietor of the Wallingford Monumental Works near the depot in Wallingford village. He started the business just after the Civil war and was at the same location for more than 40 years. He and his employees carved many of the gravestones in Green Hill Cemetery." [ibid]

The abandoned Adair quarry was purchased by the White Pigment Corporation, which began operating there in 1954. The quarry supplies crushed marble and limestone, which is trucked daily to the company's Florence,

Vermont plant. [ibid]

New History of Wallingford, p. 123:

"Many of the hand carved headstones found in these cemeteries (Wallingford) are probably the work of John R. Adair, proprietor of the Wallingford Monumental Works in the 1870'. He made and erected the stones; a favorite design was a dove.

The Beers 18?? map of South Wallingford, p. 9A, shows J. Adair by a marble quarry probably where the gravel pit is today. Also a double building west of Route 7 and probably his home and a Marble saw mill east of Route 7 by Otter Creek. The map on p. 9 also shows the location of J. Adair.

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
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


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

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#### CYRUS ADAMS of Pawlet, d. 1800

CYRUS ADAMS, of Pawlet, probably son of Timothy Adams of Canterbury, CT, b. 21 Jan. 1772 Canterbury, CT VR, if son of Timothy. 1755-1774 (age 26/45 in 1800 Pawlet census, living alone. [M32-52-151] He d. 17 Oct. 1800 Pawlet, VT VR, probably unmarried.

Asahel Adams of Pawlet was appointed administrator or the estate of Cyrus Adams on 3 Nov. 1800. Gideon Adams, Samuel Lathrop & James Leach to examine claims & settle estate of Cyrus Adams late of Pawlet, deceased, represented insolvent & will meet at the house of Joshua Cobb. [Rutland Probate, Fair Haven District, 3:260-65. Marsha Hoffman Rising, VT Newspaper Abstracts 1783-1816, NEHGS, p. 207, VT Gazette of 21 Dec. 1800]

Est. of CYRUS ADAMS, Pawlet. 17 Jan. 1803. On 3 Nov. 1800, adm. to Asahel Adams, bond, Samuel

Lathrop, surety. Est. insolvent, Samuel Lathrop, Gideon Adams & James Leach, appt. appr. & comm.

The inventory included a Military Coat, \$10 [his father was SAR], horse, clothing, stone hammers, picks, chisels, hatchel, trowel, Mason's chisels, carpenter's compass, no real estate; not totaled, appr. Notes due est. include one of Jesse Adams, & notes due for pairs of gravestones from Edmund Gould, \$4.00 & John Cobb, \$9.00, James Leach \$5.00 & Chauncey Bing \$2.50, total due est. \$167.65. Claims against est.: \$84.70. Exp.: final sickness, fees, etc. \$21.54. Order to Gideon Adams, Esq. & James Leach to make div. to: Timothy Adams (inc. 2 stone hammers, picks & chisels), Isaac Adams, Asahel Adams, Alden Adams, Susannah Adams & Rebeckah Adams, 6 March 1804. [3:260-65]

The estate was distributed to Timothy, Isaac, Asahel, Alden, Susanna & Rebekah Adams on 17 Jan. 1803.

No mention was made as to their relationship to Cyrus.

A search of the Barbour Coll. of Conn. VR found that Timothy & Susannah Adams of Canterbury had children with these names, thus the heirs were probably siblings of Cyrus Adams.

A search of both census & Vermont vital records failed to prove any relationships between the heirs, however they are most certainly the family of Timothy and Susanna Adams of Pomfret, Conn.

TIMOTHY ADAMS, of Pomfret, CT, b. 7 Sept. 1742 Pomfret [Barbour Coll.] to Isaac & Eleanor (later Brooklyn, CT), d. 26 Aug. 1834 (pension).

Timothy entered the service at Canterbury, Windham Co., CT 1 May 1775 in the CT state troops. He served in Capt. Obadiah Johnson's Regt, Col. Putnam's, 8 months. He served at Cambridge & Bunker Hill, saw General Washington frequently. He was drafted twice & went to New London.

He received a pension of \$26.66 a year from 4 March 1831. In 1832 he was age 90 & died 25 Aug. 1834/35 leaving a widow Susannah, married (smudged) May 1864. Susannah received the \$26.66/year pension in

Brooklyn, CT. & died 18 Jan 1843.

Rev. George J. Tillotson, of the Unitarian Church, minister in Brooklyn, CT gives the marriage date as 3 May 1764. [SAR Pension file W21,600.]

Stone in Old Pawlet cemetery, very badly worn but looks like a round face, on a new other stones thought to be the work of Cyrus Adams, partly buried. If Cyrus was son of Timothy. Sarah was his sister-in-law.

#### **AMBROSINI CARVERS**

#### Tamante, with sons Dino and Derno were Gravestone Carvers

During the 1982 Association for Gravestone Carvers Conference, a bus tour took the attendees to Shaftsbury, Vermont where carvers from the McCue Memorial Co. demonstrated techniques being used to replace nearly a dozen gravestones that had stood near the front of the old Shaftsbury Cemetery. The stones had been damaged in an automobile accident. The originals are now preserved in the church-museum by the cemetery. It is my understanding the work was being done by Dino and Derno Ambrosini. The replacements give us a chance to see what the originals must have looked like 200 years ago.

Ida Ambrosini, 25, b. Mass., m with Ines, 2 and Lira, 11 mo., born Carrara, departed from Mafsa, Carrara, her mother's name: Antonia Tellicilo, arriving July 18, 1907, others b. Carrara, departed from Geneva.

Tamante Ambrosini applied for a passport giving his birth as Jan. 20, 1878 Carrara to Giuseppe Ambrosini of Carrara. "I emigrated to the United States, sailing from Genoa, Italy about Nov. 29, 1901, resided for 17 years, from 1901 – 1919 at Proctor, Vt.; was naturalized July 28, 1906 at Rutland, Vt., a marble carver. Preparing to visit children. My wife died in Italy July 9, 1918. I was intending to leave NY, NY in Sept. 1919."

The family, all of Proctor, VT, sailed on the "America" from Genoa, on April 19, 1922, arriving in the port of New York on April 18, 1922. Both Tamante and Matilda had been naturalized in the court of Rutland in 1907. The children, with full birth dates as born in Proctor: Ines, Lidia, Dino changed to Antonio, Derno, Socrates.

The family was probably in Italy as they have not been found at the time of the 1910 and 1920 census.

Dear Christopher Williams,

Yesterday's e-mail from Rick Kobik made my day. First of all to learn about his beautiful gravestones for his wife and son, and then to find a son of Schafer Williams.

I am a member of the Association for Gravestone Studies and have for the last 15 years been copying and publishing the cemetery records for Rutland Co. This has led to a great interest in the stones themselves and the men who carved them. In 1987 I was re-surveying the West Pawlet cemetery and found your father's stone. I knew at once it was a copy of the stones by Samuel Dwight who carved so many stones in your area. Then I found another reproduction stone for Jean Eisenhart in the Green Hill Cemetery in Wallingford.

At the AGS Conference last June, I showed the pictures of these two stones to several members including founding members Daniel & Jessie Lei Farbers. The Farbers have been all over the country photographing gravestones. Their pictures are in the Worcester Athenaeum. Jessie took my pictures to the AGS office & it was decided, with my permission, to have me do a presentation at this year's conference.

With some detective work, I found Michael Fannin who carved the Eisenhart stone, and led me to Rick Kobik. Finding more on your father's stone has been more of a challenge.

I first searched both the Rutland & Granville papers for an obituary. Many Granville people are buried in the West Pawlet cemetery. Then I went to Gawet & Sons in Center Rutland. I was told the stone was sand blasted and of Dorset marble, but they had no records that far back. Then a visit to a friend who is writing the Pawlet History. She had your father's birth record, but no more. Next came a visit to the Pawlet Town Clerk where I learned he was buried by the Albany Medical College. The stone is in the John L. Williams plot. Was John Williams his grandfather? He died before your father was born. I did not expect a reply to my letter to the Albany Medical College, but they did reply that he died in the Bennington Hospital and his ashes were returned to Rose Ann Dolshi. My letter to her was returned. I thought I was at the end of the search till I heard from Rick yesterday. I was planning to go the Bennington Museum soon to search for an obituary.

So my questions to you are: Was there any special reason why you chose to have a reproduction of a Samuel Dwight stone? Who did the drawing? Who composed the verse? I think this is what fascinated me the most on this stone. What did your father do? Who did he teach?

All of the members of AGS will be most appreciative of any help you will give on this.



The verse was composed by Claudia Schmidt, one of Schafer's students at the University of Wisconson & a fairly famous folk singer. The song, dedicated to Spike is titled "Old Friend."

The stone is a copy of the "Mr. Elijah Bagley, d. 1801 stone in the Maple Hill Cemetery, Shaftsbury.

Schafer Williams' body was donated to the Albany, NY Medical School, later returned to the family.

#### **AARON BANCROFT, MONTPELIER**

Wells, Rutland Co., VT Village Cemetery: A small White Zinc monument signed "Aaron Bancroft, Montpelier", no names or dates. This is believed to be a "salesman's sample"

There is no mention of him carving stones in the records. However at the time of the 1840 the census he was in manufacture & trade. Was he an agent for some Montpelier carver. Several other early carvers are listed as "shoemakers".

Aaron Bancroft was born in Wood End, Reading, Mass, VR. 2 Feb, 1784, son of Edmund & Sarah Bancroft (sic) [Register vol. 95, p. 110; vol. 96, p. 51], desc. of Thos. Bancroft of Boston 1632. Aaron Bancroft died March 26, 1872 age 88-1-24 of old age & cold, shoemaker & sexton, b. Wood End, MA, to Samuel & Sarah (Holt) Bancroft. [Montpelier VT VR]

He m. 30 Oct. 1808 Reading, Middlesex, MA, Anna (?Emma) Foster of Wood End, b. ca 1784, d. Oct. 1865 age 82.

They moved to Montpelier in 1813. He began work in the mechanical trade, that of a shoemaker. They were members of the Congregational Church.

In 1813 the Elm Street Cemetery was opened and he became the sexton for nearly 50 years. When the Green Mount Cemetery was opened in 1857, he told the following poem: (see copy from Hemenway 4:475). In 1819 he became sexton of the Old Brick Church cemetery. He was very strong.

To him we are indebted for the vital static records of the town, making a list of about 1 thousand deaths, which he kept for 40 years, until 1857, since which time the State law has required the registration of all deaths by the district clerk.

What a tale of mortality could the old sexton tell: (Hemenway 4:475) [See copy of poem.]

