Marble worker, 1870 - dealer 1880

Eber Hammond Davis, b. 10 Jan. 1841 Townsend, VT VR, d. April 12, 1895 of heart disease, hotel keeper. (Rutland, VT VR), son of Curtis & Minerva Davis. [Minerva Marsh Davis, bur. Sept. 19, 1890, age 76-5, d. of dropsy, b. New Fane, VT to Eber Marsh & Charlotte Warren. Evergreen Cemetery, section 28, plot 27 records]

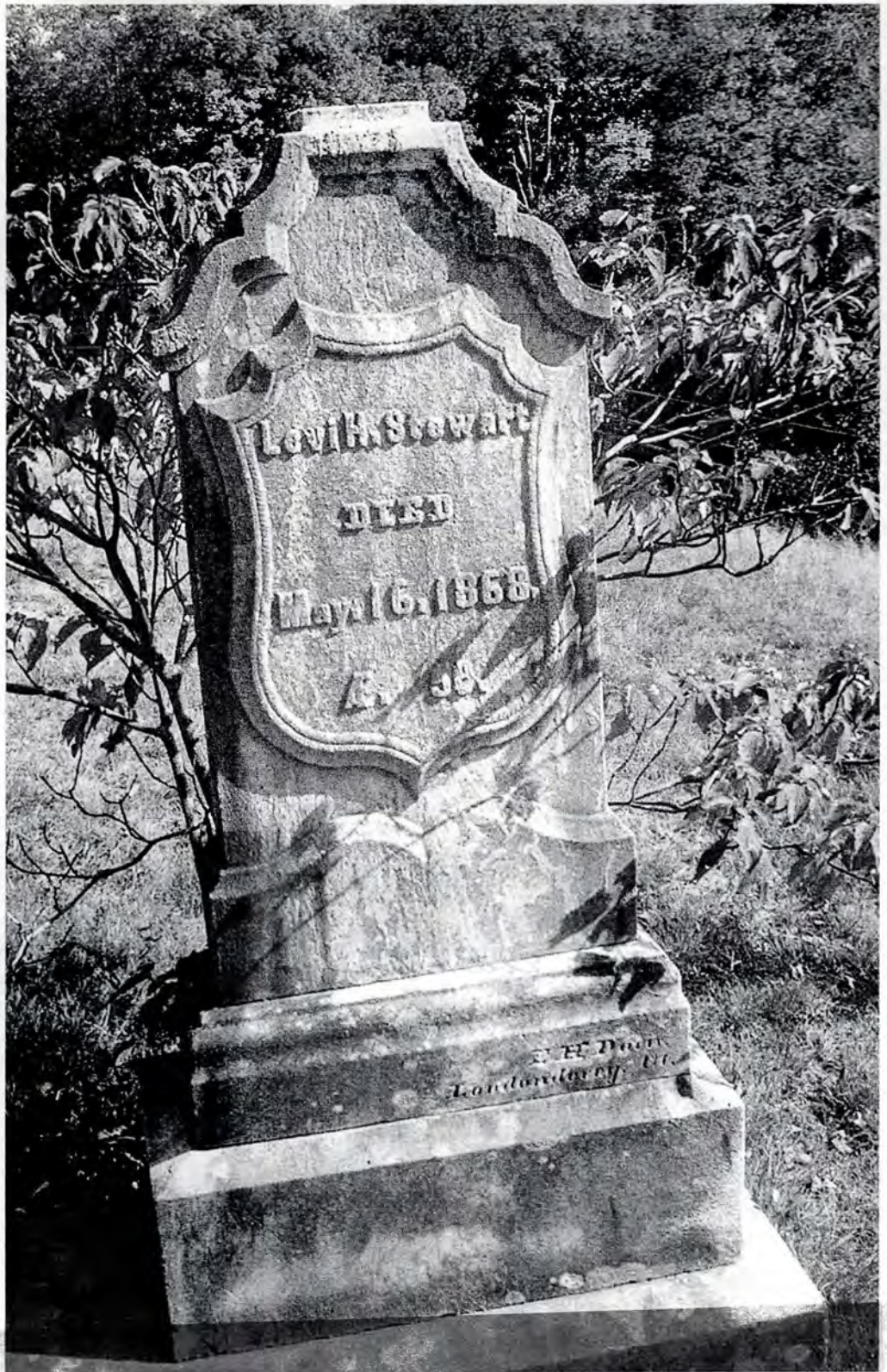

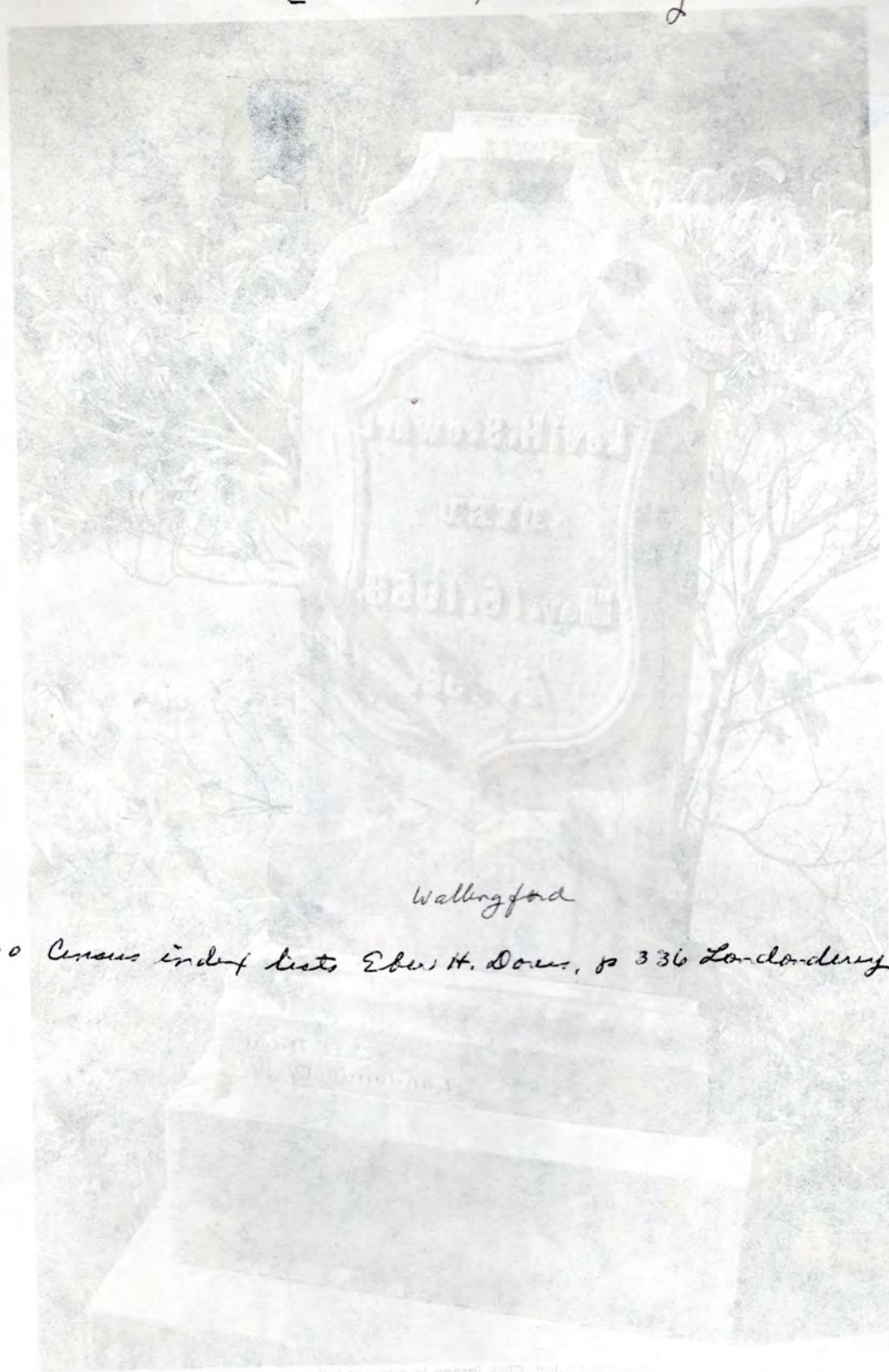

LEONARD DAVIS, RUTLAND

Leonard Davis, b. 1801 Hudson, NY, son of Samuel & Mary D. (Morse) Davis. He died. April 1860 [1860 Rutland Morality schedule: b. MA, **stone engraver** MRT197_79088] He was first buried in the West St. Cemetery where the stone still stands. His name is spelled "Davies" on this stone. His body was moved to the Evergreen cemetery, section 7, plot 39, on Sept. 23, 1891.

He m. say by 1835, Catherine B. White, b. 1800 gs., d. 1893 age 99-6-4, of old age, buried June 13, 1899 in Evergreen Cemetery, Rutland by her husband, b. Cairo, IL, parents names not listed in the cemetery record. Catherine D. White Davis, d. 12 June 1899 age 99-6-3, of acute bronchitis, b. IL, Rutland VT VR, dau. of Abner & Betsey White.

Leonard Davis was listed twice in the 1850 census:

WILLIAM DENISON, West Rutland