ALON BANCROFT was born in Wood now within the present limits of oc, Mass., Feb. 2, 1784. He was one mily of 12 children, and a son of Bancroft, who was a brother of Dr. Aaron Bancroft, of Worcester,

Aaron, the subject of our sketch, was married in 1804, to Anna Foster, of Wood End, and removed to Montpelier in 1813. He began work at his mechanical trade, that of a shoemaker, which he followed uninterruptedly until he was 84 years of age, when, by an accidental fall, he received injuries which disabled him from further service. In 1813, the year he came to town, the old Elm Street Cemetery was opened, and he was soon after made its sexton, the duties of which office he faithfully performed for nearly 50 years, until July, 1857, when the new cemetery, Green Mount, was occupied, having been dedicated the previous year. What a tale of mortality could the old sexton tell:

It was announced in the 10 Aug. 1803 Middlebury Mercury that Levi Foot of Middlebury, who had operated the Blanchard quarry at West Rutland from 1800 to 1801, and William Barnes of Pittsford, were carrying on the stonecutting business in their respective towns. The latter (father of William Franklin Barnes who was born in Pittsford in 1806 and became a pioneer in the Rutland marble industry) came to Rutland within the next few years and continued his trade. [Hance, History of Rutland, 526]

Most likely William Franklin Barnes learned how to quarry from his father, William Barnes, who worked in the beginning stages of the industry in both Pittsford and Rutland. When the father moved his family to the west, the young William F. remained in Rutland with the Elijah Boardman family. About 12 years before 1854 he traded a seventy-five dollar horse for land and set up a quarrying operation. [Hance, ibid, p. 531-534]

In 1854, Barnes was employing eighty men and producing 3000,000 feet of marble annually. That summer he sold part of his claim for \$125,000 to men representing the Rutland marble Company. He continued his trade till

his death. [ibid]

"On the west side of Otter Creek are extensive beds of marble in which quarries have been opened. The first marble quarry in this town (Pittsford) was opened by Jeremiah Sheldon in 1795. TRUMAN BARTLETT (Buckley, Josiah) b. 25 Oct. 1836 Dorset, VT. He m. in CT, Mary Ann White, Child: Paul Bartlett, b. Cheshire CT.

Josiah Bartlett was a carver in Dorset.

Truman Howe Bartlett, b. 25 Oct. 1835 Dorset, VT, age 34 issued a passport on 16 Aug. 1870.

Truman Bartlett, son of Buckley Bartlett, grandson of Josiah Bartlett had a scant education with one term in Poultney. Marble cutting was the conspicuous industry in Dorset in the forties & fifties and when he was old enough Truman went into Charles Field's marble shop in the village and began lettering tombstones.

He left Dorset in 1855, borrowing ten dollars from Cyrus Farwell, and went to Mansfield, Mass. where he continued lettering tombstones. Later, he became an apprentice of Huggins Manley in a marble shop in Geneseo, NY. Thence he went to Bedford, OH, to work with Ezra Bates, another Dorset man. By this time, ambition was well awake in him and he began to desire to learn how to cut marble as well as letter it, so he betook himself to New York and there worked for \$3.50 a week in order to get the training he needed. After this he helped another Dorset man, Horace Reed start a marble shop in Deposit, NY. In December 1861 he went to Cheshire, Conn., where he married Mary Ann White & son Paul was born.

The rest of the story has nothing to do with Dorset. In 1867 Truman went to Europe with his wife and son, and there in Rome and Paris, he studied and worked for many years, becoming ever more and more proficient and successful. His son Paul... at the age of fourteen exhibited a bust of his grandmother. White in the Paris Salon.... Son and father between them have placed groups and statues to numerous to mention in honorable positions all over the United States... [Story or Dorset, p. 175-79]

The only other carvers this early in this area were the Johnson Style River Valley Ornate Cavers who left a group of stones in the Pittsford area. The unusual A and backwards N are not found in their work.

The carver, if say at least 17 when these stones were carved, would have been born by 1774 or earlier.

These two stone are the largest hand carved field stones I have found in Rutland County. They are very hard to read unless the light is just right. Note that the diagonal of the N is wrong, words misspelled, a very fancy capital A with the cross bar bent down.

The Jane Beach & Seth Keeler stones are carved on very rough material with several incorrect letters & misspelled words. William Vaughn known for his poor spelling was not born till 1781, so unless back dated they are not his work. William Denison, b. 1776 of West Rutland, is a possible carver except there are no misspelled words on his later work. This does not look like the body of his work.

While Ebenezer Beach had his father's stone erected, it does not mean he did the carving. There is no reason to believe he was a carver.

Chittenden was chartered March 16, 1780 to Gershom Beach and sixty-five others. This was the first grant by the General Assembly of Vermont and named for Thomas Chittenden the first governor of Vermont.

One half of the township of Philadelphia was added on Nov. 2, 1816 so that Chittenden now contains about fifty-four square miles. At the first proprietors meeting on May 2, 1786, Capt. Seth Keeler was voted moderator.

The Rutland Co. probate records include the estates of both Gershom Beach [widow Dorcas 3:176,178-79, 4:46-48] Seth Keeler [2:270, 3: 71-73, 3:130-33, 3:403. No mention is made of the gravestones.

Mrs. Norma Baker of Hudson, MT wrote about this family in 1993 and believed the stones for Jane Beach & Seth Keeler were carved by Ebenezer Beach. She is a descendant of Gershom and Jane (Keeler) Beach.

Ebenezer Beach was the eldest son of Gershom Beach, proved by the probate records. According to the verse, he at had his father's stone erected. This does not necessarily mean he carved the stone. It is a well done stone, while the stones for Jane and her brother, Seth Keeler, are very rough.

Ebenezer moved to Perryport, NY with the family in 1818. He was buried in the Butler Cemetery.

Mrs. Baker spells the town Perryport or Peerypont. She probably means Pierrepont in St. Lawrence Co., NY.

Mrs. Baker's records show Gershom Beach's children born in Lanesboro, MA.

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



On FAG, Jen Snoots has posted a picture of him & his long obituary. In part it reads he was mustered out of the army in Dec. 1865. Returning to Manchester, Mr. Bowman learned the stone cutters trade. In the spring of 1872 he came to Rutland, and opened a marble shop on Grove Street. This flourished for 11 years, when on account of the ill health of the owner, it was given up and Mr. Bowman began to raise high blooded horses.

He must have been introduced to the trade by 1870 when living in Shelburne, MA with his brother-in-law and

sister.





Vermont Governor. When he was 16 he began work at the National Bank of Rutland, where his father was Cashier, and he eventually became bank President. He was also a partner in the Brandon Manufacturing Company, producer of world famous Howe Scales, a partner in the Sutherland Falls Marble Company, which was later acquired by the Vermont Marble Company, President of the Rutland Railroad, and Vice President of the Central Vermont Railroad. He served in the Vermont House of Representatives from 1852 to 1854. During the Civil War he was an Allotment Commissioner, responsible for visiting Vermont units to collect money from soldiers and distribute it back home to support their families. A Republican, he served as State Treasurer from 1860 to 1866, and Governor from 1867 to 1869. He then resumed his business interests, also returning to the Vermont House for one term in 1880. In 1885 Page was the defendant in a nationally publicized lawsuit brought by the Rutland Railroad, which attempted to recover \$125,000 (\$4 million in 2007) by claiming Page committed fraud while he was its President, Public sentiment was initially against him, but turned positive as evidence was presented in a trial that lasted more than four months. The trial ended with his vindication, but he died soon afterwards. (bio by: Bill McKern)

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#### The Page Monument.

Ex-Governor Page has just completed the erection of a handsome family monument on his lot in Evergreen cemetery. The lot is situated on Auburn hill, reached by Long drive, and is of a circular form about 180 feet in circumference. center of the lot stands the monument. This is in the Roman Ionic style of archi-The base is of granite, sixteen feet in diameter, on which lies a circular slab, also of granite, ten feet in diameter. From this rise eight marble pillars, supporting the roof, and in the center is a pedestal two feet six inches high, on which a statute of Hope is to be placed. The pillars are nine feet six inches high, unfluted and surmounted by handsomely carved capitals. They support the entablature composed of four pieces and ten feet in diameter. The roof is composed of five pieces, four resting on the entablature and surmounted by a cap on which stands an urn three feet and five inches in height. Over the pedestal is a dome, rising three feet and four inches from the base of the entablature. The whole is twenty feet six inches high. Running round the outside of the entablature is the inscription, "Here rest in God in hope of eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord. I am the Life.'" The whole is of Sutherland Falls marble, highly polished, and carved in accordance with the rules of Roman Ionic architecture. The monument was designed by J. J. R. Randall, architect, from a view of an Italian cemetery brought by Gov. Page from abroad. The marble working was done by Edward Bowman, and the erection has been under the direction of Wm. C. Walker. It is totally different in design from anything else in the cemetery, and when the grounds are completed will be the handsomest as well as the most expensive monument in the grounds.

#### **HIRAM BROMLEY, Danby**

Hiram Bromley was paid \$15 for the stone for his sister, Arabel Bromley of Danby, who died 9 Feb. 1839 in 29<sup>th</sup> y., dau. of Joshua & Anna (Thayer) Bromley. The payment was in the form of a bed.

Was Hiram paid by the estate just for supplying his sister's stone? Probably.

#### MERRITT R. BROWN

"During the summer of 1879 **M. R. Brown** entered upon a contract now in force for the labor of the prisoners, and **L. G. Bagley** is his partner in the enterprise. (See "Marble Industries of Rutland") This contract for finishing marble, was to continue for a term of five years from September 1, 1879, and is terminable by either party upon six months notice. It has since been extended five years longer. By its terms the contractor is to pay twenty-five cents a day for the labor of each prisoner employed up to August 1, 1880, and thirty cents thereafter." [Smith & Rann, 1886, p. 150.] It appears from census that L. G. Bagley was an investor in the "Brown & Bagley, Rutland" gravestone business.





In a time when sons usually followed the trade of their fathers, it is interesting that William and his brother Peter should become gravestone carvers. During Sept. and Oct. 1752, when the father was buying nails, brads and similar items from John Potwine's store, the goods were usually delivered to the son. In 1753 the father transferred half of the family homestead to William for "Love and Affection". At this time, the part of Hartford known then as "The Five Miles", now Manchester, was beginning to change from a wilderness to a partially-industrial community, due in some measure to the increasing business of a valuable quarry near the East Windsor line, known as "The Jambstone Quarry". [Dr Ernest Caulfield, CT Hist. Soc. Bulletin 41:2:33-37; Markers VIII, Connecticut Gravestones XIV, William Buckland, edited by Peter Benes, pp. 204-217]

William's uncle, James Forbes Jr., was a stonecutter and may have been an influence. He must have known Daniel Chandler (1729-1790) who owned the quarry and made an occasional stone. Another carver, Gershom Bartlett (1723-98) was a neighbor and carved the stone of Wm.'s mother Elizabeth (d. 1752). There were two other older stonecutters in the area who could have taught William and Peter the fundamentals: Thomas Ritter (1720-1770) and Joseph Johnson (1698-1770) the latter of East Hartford 1742-1750. [ibid]

William signed a most unusual stone for three children of Amasa and May West who died in Tolland in March 1755 within 48 hours probably of diphtheria. This stone shows an unmistakable Gershom Bartlett influence because its hook-and-eye design is similar to Bartlett's except that the features were exaggerated to create a ludicrous bulbous nose and tiny close-set eyes. Neither a skull nor a face (it was a curious combination of the two), Bartlett's own design was at least as ludicrous as William's copy. Bartlett in fact was probably trying to imitate the unwieldy double nose of a winged skull design on the unidentified "Horse shoe skull" carver who was active in the 1740's in East Hartford. Despite the exaggeration of its design, the West children's stone also shows that by that time William was an accomplished workman. Stones of this irregular shape were exceedingly difficult to complete without breaking off some corners. The edges are embellished with an attractive and symmetrical flower border; and a close examination of the inscription shows that each single letter was cut by a careful hand. There are at least 6 stones in East Hartford and in Tolland cut by William: the West children, his wife Hannah, his father Sarj't William 1758; Amy West (Tolland 1756); Jonathan Cole (East Hartford 1753) and Ann West (Tolland 1755). [ibid]

After his fathers death, William bought many pieces of land in "the five Miles" most near the East Windsor line. Because he shifted from one style to another, it is hard to identify with certainty many stones he probably carved while living in "the five Miles". He made some major errors in the inscriptions among them a backward "p" and a backward capital "N" and misspelled "Memory" on a stone which suggests that like many colonial stonecutters he was more skillful with his hands than with his head. By 1759 his designs had changed and he may have been working with Ritter. Many of his footstones have a common style like that on his wife Hannah's and may have been a sort of trademark. [ibid]

Peter worked with his brother until about 1760 and copied many of his designs. There were 5 other brothers in the family who could have helped with the stones, so that it is impossible to say who did the 70 or more stones in the area that are similar. William served in the Revolution in Capt. Samuel McIntyre's Co., and Capt. Noah Littlefield's Co. [Rev. gs. registration in Montpelier, VT] By Sept. 1783 William had sold most of his land in Orford Parish (the new name for Manchester) in preparation for moving to Poultney, VT. [ibid]

On June 5, 1786, William Buckland of Poultney, VT sold his last acre in Orford to the Widow Evans for 24 shillings. He purchased a farm in Poultney of Elkanah Ashley, owned in 1875 by his grandson Augustus, and in 1936 by Mrs. Joseph Phelps. The farm was 3 miles north of the west village and mainly on the east side of where the railroad crossed Route 30. When he bought the farm, there was a log house on the property, built by Ashley. He was listed in the 1791 Poultney census with 4M +16 & 3 F. [ibid]

The family is buried in the first row of the nearby cemetery known as the "Hosford's Crossing Cemetery". There are eleven Buckland stones, two Pitkin & the John Barrett stone in the cemetery. Except for widow Margaret Buckland, these stones were carved by Enos Clark of Middletown Springs, VT. There are only a few stones in the Poultney area dated before William died, and only one that was probably carved by William. The tympanum is missing and has been for many years, but it looks like his lettering: "In memory of Mrs. / Phebe ye wife of Mr. / Aseph Mitchel who / Died July ye 4 A D / 1784 In ye 31st ss / Year of Her / Age." This is a slate stone, although slate was not reported to have been quarried in this area quite that early. Looking west from his home, across the Hosford Crossing Cemetery, the quarry stick of the Eureka quarry is still in sight.

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

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

WILLIAM AND PETER BUCKLAND were brothers who carved chiefly in the East Hartford, Glastonbury, and Manchester areas.

Several of William's stones, especially a group in the old Tolland burying ground, are of great interest. His early stones are modeled after those of Gershom Bartlett, but have the swollen Bartlett noses exaggerated into grotesque but quite wonderful objects. Certainly, they are among the most amazing of all New England cherubim. The stone for the three West children (1755) and several others are good examples of this style. William Buckland carved on red sandstone, and his later stones are often difficult to distinguish from those of his brother, Peter. His later styles became more restrained, and in the facial designs a simple nonexaggerated hook and eye motif is used; however, the face is still usually relatively large for the lunette and tends to be heavy in the lower half. The margins of the stones are often elaborate and well finished, with the wings flaring at the margins, the mouth slightly open with a glimpse of a tongue. Both he and Peter use a very characteristic border design on their late stones: a floral vine motif that at the top expands into what may be considered a multilayered flower.

Peter Buckland also worked at times in sandstone. But many of his stones are granites. He frequently used a heart design on his more elaborate stones and the "pinwheel" designs on his footstones are characteristic. Both he and William had a strong tendency to make backward letter Ns. Like William, Peter's faces have a bulky appearance, but so far as is known, he did not use the "tongue in the mouth" design.

Caulfield's (1976) posthumous article suggests that stones of the flared-ear style, as well as some of the elaborate Middletown type stones with the raised and striated wings carved by William Crosby, were possibly carved by Peter Buckland. I think it unlikely that he would change his style so drastically and reproduce what to me seem almost carbon copies of stones found far outside the spatial limits of his documented stones.

Some of the finest examples of the Buckland work may be seen in Tolland and East Hartford. There remains a problem of which, if any, stones usually attributed to the Bucklands may actually have been carved by Thomas or Daniel Ritter. See figures 53, 54, 150, 163, and 164.


"nabitants of Connecticut are the best people in the United States without any doubt. They have a lively curiosity and examine our troops and all our actions with evident astonishment. When they visited our camp the girls came without their mothers and entered our tents with the greatest confidence." However, an old family entry says a local girl "had a child, Jamisie, the result of French gallantry."

The town has one of Connecticut's most interesting and important burial grounds; in the past the people of the town worried about brush and shrubbery and solved this by pasturing sheep and calves (only) to keep down the brush.

Center Burying Ground

This old burying ground is located just off the slightly down-at-heel main street of busy East Hartford. Despite the location near a parking lot and the jumble of the twentieth century, the graveyard is reasonably well maintained with good roads running through it. It is still in use, with modern stones to the east and nineteenth-century stones rising up a steep hillside above the old stones that are located in the northwest corner of the burying ground.

East Hartford is a very important eighteenthcentury graveyard and is one of the most striking examples extant of the mixing of Connecticut Valley sandstones with the eastern granites from Bolton and adjacent regions.

There are many fine stones and the work of a number of famous carvers is represented. Among the sandstones are elaborate examples of the work of the Thomas Johnsons (see the Jane Easton [1755] stone as an example of the work of Thomas III) and many stones attributable to Joseph Johnson. The works of Daniel Ritter are abundant and may include the unique stone (fig. 107) for Thankful Robarts (1786), although this stone may also be the work of Peter Buckland whose stones are very numerous and include carvings on both granite and sandstone. Is Peter's stone for Sarg. William Buckland (1758) that for his carving brother? William carved several stones of which the finest is for Jonathan Cole (1753). The fragment of the stone for William's wife Hannah is a fine example of his great-nosed style that is rivaled only by his stones in Tolland.

The sandstones also include a series of small stones with, at most, whorl motifs in the finials that may be the work of one of the Stanclifts,\*

<sup>\*</sup>Dr. Caulfield's manuscript papers suggest that at least some of these stones were produced by Daniel Brewer (1699-1763). No definitive evidence is yet available to determine what stones Daniel ostensibly carved. He probably was a carver, as he sold sets of gravestones to Joshua Hempstead of New London in 1736 (three pairs), 1751 (four pairs), and 1752 (six pairs). The stone for his son David (1737) in Portland, Connecticut, is of this simple type with the only design being a simple "floral" circle in each finial.

Daniel Brewer lived in Portland and in Glastonbury and either he or his son also lived in East Hartford. His name is associated with the Stanclifts and the Johnsons on several documents. He had a son named Seth. There is a stone in Cheshire, Connecticut, for John Beech (1785) signed "S. Brewer sculpt." Caulfield's manuscript suggests that Daniel Brewer may have been the famous "Glastonbury Lady" carver but the evidence is at present only circumstantial.

Note the neatly stacked pile of footstones at the back, the fate of many footstones throughout New England.

Directions: From the junction of Routes 200 and 193 in the village of Thompson, take Route 193 north for approximately 1.5 miles to where East Thompson Road branches to the right at a Y (follow the sign for Thompson Golf Course and Raceway). Continue for 0.5 mile until just beyond the golf course, and you will see a cemetery on either side of the road. The old burying ground is on the left.

#### Tolland

The old village lies near busy Interstate 84, the main throughway between Hartford and Boston. Nevertheless, Tolland is still a largely rural town of fine rolling woodland and pleasant streams. The village itself is one of the most handsome in eastern Connecticut and proudly maintained.

This is the county seat of old Tolland County, and the town is a very old one for interior Connecticut, being incorporated in 1715, with the first settlement probably in 1713. It was purchased from the Indians by Windsor "gentlemen" and was originally part of that town.

Most of the burying grounds are nicely maintained by the town under the jurisdiction of sextons, and the oldest not only was established very early, but is one of the really great burying grounds of the state.

#### Old Tolland Burying Ground

This is one of the great burying ground of eastern Connecticut. It also is one of the most confusing to the student of gravestone carvers, combining as it does the work of numerous carvers from the granite areas with a puzzling variety of carvers from the Connecticut River Valley.

The first records of the old burying ground occur in 1735 which state "Ebenezer Eaton a son of William Eaton died in June the 27th day one thousand seven hundred and sixteen in the nineteenth year of his age and was the first that was laid in the burying ground of the above said Tolland." Daniel Eaton, also a son of William, died July 20, 1716, when twenty-three years old and was the second body laid to rest (William Eaton was the first of that name in Tolland). These burials apparently preceded the actual establishment of the burying ground, for the town meeting of August 1720 "voted that there shall be a burying place where they did formerly bury in, about two acres." The burial place remained unfenced for fourteen years. On December 11, 1734, the town voted to fence with a decent five-rail fence (post and rail). Alas, the post and rail are no longer there, but fortunately the beauty is.

The old burying ground is attractively placed on

low ground with a fine view of the hills to the west and with a marshy woodland behind. Tolland has received care and attention over the years, and the old stones are for the most part in good condition. On pleasant mornings the bird song is particularly fine, and the busy turnpike a short distance away might well be on another planet. There is an aesthetic pleasure to this spacious burying ground that seems to affect almost everyone.