Samuel Denison, Esq. (John, Robert, John, George) bp. Old Lyme, CT March 11, 1744 (gs) or 8 Jan. 1741 (Swan), d. Feb. 24, 1825 Castleton, SAR marker (Pleasant St. Cem., West Rutland, gravestone carved by son William), son of John & Patience (Griswold) Denison.

[Swan, Marvel G., & Swan, Donald P., *Early Families of Rutland, Vermont*, 1990, p. 115-16] "DEA. WILLIAM DENISON / DIED / MAY 8, 1856. IN THE 80, YEAR / OF HIS AGE. He walked with God, and was not ..." [This stone was probably carved by Smith & Son of Castleton] (Hillside Castleton Cemetery, section 3 between 2nd E-W grass road that intersects the gazebo & 3rd E-W grass road, Row 1.)]

In 1802, William bought land in West Rutland where he had a shoemaker shop. (Swan)

In 1811 William was a Deacon of the West Parish Church. [Hance, Dawn D., *The History of Rutland Vermont, 1761-1861*, 1991, p. 255] William did some of the stone work in 1819 on the Cong. Meeting House. [ibid. p. 269]

The third quarry in Rutland, in operation was probably the one operated by William Dennison and Medad Sheldon, opened between 1818 and 1821. In 1814 William Dennison and Medad Sheldon purchased 23 acres from Asa Hale to work the marble. Later the land was sold to a son of Rev. Lemuel Haynes.

William Barnes and Gardner Tripp of West Rutland dug out flat pieces of marble as early as 1820 probably at the quarry in Whipple Hollow. These were split & hewed into gravestones. William Dennison, a shoemaker and natural mechanic, cut them & carved the inscriptions. Many of these stone can be found in Rutland's old cemeteries. They sold from \$30 to \$50 each in the early 1800s. [ibid. p. 542]

It seems reasonable that William carved the stones for his wife Iole and father Samuel, but there is no proof other than he did carve stones he was paid for a number of stones. There are many similar stones in the area.

Asa Hale of Rutland was paid **\$76.54** for the gravestones of Deac. Matthew Finton and Mrs. Hannah Finton. (Swan, Marvel G., "Early Families of Rutland," p.136. Matthew and Hannah were some of the first in Rutland to die in the epidemic that swept Vermont in the spring of 1813.

The stones stand, facing west, (1994), near the rear of the North Main Street Cemetery. They are almost certainly the **work of William Denison**, at least they have his ampersand and a closed h.

Dear Michael,

After visiting with you, I was working on the Tinmouth cemetery records. Do I remember that the stones you found at the corner of Mc Namara Road & Gulf Road were for a name that started with an N. Could they be the Newell stones listed above as being on Dunn Road?

I searched the internet and found an address for a Jean Eisenhart in Arlington, VT. I have written her and received a nice answer to my question as to who designed her stone. She was so pleased with the way you worked together on the design. What a wonderful idea to put the stone in her yard for her to enjoy for a year. I am not sure I could have had it moved.

She says her inspiration came from seeing another stone you carved that is in Shaftsbury. When I go down to the area to take some more slides, I would like to include that stone. Just which Shaftsbury cemetery is it in?

I have heard from the AGS program director for the June conference and she wants me to tell about your stone and what I have learned about it for part of one of the evening programs for the entire group. Thus I need to go to Arlington, Shaftsbury and Bennington to take some more slides to illustrate where the designs came from.

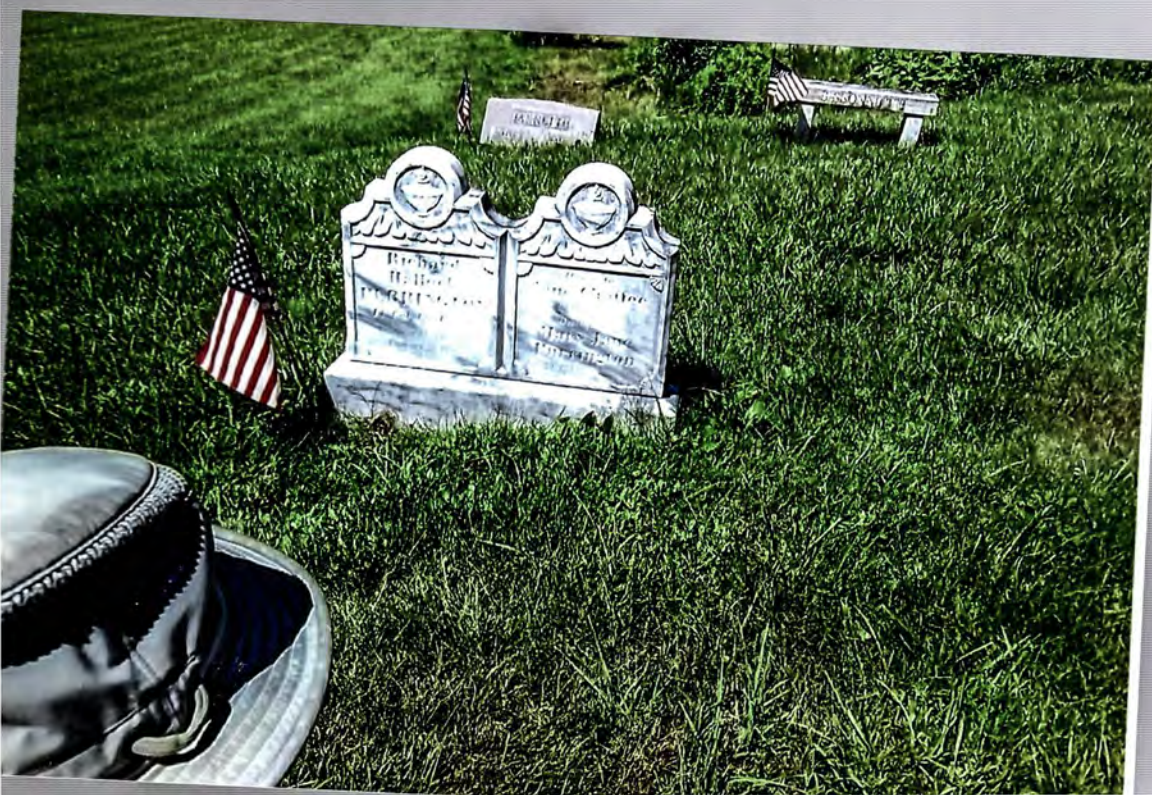
When I wrote back, I said you might be interested in doing a workshop at one of the conferences. I believe I gave her your address.

Another saw mill - circular saw mill & mill *house* ~~rose~~ to Dudley B. Fuller.