The variety and quality of the stones are also of a nature not to be missed. Perhaps the most striking stones are a series by William Buckland, with enormously enlarged noses, exaggerations of the already startling stones of Gershom Bartlett. The most famous stone is that for the three children of Amasa and Amy West (1755) which combines three grotesque yet charming faces with the sadness of the deaths of three young children, unfortunately

all too common a sorrow in colonial families. Of great importance is the signature of William Buckland "of Hartford" across the bottom. This stone, together with the equally startling stones for Dorothy Sluman (1754) (fig. 163). Amy West (1756), and Ann West (1755), must rank among the great gravestones of New England. The genius of William Buckland is also represented by a number of additional fine stones including the signed stone for Rachel Lothrop (1754) and probably the Charles West (1760) and Deacon Joseph West (1764) (fig. 164) stones. Each of these is, in its own way, a splendid production. Unfortunately the border panels of the Joseph West stone are crumbling away; at the present rate of disintegration this beautiful stone will exist in the not too distant future only in pictures and the minds of those who have seen its lovely composition. This burying

ground may contain as many as eighteen stones by William Buckland, although his later work is difficult to distinguish from that of his brother Peter.

Just as the small Pink Ravine graveyard in Mansfield is surprising for the number of granites produced by carvers whose main distribution is farther west, so Tolland is remarkable for the number of stones by Connecticut Valley sandstone carvers in a burying ground so far east. There are many stones attributed to Ebenezer Drake that include several of his styles (but none of his monkey stones) and which include the small stone for Catherine Grant (1763) of a style that at least east of the river is otherwise found only in South Windsor (Edwards burying ground). There are also a considerable number of Lathrop stones, of which the Deacon Joseph Lothrop (1788) with its pitcher and sacramental cups is unusual, and perhaps inspired

by the much superior Deacon Joseph West stone. Also present are many stones by Ezra Stebbins, including the fine Mary Williams (1793) stone. The number of Stebbins stones is not duplicated anywhere south of Somers east of the Connecticut River. The Joshua Willes (1767) stone (fig. 64) is a fine example of the dark sandstone used by Aaron Bliss.

While the meaning of so many stones from the Massachusetts valley school and from the adjacent area of Connecticut merits study, it should also be noted that there are a few sandstones by carvers from farther south in the Connecticut Valley. Tolland contains a 1727 Thomas Johnson skull, the farthest east, I believe, that this design occurs. There are several stones attributable to Joseph Johnson and sandstones of a Johnson-like style but carved later in the eighteenth century.

Nine large sandstones, of which the Jemima Willes (1791) stone is a fair example, are very puzzling. These stones have the cherubim similar to those carved by the Upswept-Wing carver and also have a similar skull cap and strong but heavier upcurved wings, yet the lunette is bordered by an elaborate and graceful drape-like border very similar to that on the stones illustrated by Benes (see Caulfield, 1975 p. 59) as being the work of Peter Buckland. However, it is uncharacteristic of Peter Buckland to produce stones with such claborate lunettes but with such severe, undecorated border panels. It appears to me more probable that these are elaborate examples, in the more easily worked sandstone, of the work of the Upswept-Wing carver.

One should not leave the sandstones of Tolland without noting the stone for Dr. John Stearns (1788) (fig. 59) with its frightening face and Buckland-Bartlett type border and bottom design. This stone, which I have called the work of the Tolland Ghost, has its only counterpart in eastern Connecticut in the Jacob Read (1774) stone in Ellington.

Among the granite stones those of Haskins and the Mannings are nearly equally common, again emphasizing the transitional position of this important graveyard. No other major burying ground has both of these carvers represented by nearly equal numbers of stones. The situation is further complicated by the presence of the Keziah Stimson (1778) stone which, while as close a Manning copy as are the Haskins stones, is probably the work of yet a third carver. (There are at least two other

stones, rather badly eroded and tentatively attributed to the Mannings, which may also be the work of this carver). The Hannah Cobb (1794) stone is a fine late Manning stone and fortunately is in pristine condition. The work of Gershom Bartlett, the Upswept-Wing carver, Jonathan and Amasa Loomis, and Benjamin Collins (including the signed Jacob Baker ([1742] stone) is found here.

The earliest stones are a series by the Griswold Imitator, the largest number of stones by this carver in any burying ground other than the Nathan Hale yard in Coventry. It is possible that two carvers produced these simple unornamented stones. Finally, there is a single, very badly eroded, stone perhaps attributable to James Hovey of Mansfield. Who carved the Gustin Hatch (1796) sandstone?

Directions: From the junction of Routes 195 and 32, take Route 195 west for 3.1 miles to where Goose Lane enters from the left. Turn onto this road, follow it for 0.6 mile to where it meets Anderson Road; take the latter to the right for 0.7 miles to where Cider Mill Road enters from the right. Take this latter for 0.2 mile and you will see the old burying ground on the right.

This is a pleasant and attractively kept small burying ground with a handsome stone wall surrounding it and flanked by large old maples to the east; many of the old hitching posts are still present. In early spring its rural setting with old houses nearby is enhanced by the calling of mourning doves, phoebes, and song sparrows.

The burying ground was established on February 7, 1762, when Nathan Flynt, for five pounds, gave the town a deed for "one acre for a burying ground in what is now Skaungamaug village."

There is a surprising proportion of sandstones for such an easterly lying graveyard, the works of Stebbins, Drake, and Lathrop being represented in addition to several interesting sandstones by an unknown carver. One also sees the work of the Mannings, the Upswept-Wing carver, Haskins, and Amasa Loomis.

Directions: From Exit 69 on Route 84, go west on Route 74 for 1.8 miles to where the road splits. Take the right fork for 0.1 mile. The burying ground is on the northeast corner of this road and Charter Road.

#### North Burying Ground

This graveyard lies in a pleasant setting on a hill above a highway and screened from it by arborvitae, pines, and other conifers. The old stones are not unusually distinguished, but the setting is most attractive, and a fine example of tasteful planting gives a sense of peace and isolation near a busy highway. It is in large part a nineteenth-century and modern cemetery and is nicely maintained.


The burying ground dates from January 5, 1762, when Timothy Benton gave the town of Tolland a deed for one acre of land for a burying ground for five pounds. A child of Jonathan Ladd, Jr., and his wife Anna, who died August 25, 1762, is said to be the first person buried in this yard.

In the center are a number of eighteenth-century stones, most from the last two decades. These early stones are a mixture of sandstones and granites. The granite stonecarvers include Bartlett, the Mannings, Haskins, and the Upswept-Wing carver. The sandstones are chiefly the work of Lathrop but include stones by Drake, Stebbins, and two by an unknown carver.

Do not miss the unusual quadruple stone by Lathrop for the Ladd children. A Manning stone for Heman Baker, Jr., states that he was "captivated by ye British troops and died on his way home with ye small pox"—another visitation by the old king of terrors. John Aborn (1768), as noted on his Bartlett stone, was "killed by a flash of lightning."

The attached drawing/plat reflects some settlers (in red) after 1780 – others, Nathaniel Smith, Josiah Lewis, Green, Craw, Goodwin (though I posted the house loc. in red, as I hadn't shown it in prior plots) remain. Added Samuel Wood in Fair Haven, just because that name has been subject of several inquiries.

Should be aware that the depicted "roads", were, of course mere "paths", that might (or not) accommodate a buggy or wagon of sorts. Numerous changes occurred in the following years. The ("future" tumpike of 1811, would alter the crossing area, especially, and would change again due to the RR, and later Route 30. The oldest road/path had run over "Maranville Hill", east side of the present Taran place. The 1850's RR caused major change at the Cemetery intersection for an underpass, and likely ran over the old Ashley cabin site. Modern Route 30 alteration eliminated the underpass. The 1850's "Eureka Switch", east of modern day Mahar place, and mill dam (east of the Sherman/Carlson place, made major change of the landscape there, to include the mill pond (as shown on Beers, with Harrison Smith sawmill).

The Distribution of the William Buckland Estate is depicted, even that is later, to show the probable home farm, and likely purchase from Ashley. We know that Buckland had bought and sold other lands, but that appears to have occurred post 1790.


The 1850's quarrying operations changed a great deal of the landscape, of course. The Thomas Hooker lot was entirely "dug up" for the "Eureka". Robert Green's lands almost all consumed by quarries, being in the main slate vein.

Philo Hosford (ca 1830's), succeeded Alfred, who succeeded their father Reuben on the home farm – but Philo, at least, and Alfred before had acquired lands to the west and southwest on the former 1st D. #64. Philo, and Isaac W. (on the 66 Acre Craw lot, with a lease on the SPG lot) appear to be the last of the family name in the vicinity of the crossing.

## Connecticut Gravestones

## XIV

BY ERNEST CAULFIELD, M.D.\*

Part I WILLIAM BUCKLAND (1727–1795)

Since their arrival in Connecticut during the 17th century, most of the Bucklands of Windsor and East Hartford had been weavers. The probate papers for the William Buckland who died during the great influenza epidemic of 1724–1725, for example, list in great detail all the appurtenances of the weaver's trade; they also show that he had been unusually successful in his business. After setting aside for his widow one-third of his estate, thoughtfully including "one third part of the Cellar; and the Liberty of Bakeing in the ovens", he left his shop to his son, John; another son, Sargeant William (1700–1758), similarly continued the weaver's trade, perhaps doing some woodwork on the side. With this background it seems most unusual at first glance that two boys of the next generation, William, Jr., and Peter, should go into the business of making gravestones, because in those days, young men usually followed the family trade.

Little is known about the early life of these two sons of Sargeant William. William, Junior, who was baptized July 30, 1727, the first of eleven children,

worked at least part of the time in association with his father. During September and October, 1752, when the father was buying nails, brads, and similar items from John Potwine's store, the goods were usually delivered to the son. The following year the father, "for Love and Affection", transferred to the son one-half of the family homestead. At this time, the part of Hartford known then as "The Five Miles", now Manchester, was beginning to change from a wilderness to a partially-industrialized community, due in some measure to the increasing business of a valuable quarry near the East Windsor line. The stones from this quarry were used primarily for making jambs, or fireplace walls, and it became known as "The Jambstone Quarry" and the adjoining area as "The Jambstone Plain." Because the quarry was just to the north of some of his father's lands, it would have been natural for inquisitive young William to become interested in this rapidly growing industry. Besides, his aunt Anne Buckland had married a stonecutter, the younger James Forbes. Other men may have influenced William to take up stonecutting as a trade. He must have known Daniel Chandler (1729-1790) who not only owned the quarries, but who also appears to have made occasional gravestones. In that neighborhood also lived the carver Gershom Bartlett (1723-1798), who undoubtedly knew the Buckland boys, because the gravestones for their mother, Elizabeth Buckland, who died in East Hartford in 1752, were cut by Bartlett in the manner of his very popular hook-and-eye design (Fig. 1). It is doubtful that Buckland was apprenticed either to Chandler or to Bartlett, because there was not a great deal of difference in their ages.

There were at least two older stonecutters in that neighborhood who could have taught the fundamentals of the trade to all three young men, however, Thomas Ritter (1720–1770), first of a family that later became famous throughout most of Connecticut for their gravestones, had come from Rowley, Massachusetts, to East Hartford in 1739; and Joseph Johnson (1698–c.1770), a skillful Middletown arrist, who temporarily resided in East Hartford from 1742 until 1750. On closer study, therefore, it appears that though William Buckland, Junior did not inherit any predisposition to work in stone, at least he was brought up in an environment favorable to his development as a stone

First-hand evidence that young William carved gravestones is a signature, obviously put there as an advertisement, on a very unusual triple stone (Figs. 2, 3, and 4) made for the three children of Amasa and Amy West who died in Tolland in March, 1755, all within forty-eight hours and probably from diphtheria. This stone shows an unmistakable Gershom Bartlett influence because its hook-and-eye design is similar to Bartlett's except that the features were exaggerated to create a ludicrous bulbous nose and tiny close-set eyes. Neither a skull nor a face (it was a curious combination of the two), Bartlett's own design was at least as ludicrous as William's copy. Bartlett in fact was probably trying to imitate the unwieldy double nose of a winged skull design of the unidentified "Horse shoe skull" carver who was active in the 1740's on the east side of the Great River (East Hartford, East Windsor). (This carver is believed to be William Holland.) An imitation twice removed from its original design source (Fig. 5), Buckland's and Bartlett's bulbous nose was a "folk" or unconscious stylistic corruption of what was otherwise a commonplace design in central Connecticut in 1750. Despite the exaggeration of its design, the West children stone also shows that by that time William Buckland was an accomplished workman. Stones of this irregular shape were exceedingly

difficult to complete without breaking off some corners; the edges are embellished with an attractive and symmetrical flower border; and a close examination of the inscription shows that each single letter was cut by a careful hand. In fact, the obvious errors on the stone can be attributed to too much care rather than too little, because it was very easy to omit a whole word while intensely concentrating on single letters.

Regardless of its poor spacing, the signature on the West stone, "Made by W.m. Buckland Ir. of Hartford", is very valuable because it helps to identify more of his early stones. There are about six gravestones in East Hartford and in Tolland that so closely resemble the West stone that they may reasonably be attributed to William Junior while he was still under the Bartlett influence. The stone for William's twenty-four year old first wife, Hannah Burnham (East Hartford, 1755), virtually duplicates the West stone, as does that of Amy West (Tolland, 1756) (Fig. 6). The stone for William's uncle, Jonathan Cole (East Hartford, 1753) and Ann West (Tolland, 1755) (Fig. 7) are not quite so ludicrous since their noses are more pointed than they are bulbous, but in most other ways both are stylistically similar to their predecessors. The borders of all four stones could easily be mistaken for Bartlett borders, but the features, particularly the disproportionate size of the nose and eyes, indicate that the stones were engraved by William.

When his father died in 1758, William Junior, being the eldest son, inherited a double share of the estate; and, subsequently, he bought many pieces of land "in the five Miles so called", most of them near the East Windsor line. Nothing was said about a quarry in those transactions, so he probably bought his unfinished stones from someone else, either in Windsor or from the "Jambstone Quarry" in East Windsor. Nor was anything said to indicate that he was in the gravestone business, although apparently he not only remained in it but prospered. If one looks beyond the outlandish facial designs of his early stones it becomes increasingly apparent that Buckland's heart was in his work and that it was his chosen profession—otherwise he would not have spent so much time and care with his borders and lettering. It is easy to imagine that he had decided on stonecutting as a lifetime career by 1755 or 1756, even though his bulbous-nose designs are not found after those

years.

Because he shifted from one style to another, it is not always easy to identify with certainty the many stones he probably made during the remainder of his stay in "the five Miles". An indication of how greatly William had altered his style after 1756 is found on the gravestone for Rachel Lothrop of Tolland who died in 1754 (Fig. 8). (Though dated 1754, this stone was probably made a few years later.) Like the West stone, the Lothrop stone was signed by William, although his signature in this instance is written in tiny letters and placed so near the ground that it is usually obscured by grass. The stone has numerous similarities with the West children marker. For example, he again did not allow enough space for his name and he had to omit the "a" and reverse the "d" in the word "Buckln". He also made major errors in the inscription, but this time they cannot be excused on the ground of over-concentration. Among these errors is a backward "p" and a backward capital "N". (On another stone of this type he misspelled "Memmory", for which there is no excuse, and which suggests that like many colonial stonecutters he was more skillful with his hands than with his head.)

Major differences nevertheless exist between the newer Lothrop marker

and the West children stone. The border work is considerably altered, for example. Rather than a simple vine-and-leaf pattern which repeated itself five or six times, he devised a more sophisticated vertical-leaf vine which repeated itself only two or three times (Fig. 9). It is in the spirit carving, however, that the most sweeping changes are found. Gone are the disproportionately sized hook-and-eye face details, as well as the ludicrous scowl. In their place are more moderate hook-and-eye features and a normal mouth which includes within it what might be intended as a protruding tongue. Perhaps the only important holdover from his bulbous nose variants are the familiar residual teeth which are found in the form of a zigzag or serration on the bottom of the chin.

Beyond his two signed stones, we can only speculate as to the extent of William's stonecutting activities. A search of Hartford District probate records reveals that his name was found in the papers of four estates. He was paid £ 1-10-0 from the estate of Benjamin Cheney in 1760; £ 1-10-0 from that of Samuel Elmer in 1761; and £ 3-14-7 from that of Simon Gains in 1761. These records do not say that he was paid for gravestones although £ 1-10-0 would have been a fair price for them about that time. While the headstones for Benjamin Cheney and Simon Gains have not survived, the stones for their wives, Elizabeth Cheney who died in 1759, and Sarah Gains who died in 1758, may still be seen in Manchester. The headstone for Jabez Burnham (d. 1758) still stands in East Hartford, and that for Samuel Elmer (d. 1759), in East Windsor. It seems much more than a coincidence that all four headstones should so closely resemble one another as to be almost indistinguishable in design and lettering; that they should also closely resemble the headstone for Sargeant William Buckland, William Buckland's father, who died in 1758 (Cover); and further, that all four should closely resemble the signed stone of Rachel Lothrop of Tolland. Inasmuch as William, a gravestone cutter, was a creditor of all five widely separated estates, the documentary evidence strongly supports the stylistic evidence that he made all five headstones.

If William in fact made these stones (as seems most likely), it means that his initial gravestone style had changed radically in the space of four or five years—excepting perhaps his lettering which remained much as it was on the West children stone. This is compatible with at least one additional piece of evidence. Gershom Bartlett had moved to Bolton in 1752 and was probably no longer an influence on young William who instead may have come under the spell of Thomas Ritter of East Hartford. The facial designs, crowns, and particularly the borders on William's 1758–1759 stones have little in common with either Bartlett's or even William Buckland's own earlier style. They have much in common, however, with the style that may have been used by Ritter circa 1760 and may have been devised by Ritter himself or perhaps by Ritter and Buckland working in partnership after 1755. A few years had made a tremendous difference in William's advance from the ridiculous to the more sublime.

Turning for a moment from his spirit carvings and borders, we find that William Buckland's footstones also provide evidence pointing him out as the carver of the later (1756–1759) Tolland/East Hartford stone groups. Footstone designs were sometimes used by stonecutters as a trademark—not an absolute trademark in the modern sense, because one stonecutter would sometimes imitate another inasmuch as there was no law to prevent him from doing so, but enough of a trademark to help identify the work of a stylistically

versatile carver like William. Buckland's footstones are particularly interesting because they also illustrate his change in styles. Although superficially dissimilar, the footstones for Hannah Buckland (Fig. 12) and Jonathan Cole (made circa 1755) have enough elements in common with the footstone for the West children to confirm our belief they were all made by William. While cut in a related but different style, the footstones for Benjamin Cheney, Jabez Burnham and Sarah Gains (made circa 1760) also closely resemble one another. An interesting additional fact is that the footstones for Elizabeth Cheney and Sargeant William Buckland belong to the earlier period, whereas their corresponding headstones belong to the later period. William apparently was unable to decide which style of footstone appealed to him the more; or, he may have stockpiled the earlier style and was trying to "use them up".

Comparable evidence is gained from stones William Buckland made for children. It was a common gravestone custom in those days to mark children's graves with small headstones, and sometimes to decorate them in the style usually found on the footstones of adults. With that in view one may at least tentatively attribute to William the headstone for Richard Rust (Manchester, 1756) because the delicate, flowery tracings are similar to those found on William's early footstones. Similar headstones for children may be seen in Tolland—for example, that of Thankful West who died in 1754 (Fig. 13).

A good case can be made for William Buckland as the carver of other attractive stones on the east side of the river. The stone for Isaac Fellows of Tolland (Fig. 14) who died in 1755 has the same irregular profile, the same space fillers and the same lettering that appear on the signed West stone; that of Clemence Olmsted who died in Manchester in 1755 (Fig. 15) has comparable eye and eyebrow characteristics. Both these stones have the same protruding "tongue" found on the signed Lothrop stone. In the absence of more definitive records, however, it is perhaps not wise to attribute to William too many of the 70 or more red sandstone markers in the burying grounds of East Hartford, Tolland, East Windsor, and Glastonbury which share his characreristic borders and spirit designs, and whose inscription dates are spread over a 15 year period between 1754 and 1769. Thomas Ritter used, on at least one occasion, virtually the same design and lettering on a stone he placed in New Hartford. In addition, William's brother, Peter Buckland, freely copied William's style, and, indeed, appears to have worked for William until about 1760 and with him on and off for another seven years. For example, a gravestone in East Windsor (Abigail Loomis, 1760) which exhibits many of William's presumed characteristics, has misspelled in its inscription the word "Boody" for "Body", a very unusual gravestone error. This same error occurs on a later stone nearby which was cut in Perer's style. Moreover, there were five more brothers in the Buckland family and any one of them could have tried his hand at gravestones. Because of the great similarity in their styles, all three carvers are possible candidates for these stones, and it seems even more than possible that all three worked in partnership. Until better evidence is uncovered, one has to be content to describe most of these stones as the Buckland (and possibly Ritter) design.