The first clue to Ben Field's identity was finding a Ben Field in the 1850 census. Albion, Orleans co., NY is about 35 miles west of Rochester. The location also positions him well to be soliciting a market across Lake Ontario in Toronto and Port Hope.

Bruce Elliot's message of Oct. 11, 2008 places Ben Field's family in Dorset, VT in the middle of other Marble Company families. Unfortunately the 1850 Dorset census enumerator listed the occupation of everyone in the marble industry as simply "marble". The census records support this.

In an online 1901 Field Genealogy Bruce found a connection to the Danby, Bennington Co., VT marble business.

"Amos Field moved to Dorset, VT in 1775. He married the eldest daughter of Justin Kellogg, and by intermarriage with the Kent family, has sprung numerous band of relatives in that town not inaptly represented by the - at one time - well known marble firm of Holley, Field & Kent, a trio of cousin, by whose enterprise and activity thousands of dollars worth of marble was annually quarried and prepared for market." It doesn't say there that Amos did anything but farm, but the biography of his son Amos Jr. says that he assisted his father [on his farm and about his marble quarries." Amos Jr. moved to Adams, NY where he died in 1829. [See also "H. Hawley" carvers.]

He put in operation a gang of saws, on the site occupied by Major Hawley's mills, in South Dorset. In 1829 he moved to Weedsport. Mr. Field was married when he was twenty one years of age to Sarah Cushman Collins who was seventeen years of age. They moved to Burtis - now Weedsport than Albion. He died in Dec. 1869 age 80 years... [ibid]

There is no biography of Ben in the book but there is apparently a photo of him in the original. He was born June 12, 1816 in Dorset. [Bruce Elliot] See the rest of Bruce's message.

Hi Peggy. I spent some time researching various things en route home, and was only here a couple of days and then away again. But I have still failed to turn up anything more about Ben Field, beyond what I knew when we spoke at AGS. I will attach a jpg of the advertisement that appeared in the Port Hope (Ontario) *Commercial Advertiser* of 14 July 1849, p. 3, col. 3. They were certainly ambitious in offering to complete gravestones and deliver them right to the churchyard, so far away from Castleton. If I remember rightly the rail lines through to Canada from the Rutland area would not be completed for another few months.

The *Canada Directory* of 1851 (online at <http://directory.evendon.net>) on p. 589 lists under an addenda for Port Hope "Field, B. & Co., marble cutters, &c., Mill st." On p. 450 they also list, under Toronto: marble factories:

FIELD, BENJAMIN, & Co., dealers in marble, wholesale and retail, and manufacturers of all kinds of monumental marble work, 123 Yonge st."

There is nothing in the Toronto reference to suggest that the company was merely an agency, but then there was nothing in the Port Hope directory reference to suggest that either. There are additional Toronto City Directories on the Toronto Public Library website, but they are somewhat difficult to manipulate and the OCR software seems to leave something to be desired. The directories are also not continuous for this period. But the 1850-51 directory there has no listing for Field. The next Toronto directory on their site is for 1856, but I will check out the hard copies at our National Library as soon as I get a chance.

An 1856-57 directory for Port Hope (www.porthopehistory.com/1856directory/directory_index.htm) indicates that William Burnham was a local produce and commission merchant with office in Walton Street; he is also listed as an agent for fire insurance companies and for the Chippewa Stove Works.

You suggested that Field may turn up in the deed records for Castleton. If you have an opportunity to check this out I would appreciate anything you can find. I note that the state archives near Montpelier has microfilms of the deed records for most of the state; is that right? I did some work in the state library and the Vt Hist Soc but did not have time to visit the archives.