By September, 1783, William had sold most of his land in Orford Parish (the new name for Manchester), apparently in anticipation of his moving away. On June 5, 1768, "William Buckland . . of Poultney, Vermont" sold his last acre in Orford to the Widow Evans for 24 shillings. He is said to have died in Poultney on March 11, 1795.




Fig. 1. Elizabeth Buckland, East Hartford 1752. Cut by Gershom Bartlett, East Windsor and Bolton. Elizabeth was the mother of the carvers William and Peter Buckland. This is the stone William presumably was attempting to reproduce when he first made grave markers in 1754.




Fig. 5. William Buckland's bulbous nose probably derived from the crowned winged skulls of Thomas Johnson of Middletown. Johnson's design (a), carved circa 1728–1737, was imitated at a remove by the unidentified "Horse shoe" skull man (of Windsor?) in 1748 (b); his in turn was closely imitated by Gershom Bartlett in 1749 (c) and in 1751 (d); Bartlett's design in turn was closely imitated by William Buckland in 1755 (e). Stones: (a) Susanna Wadsworth, Farmington 1732; (b) Capt. Joseph Loomis, East Windsor 1748; (c) Abraham Pease, Enfield, 1750; (d) Elizabeth Buckland, East Hartford 1751; Three children of Amasa and Amy West, Tolland 1755.

Fig. 8. Rachel Lothrop, Tolland 1754. Signed: "W.m Bucklnb". While the carver's own name is misspelled, this stone is in most other ways an expertly engraved marker. William's improvements and innovations include the use of more evenly balanced face features; a smaller nose; and the so-called "tongue" in the mouth.






Fig. 9. Borders, (a) Ann West, Tolland 1755; (b) Rachel Lothrop, Tolland 1754; (c) Isaac Fellows, Tolland 1755; (d) Sarj' William Buckland, East Hariford 1758. Attributed to William Buckland, Although most Connecticut gravestone makers used the same basic leaf-and-vine pattern to decorate their borders, no two of them carved the same design. In these variations by William Buckland, the West border (a) represents a close copy of Gershom Bartlett's work, (Compare Fig. 1) and is characteristic of William's early bulbous-nose stones. As he acquired experience, William introduced innovations such as a longer leaf and a multiple-petal flower (b through d), adapting for this purpose motifs he used elsewhere as space fillers.



Fig. 10. Sarj' Jabez Burnham, East Hartford 1758. Attributed to William Buckland. Besides the new five-element crown and serrated wings, the design has the same "tongue" as the signed Rachel Lothrop stone in Tolland. In this particular example, the skeletal teeth are located in what appears to be an elongated "neck", a characteristic typical of the designs carved by William's brother Peter Buckland, and it is possible that the latter had a hand in making this stone.



Fig. 12. Hannah Buckland (footstone), East Hartford 1755. Attributed to William Buckland. This is presumed to be an abstract flower design of William's own composition, though the purpose of the assymetrical three dots is not known.

In this instance, the only positive clues that the stone is the product of William's hand are the eyebrows and nose details, the protruding "tongue", the serrated outer edges of the wings, and the space-filling decorations in the feathers and crown.



Fig. 16. Deacon Daniel House, East Glastonbury 1762. Signed: "MAD: BY:PETER:BUCKLAND". Besides the use of paired bearts and paired grape-clusters, the fleur-de-lis crown is characteristic of stones by Peter Buckland. As a rule, be also omitted the serrated edges that his brother William carved into the outer edges of the wings. The curved cross-bar of the letter "H" suggests that while the stone itself may have been "MAD" by Peter, its inscription may have been carved by his brother.



Fig. 17. Elzebuth Hubbard, East Glastonbury. Attributed to Peter Buckland. The paired hearts-on-stems are almost identical to those found on the signed Daniel House stone, though important differences between the two stones remain-for example, the serrated interior line of the wing which is found here but not found on the House stone. The conventional cross-bar on the letter "H" suggests Peter Buckland may have carved the inscription himself.



Fig. 18. Reverend Isaac Chalker, East Glastonbury 1763. Attributed to Peter Buckland, The characteristically paired bearts are repeated a second time below each wing. Hanging like grape clusters or dew drops, the motifs presumably reinforce the "translation" of the spirit, and recall Edward Taylor's description of the redemptive powers of Christ (Meditation 34):

"For thou hast farely Washt Deaths grim grim face

And made his Chilly finger-Ends drop grace."



Fig. 21. Lieutenant Nathaniel Olcott, East Glastonbury. Attributed to Peter Buckland. A typical Buckland design. the face reveals the quizzical raised evebrows, serrated teeth, book-andeye features, and short straight mouth. The thin curling lines in the leaf pattern, in the upper border of the inscription, and in the wings, are presumed characteristics of Peter's work rather than that of William.

#### **Bug-Eyed Leaves**

Enos Clark was paid to carve his parents gravestones, but he died before he did the work. His estate was charged that payment, but probate records fails to indicates who actually did the carving.

There are a number similar stones with varying features to the bug-eyed leaves.

In Middletown Springs old cemetery:

Jonas Clark: In / memory of / JONAS CLARK, Sen. / who died/ Sept. 23, 1813 / aged 70 years / & 3 days. [The other parts of the inscription are in cursive lettering. There is a bow center bottom holding the leaf spray.]

Avis Clark: In / memory of / AVIS CLARK, / widow of / who died/ Jan. Sept. 2, 1814 / aged 72 years / & 6 mo & 16 days. [This is a duplicate of her husband's stone.]

#### ZERUBBABEL COLLINS OF SHAFTSBURY, VT

On October 4, 1733, Benjamin and Elizabeth Collins were blessed with a fifth son, and then afflicted him with the name Zerubbabel. The boy quickly overcame this handicap and, and being quick to learn, and cleaver with his hands, he eventually became a much more skilled stone cutter than his father. His father died in 1759 and he probably carved his gravestone. After 1759, working independently, he developed a style very much his own. This style remained essentially the same as long as long as Zerubbabel cut gravestones.

In 1779 he sold the home farm in Lebanon Crank, Connecticut and removed to Shaftsbury, Vermont where he died in 1797. His son James followed the family tradition of gravestone carving. [Markers VIII, p. 129-132, reprint of the papers of Dr. Ernest Caulfield. Legh-Harris, Valerie, Walloomsack Review, Vol. 8, May 2012; Three Generations of the Collins Carving Tradition, pp. 16-27]

Zerubbabel carved lovely white marble stones with seraphs and lots of flowers. He is considered a master carver with perfect lettering. The majority of his stones were carved of good quality white marble from a quarry on his land in Shaftsbury. There are a number of signed stones in Bennington County Vermont. There is at least one of his stones in almost every pre-1797 southern Vermont cemetery.

There are four 1806 stones that may be Benjamin's work in the old part of the Green Hill Cemetery, Wallingford, VT. Much more investigation is needed to find more of his work. Similar carving to the Rachel Lake. It is badly worn and very hard to see details.

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## ROBERT CARVER OF MARSHFIELD, MASS.,\* AND SOME OF HIS DESCENDANTS

Compiled by WILLIAM JONES, A.B., of Bronxville, N. Y.+

1. Robert Carver, of Marshfield in the Plymouth Colony, the immigrant ancestor of most, if not all, of the early Carver families of New England, was born, probably in England, about 1594, and was buried at Marshfield in April 1680, "being 86 yeares old." (Marshfield vital records.§) He married Christian ———, who was buried at Marshfield 23 July 1658 (ib.).

\*All places mentioned in this genealogy are situated within the present limits of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, unless another State or region is indicated in the text or may be easily inferred from the context. At the time of Robert Carver's death (1680) and for several years thereafter Marshfield was in the Plymouth Colony; but, as the Plymouth Colony was eventually annexed to the Province of the Massachusetts Bay, Marshfield from the beginning of its settlement was within the present limits of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

tMuch of the material on which this genealogy is based was collected by Clifford Nickels Carver (vide infra, Addendum, 5, i), Litt. B. (Princeton, 1913), of New York City and of Searsport, Maine, who placed it in the hands of the compiler, with the request that he include in the genealogy such additional facts pertinent to the subject as his researches might bring to light and prepare the whole article for publication. This has been done by the compiler, who has arranged all the material in the form required for publication in the Register.

\*Nearly all the Carvers whose names appear in any of the New England States in the United States Census of 1790 may be found in this genealogy. There was, to be sure, a Carver family in Watertown in 1638 and the years immediately following, one Richard Carver of Serathy, co. Norfolk, England, husbandman, aged 60, with his wife Grace, aged 40, his twin daughters Elizabeth and Susanna, aged 18, and three servants (Isaae Hart, aged 22, Thomas Flegg, aged 21, and Marabel Underwood, aged 20), having passed, on 11 Apr. 1637, the examination to go to New England and having embarked at Yarmouth, co. Norfolk, in the same year. He settled at Watertown, and in his will, dated 18 Dec. 1638 and proved before Gov. John Winthrop 9, 7 mo. [9 Sept.] 1641, he styled himself "of watertowne, in New England, yeoman," and left all his property to his wife and two daughters. As he had no sons, the family surname must have disappeared with the deaths or marriages of the daughters. (Cf. Savage's Genealogical Dictionary, vol. 1, p. 344, in which the dates pertaining to the will are given incorrectly, Pope's Pioneers of Massachusetts, p. 91, and the abstract of Richard Carver's will, as printed in the Register, vol. 2, p. 262.)

§Although the vital records of Marshfield have not yet been published in book form, either in the series of Vital Records of Massachusetts Towns prior to 1850 approved by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts or otherwise, yet genealogists who are unable to consult the original records at Marshfield will find in print in the Register, vol. 6, pp. 347-352 (October 1852), all the marriages (some copied in full and others given in condensed form) recorded in the town books of Marshfield from 23 Nov. 1642 to the end of 1728, inclusive. These marriages were communicated to the Register by Miss M. A. Thomas, who also communicated in similar fashion to the Register, vol. 8, pp. 191-192, 228-230 (April and July 1854), deaths and burials recorded in the town books of Marshfield from 26 Nov. 1649 to 20 Nov. 1726, inclusive. Moreover, in The Mayfouer Descendant, vol. 2, p. 3 (January 1900), the publication of a verbatim copy of the vital records found in the town books of Marshfield, transcribed by George Ernest Bowman, the editor of that magazine, was begun, and has been continued from time to time, in instalments of varying length, until the records of some of the families appearing in recent issues of the magazine have been brought down into the last quarter of the eighteenth century.

In similar fashion Mr. Bowman has transcribed and is publishing in instalments in The Mayflower Descendant verbatim copies of the vital records of other towns formerly in the Plymouth Colony, among which may be mentioned here Plymouth, beginning in vol. 1, p. 139 (July 1899), and Middleborough, beginning in vol. 1, p. 219 (October 1899), of the magazine, so that those who are unable to consult the original records of these towns may find in The Mayflower Descendant verbatim copies that by this time extend into the later years of the eighteenth century.

When the vital records of a town have been published in book form, either in the alphabetical arrangement approved by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts or otherwise, the printed volumes are referred to in this genealogy (to take Bridgewater as an example) as Bridgewater Vital Records. When the vital records of a town have not been published in

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

Dear Mr. Cain,

Thank you for your letters and for alerting me and the Vermont Old Cemetery Association to the condition of the cemetery in the village of Hydeville. As an officer in VOCA I must necessarily be neutral.

I can well understand your frustrations; letters/words sometimes convey unintentional meanings. "Body English" is absent to clarify the words, and it is easy to become confused or misled. But words, as you know, are often our only tools.

You should be ELATED by the following:

- 1) Your mission has been accomplished. It is my understanding that a group of individuals plan a visit to the Hydeville Cemetery Saturday, weather permitting, to begin the long, intensive, time-consuming task of cleaning up the underbrush.
- 2) The Select Board is well aware of their mandate to care for all cemeteries in their given town.
- 3) Interest in area cemteries has been heightened and the preservation of this cemetery will help other cemeteries in the State (there are many in the same condition) to receive care that would otherwise not be forthcoming.

I will endeavor to keep you posted as the work progresses, but it will be a lengthy process before the task can be completed. The pacing of the work will be somewhat as follows:

- . Clean-up and removal of brush
- . Repairing and resetting whatever stones can be rescued
- . Copying of legible inscriptions
- . Removal of threatening trees (others enhance, offer privacy, and help to secure boundaries)

I might add that even though the cemetery is recorded as being a four-acre plot, only a small portion of it may ever have been used. This is common.

I realize that you live a considerable distance from Hydeville, but you might like to make a trip next summer and explore those cemeteries mentioned in the October 3 letter of Peggy Jenks. You just might be able to uncover the gravesites of other forebears.

In my own family, one great grandmother is buried miles from her former home; another may even be buried in New York State although her husband and several children lived and are buried in Underhill. One can only guess at why this happened.

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
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

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

# THE GRAVESTONE CARVER JOSIAH CASWELL, Jr. "MOURNING MAN"

Middletown Springs, Rutland County, Vermont was the home of several gravestone carvers in the early 1800s: Enos Clark, who signed one stone "EC" appears to have been the most prolific of the carvers and quite possibly taught the other to carve. Marcus Stoddard, brother-in-law of Jonas Clark, Jr. signed a number of stones in the old cemetery. From other evidence, Marcus Stoddard may well have taken over the business when Enos' health failed. David Mehurin and William Vaughan also left signed stones in the area. As has been found in many cases, gravestone carving is a family affair. Enos Clark's niece, daughter of his twin brother, Theophilus Clark, married Josiah Caswell, Jr., son of an early Middletown settler.

Did Josiah, Jr. learn to engrave from Clark or Stoddard? Josiah's son, Ryland signed several stones in the

Wallingford, VT area. See also the Ryland Caswell file.

JOSIAH CASWELL, JR., (Josiah Sr., Bela, John), was b. 1801 Middletown, VT, d. 1 Aug. 1882 age 81-3-9, of paralysis, born Middletown, stone cutter, Danby VR, son of Josiah & Sabrina (Clark) Caswell; gs Scottsville, Cem., Danby, VT; 2nd stone: 1801 - 1882.

Josiah, Jr. was about 14 when Enos Clark, gravestone carver of Middletown, died in 1815. Josiah married the niece of Enos Clark, daughter of Enos' twin brother. At age 50 Josiah was an engraver and later his son was in the marble business. It is quite possible that Josiah learned to engrave marble from Enos Clark, and then after Enos died, from Marcus Stoddard of Middletown. As an apprentice of Clark or Stoddard, did Josiah carve his mother Sabrina's gravestone?

Josiah moved from Tinmouth to Danby in 1852 and settled with his son Ryland. (Williams, J.C., History & Map of Danby, Vermont, 1869, p. 122) They were buried in the Scottsville Cemetery in Danby. (Jenks, Danby & Mt.




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

#### THE GRAVESTONE CARVER RYLAND E. CASWELL

by Margaret R. Jenks

Middletown Springs, Rutland County, Vermont was the home of several gravestone carvers in the early 1800s: Enos Clark, who signed one stone "EC" appears to have been the most prolific of the carvers and quite possibly taught the other to carve. Marcus Stoddard, brother-in-law of Jonas Clark, Jr. signed a number of stones in the old cemetery. From other evidence, Marcus Stoddard may well have taken over the business when Enos' health failed. David Mehurin and William Vaughan also left signed stones in the area. As has been found in many cases, gravestone carving is a family affair. Enos Clark's niece, daughter of his twin brother, Theophilus Clark, married Josiah Caswell, Jr., son of an early Middletown settler.

Did Josiah, Jr. learn to engrave from Clark or Stoddard? Josiah's son, Ryland signed several stones in the

Wallingford, VT area.

The family and their effects came with an ox team. Beal settled where J. Q. Caswell lived in 1867. The family was known for their remarkable longevity. Bela's, parents, John & Mary, settled in Middletown and were among the first laid in the old burial ground. Bela was on the roll of Middletown Freemen in 1801.

He is a man of excellent character and undoubted integrity, unobtrusive and modest in his deportment, possessing the confidence and esteem of all who know him. They had one daughter Dimis (sic) E." She endeavored to assist him, but he passed away before medical aid could be summoned.

Dr. N. B. Ross was called and later a death certificate was issued by Coroner E. L. Smith. Mr. Chaplin is survived by a wife and three children.

Green Arnold appears to have had two spouses, first Alma Paternean or Higgins (b Feb 1854 NY), mother of his three children who possibly preceded him in death, and second Emma (abt 1875 NY - 9 Jun 1934).

The 1892 Binghamton census shows Elma Chaplin, 33 followed by Green Chaplin, 40. The 1900 Binghamton census shows Green A Chaplin (b Feb 1854 NY, age 46) and Alma P Chaplin (b Sep 1859 NY, age 40) were married 19 years and were the parents of three children, G Arnold, Harry B, and Julia.

#### THE GRAVESTONE CARVER "EC" ENOS CLARK

#### by Margaret R. Jenks

The Old Middletown Springs and East Poultney, Rutland County, Vermont cemeteries have many beautiful white marble gravestones with faces on them. The stone for Mindwell Grant was signed "EC". Dr. Ernest Caulfield thought "EC" might possibly be Edward Collins, son of Zerubbabel Collins of Shaftsbury, VT. (CT Historical Society Bulletin 28:1:29) At least one stone carved by Zerubbabel Collins, son of Benjamin Collins, a carver of Columbia, CT, may be found in almost every pre-1800 cemetery in Bennington and Rutland Counties. In some ways the "EC" stones resemble the work of Collins.

With a list of the "EC" type stones for adult males, a search was made of the Rutland County probate records. Only two had estates, Joseph Rann and Zebediah Dewey. There was a one page administrators account for Zebediah Dewey who died 28 Oct. 1804 in 78th year. The account was dated 17 Oct. 1806. There were two items of interest: "to Jonas Clark for toom stones \$20.50; to digging graves \$1.25." (Rutland Co. Probate, Rutland district 5:146) Who was Jonas Clark?

Since the majority of the "EC" stones are in East Poultney and Middletown Springs, it seemed likely that the carver lived in that area. A search of the census and vital records has failed to show an Edward Collins in Rutland County. However there were two Jonas Clark's in Middletown Springs. General Jonas Clark d. Feb. 23, 1854 age 79, thus born about 1775, and Jonas Clark, Sr. d. Sept. 23, 1813 age 70, thus born about 1743. Either was the right age in 1806 to have carved or sold gravestones.

An examination of the "History of Middletown", by Barnes Frisbie, 1867 pp. 75-77 said that Jonas Clark came from Canterbury, CT in 1790 with his son Jonas, Jr. His sons Enos and Theophilus has come about two years earlier. Both Jonas, Jr. and Enos were masons, an occupation that could easily lead to gravestone carving! However, Jonas Jr. studied law and was admitted to the bar soon after 1804. Enos died April 12, 1815 in 51st year. The "EC" stones are dated only till about 1809. Could Enos Clark be "EC"? Was Jonas a carver, or just an agent?

A letter to Mr. Herbert Davison, Middletown Springs historian was the next step. He wrote back that the word "mason" rang a bell and he remembered an old hand written manuscript in the Historical Society: "Genealogy of the Clark Family... 1639-1891" by M. Clark, Feb. 11, 1891. M. Clark was Merritt Clark (1803-1898), son of Jonas Jr. Merritt Clark placed Enos (1764-1815) and Jonas (1774-1854) as sons of Jonas Clark Sr. The Canterbury, CT vital records verify this. Merritt Clark wrote "Enos was a stone cutter, some of his work may be seen at the old cemetery in Middletown on grave stones and generally ornamented with the head of a Seraph or weeping willow..." Merritt Clark was 12 when his Uncle Enos died, so that the statement may be taken as first hand knowledge.

"EC" had two distinct types of writing. He used a flourish with the beginning "IN" of "IN MEMORY OF" and often used italics for the name of the deceased. In most cases he used wife -to- or son/daughter -to- rather than - of-. He almost universally used the long s that looks more like as f. The Seraph's wings are usually smooth, but change shape as the years pass. The face is always oval with the hair in the same form as used by Zerubbabel Collins except that "EC" often had three curls on each side while Collins has only one. There is a little cap or crown that looks like a sailor's cap.

Several other carvers were active in Middletown Springs in the early 1800s: Marcus Stoddard, brother-in-law of Jonas Clark Jr.; David Mehurin; Josiah Caswell and William Vaughan. There are several stones in the area with "EC" characteristics dated after 1815. It would seem that these men learned the craft from Enos Clark and took over the business when Enos died. Enos Clark's estate inventory did not list any tools for gravestone carving. Enos Clark's niece married Josiah Caswell, an engraver in 1850, son of an early Middletown settler. Did Josiah learn to engrave from Clark? Josiah's son, Ryland signed several stones in the Wallingford area.

"Enos Clark, an older brother of the late General Jonas Clark, as early as 1807 [prob. much earlier], manufactured marble by hand in Middletown. Jonas was apprenticed to Enos. Their stock was taken from a quarry on a part of the farm then owned by Elihu Andrews in the north part of Tinmouth; the quarry property composed about two acres. In 1810 the "Andrews Quarry," as it was then called, was owned by General Clark, who employed two workmen, David Mehurin and Marcus Stoddard, who afterward became joint owners. Stoddard subsequently built a small mill in Middletown and procured his stock from the "Andrews Quarry," The quarry property was subsequently sold to Moses Ambler, and again to Edward Woodruff, and in the 1880s was the property of Isaac D. Stubbs. The quarry produced white and mottled (or blue and white) marble. Specimens may be found in Poultney, Castleton, Middletown and probably other places, which will compare favorably with any now [1880s] in the county." (Smith & Rann, Hist. of Rutland Co., p.181)

ENOS CLARK, son of Jonas3, (Theopholis2 Benjamin1) and Abias (Page)/Avis (Dodge) Clark [see separate listing] was born July 5, 1764 Canterbury, CT VR and died April 12, 1815 in 51st y. (Jenks, M. R, Middletown Cem. Ins., 1983 p.13)

Enos married first Nov. 7, 1790 Preston, CT, CLARISSA COOK, born March 3, 1764 Preston, CT VR and died Aug. 1, 1796 in 33rd y. gs. (Ibid.), dau. of Barton and Hannah (Tracy) Cook. She was called HARTY.

Enos and his twin brother Theopholis went to Middletown a few years before 1790 to prepare the way for their father, Jonas. Enos was a man of vigorous intellect and followed the trade of mason until his death. (*Hist. Middletown* p.75-76)


On July 19, 1894, Merritt Clark wrote the following about his uncle: "Enos No 20 was a stone cutter- some of his work may be seen at the old cemetery at Middletown on grave stones and generally ornamented with the head of a seraph or weeping willow. He was also a House builder- and possessed a remarkable memory. He kept no Books of account but was always found correct."

On June 30, 1789, Nathan Wood, Jr. of Middletown, yeoman, for L47 10s sold to Enos Clark of Middletown some land in Middletown of about 40 acres bounded by land of Josiah Johnson, the highway, and Abraham White's land. Signed by Nath'L Wood, Jr. witnessed by Theopholis Clark and Rachel Clark. (Middletown Deeds 1:195)

From 1793 to his death, Enos bought and sold a number of parcels of land in Middletown Springs and Tinmouth, including a share in a quarry in Tinmouth. After his death, his estate sold this land.

The inventory of the estate of Enos Clark totaled \$4,610,72 taken on May 3, 1815. Included in the estate were: 210 acres and buildings, etc. \$3740; one third of an undivided 4 acres stone quarry situated in Tinmouth \$60.; 1 stone hammer chisels \$.50; normal household and farm equipment; cattle; ¼ part of pew #10 and ¼ pain Tinmouth; of pew #26 in the Baptist Church, ¼ part of a pew in the Congregational Church. [Rutland Co. Probate, Rutland Dist. 9:183-85] He appears to have stopped carving gravestones several years before his death. The stones carved by David Mehurin and Marcus Stoddard, both of Middletown Springs, resemble the work of Enos Clark in many details. I believe that Mehurin and Stoddard were apprentices of Clark and took over his shop. Son Barton carved several stones and another probable apprentice was — Caswell.





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Electa was appointed administrator on April 20, 1815. [Ibid. 9:150] Merritt Clark said that Enos' brother Jonas administered the estate, the papers on file do not indicate this. On Feb. 6, 1816, guardianship bonds were posted for Marina Clark age 8 and Almira Clark age 6, and widow Electa received her dower. [Ibid. 9:362,359] Then on March 11,1820 guardianship of Harty, Marina, and Almira Clark, minor children of Enos Clark, dec. was given to Electa Clark. Electa asked for an allowance for the expenses of boarding, school, clothes for the 3 children, and for Doctor McClure \$9, a total of \$93.67. For 4 years 10 months 19 days at \$2 per week for Harty, \$84.67 for Marina and only 3 years, 10 months and 19 days for Almira \$67. [Ibid. 10:478-479]

Enos' estate papers show a claim by creditors as of 1816 Jan. 9: "the heirs of Jonas Clark, dec. allowed for the purpose of furnishing 2 pair of tombstones for Jonas Clark and Avis Clark, dec. agreed to be furnished by Enos Clark in his life time, \$40." [ibid 9:353-59] [These stones were not carved by Enos Clark.] The debts of the estate totaled \$1,541.82 and the claims due to the estate totaled \$3,555.37. [Ibid. 9:352-359]

#### ZERUBBABEL COLLINS OF SHAFTSBURY, VT

On October 4, 1733, Benjamin and Elizabeth Collins were blessed with a fifth son, and then afflicted him with the name Zerubbabel. The boy quickly overcame this handicap and, and being quick to learn, and cleaver with his hands, he eventually became a much more skilled stone cutter than his father. His father died in 1759 and he probably carved his gravestone. After 1759, working independently, he developed a style very much his own. This style remained essentially the same as long as long as Zerubbabel cut gravestones.

In 1779 he sold the home farm in Lebanon Crank, Connecticut and removed to Shaftsbury, Vermont where he died in 1797. His son James followed the family tradition of gravestone carving. [Markers VIII, p. 129-132, reprint of the papers of Dr. Ernest Caulfield. Legh-Harris, Valerie, Walloomsack Review, Vol. 8, May 2012; Three Generations of the Collins Carving Tradition, pp. 16-27]

Zerubbabel carved lovely white marble stones with seraphs and lots of flowers. He is considered a master carver with perfect lettering. The majority of his stones were carved of best quality white marble from a quarry on his land in Shaftsbury. There are a number of signed stones in Bennington County Vermont. There is at least one of his stones in almost every pre-1797 southern Vermont cemetery.

Just skimming over the material you sent & reviewing the several stones you've noted, I'm going to revise what I think about who the actual carver was of the "bug-eyed leaves" stones by saying they can't be attributed to just one carver, but possibly to a "shop" of carvers inter-related to another "shop" of carvers. I can explain this in detail with the research I did over 10 yrs ago on all the men associated with that shop in Shaftsbury that was in existence for at least 75 years. This is a situation where you've got a shop that operated under three generations of men who were related because they were neighbors, co-workers, fathers, sons, apprentices, &/or through marriage. Everything from craftsmanship, stencils, designs to tools were handed down, shared, or bought & sold between them. I would expect that their work was a blending of talents and designs over the years. I'll stop in Peggy & go over this material with you. It's too lengthy to try & explain the relationship of each of these men here.

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

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#### Zerubbabel Collins (1733-1797)

On October 4, 1733, Benjamin and Elizabeth Collins were blessed with a fifth son, and then afflicted him with the name Zerubbabel, after a minor "begat" in the First Book of Chronicles. But the boy quickly overcame this handicap and, being quick to learn and clever with his hands, he eventually became a much more skillful stonecutter than his father. Inasmuch as he was the favorite son, he was probably in partnership with his father, because in 1756 he gave his note to Ichabod Robinson to pay some of his father's debts. When his father died in 1759, Zerubbabel inherited the family farm with instructions to provide suitably for the comfort of his mother. This he no doubt continued to do, for when she purchased goods in Robinson's store, the bill was paid "by hir son Zerub."

Very likely he was making gravestones at an early age, but since none of these stones has as yet been identified, it is not possible now to describe his early style. He probably made the gravestone for his father (Fig. 6), although the facial design on this stone somewhat resembles his father's work. After 1759, however, when working independently, Zerubbabel developed a style very much his own. It is seen on the gravestone for his son who died in 1770, and though it is easy to find many variations of this design, it remained essentially the same as long as Zerubbabel cut gravestones.

In 1763, having lost a lawsuit with Jonathan Trumbull, Zerubbabel paid "5 piggs" on his account; and in 1775, he got some free publicity when the story of some cattle, having died from eating wild cherry leaves near his home, was published in the newspapers throughout the state. When he came to appreciate the value of marble as a medium for gravestones and wishing to be near the chief source of supply, Zerubbabel joined the migration of eastern Connecticut families to Vermont. In 1778 he sold "the Farm or Lot of Land I now live on" in Lebanon Crank and moved to Shaftsbury, Vermont. In the lovely, well-kept graveyards throughout southwestern Vermont may be seen many of his attractive stones. One sees them in profusion in Shaftsbury and in Old Bennington, and they occur at least as far north as Poultney. There can be little doubt about his style at this period of his life, for he proudly signed his name on the stone for Mehetable Hubbel (Bennington, 1770) (Fig. 7) and also on the stone for Mary Cochran (Fig. 8), "who after performing

the Endearing Offices of the congugal life" died in Bennington in 1777.

But in the late 1700s Vermont was still sparsely settled, so Zerubbabel, excellent craftsman that he was, returned to Connecticut on many occasions to take orders for his work. In the *Litchfield Monitor*, February 29, 1792, there appeared the following notice:

FOR SALE. A few sets of Marble Tomb Stones of a good quality -- Also, Mullars [or pestles] and Marbles for Painters.

- It has now been definitely established that Obadiah Wheeler was the carver of these stones. See Connecticut Gravestones XVII.

- 5. Kendall P. Hayward, Connecticut Historical Society Bulletin, January, 1950. Mrs. Forbes has brief accounts of Benjamin and Zerubbabel Collins in her Gravestones of Early New England, (Boston, 1927), 105, 111. The Caulfield copy has written below the word "undoubtedly" on the last line the following "? no proof found yet." This was a perceptive caution that should have been in the original article, for his statement that "The numerous gray schist stones with Zerubbabel's designs and dated after 1778 were undoubtedly made...on one of his temporary visits" is incorrect. A number of such stones, obviously copied from those of Zerubbabel Collins, are scattered in eastern Connecticut burying grounds. We now have probate evidence that these were carved by Aaron Haskins of Bolton. The majority of Haskins stones are close copies of the work of the Mannings. His Collins-like stones appear to have been made when a particularly elaborate stone was wanted. The only evidence that we have that Zerubbabel may have returned to eastern Connecticut are his two stones in Columbia, both on Vermont marble. Thus it seems unlikely that Zerubbabel ever returned to Eastern Connecticut to carve on gray schists after he settled in Vermont.

#### ZADHARY CRAWFORD OF Louisville, KY

This memorial was constructed by Zachary Crawford of Louisville, Kentucky, son of Owen Crawford of Wells, VT and grandson of the deceased. He is a sculptor, mostly working with various metals. On careful examination, the memorial appears to have been constructed of various commercially available forms of stainless steel. The metals have been cut and formed into the various shapes. It was dedicated on July 19, 2005, the anniversary of the birth of Harold Crawford, an ex-airline pilot.