The write-up on Castleton in Hamilton Child, *Gazetteer and Business Directory of Rutland County, Vt. for 1881-82*" (Syracuse 1881), which I presume is what you quote below, p. 102, says:

"Field & Co.'s marble and slate mill, located at Hydeville, is now (June, 1881) in the process of erection, they having not begun operations yet." So that doesn't appear to be the same business. There are several other stone businesses listed there, mostly to do with slate. But Sherman & Gleason's marble saw-mill in Hydeville was operated on contract by James T. Freeman, who had been with the firm of S&G for 31 years (which takes us, interestingly, to 1850). There was also a Sherman & Armstrong marble works on road 28, in operation 40 years, "but the present company have owned them only since May, 1880". Both had a dozen or two employees. I seem to have neglected to copy the continuation of the description on p. 103! I suppose it is possible that one or other of these might be a descendant of the earlier Field firm. But it is just as likely that Ben Field went out of business without there being any firm carrying it forward. Deeds would appear to be the most likely avenue for further research, although he could have rented the whole operation.

Let me know if the picture of the advertisement comes through. I can try scanning in other formats, but the files may be larger.

Hi Peggy. So the mystery persists, but thanks for checking. Can you clarify: did you search the actual census microfilms, or the index volumes? I suspect the answer may lie in the land registry records, of which there are copies in Montpelier. I'm unlikely to get there till next spring. If you have an opportunity to check this out, I would appreciate learning the result. The Fair Haven Cemetery man is a possibility. Did you turn him up in your census searches? He would have been about 23 when the Canadian advertisement appeared. Some of the men who pioneered white marble in Atlantic Canada were young and not long out of their apprenticeships, no doubt seeking a place to set up in business for themselves.

It's conceivable that Field might have followed suit and moved to Canada. The online index to the census of the Canadas taken in Jan. 1852 is not quite complete yet and includes only one Benjamin Field, age 16, in Ancaster near Hamilton, Ontario. It will be a while before 1861 is digitized. But the 1849 ad claimed that his advantage was that he was involved in the quarrying and sawing of marble as well in the production of monuments. He offered such a variety of stone, though, that I can't imagine he got it all in one quarry. He must have been prepared to purchase stone to meet orders. And of course it's possible that he leased a quarry; certainly 18th century carvers often owned them in shares. He doesn't actually say that he had a marble mill, but the reference to sawing makes it likely. This, too, need not have been owned, in which case the land records will not turn him up.

The Rutland newspapers I think have only been digitized to 1818; that's what I have access to in my subscription to www.genealogybank.com, anyway. It includes Vermont papers for the late 1840s and/or early 1850s for Danville, Burlington, Bennington, Windsor, and Brattleboro, and it perhaps isn't surprising that Field didn't advertise there. I went through some of the later 'Rutland Herald' on microfilm in Montpelier for Jan 2 - July 10, 1845, and May 23 - Dec. 27, 1849, the latter bracketing the time period of Wm Burnham's July 1849 ad for Field in Port Hope, but without seeing anything. It's possible of course that he targeted his advertising to out-of-state markets and locally served Castleton. There was no advertising by other quarry or monument firms in either little run of papers I did, but do recall one reference to the number of active quarries in Rutland and area, and an ad for slates that turned out to be *writing* (i.e. school) slates.

Have you surveyed cemeteries in Castleton? If you did I presume you would have checked for any signed stones. Of course, it was common to only sign stones that were going out of area. I many years ago went through the very large Port Hope Cemetery stone by stone, but was hunting English immigrants then, not stonecutters! I was in an Anglican churchyard there earlier this year that had stones from this period. There was one signed by a NYS carver, but no signed ones from Vt.

I guess that's as far as we can go for the moment....

 Finally I got to Rutland to search the 1850 census for Ben Field and found nothing that seemed to fit the may in question. They were all too old or far from Castleton and farmers.
 In the Fair Haven cemetery there is a Benjamin Field, d. 24 March 1895 age

69 y. (b. about 1826) with wife Caroline Havens, d. 8 Feb. 1899 age 70 years. Fair Haven is the next town to Castleton. I did not find this Ben in the 1850 VT census.

In Child's Gazetteer, 1882, Rutland Co. VT, p.615: Marble Dealers & Workers:

Field & Co., Main St., Castleton

p. 296, Castleton: Field & Co., (Hydeville) James Field manuf. of marble & marbleized plain slate.

Hi Peggy. This is great! Many thanks. The timing of this is interesting and as you say establishes a marble mill in Hydeville at the appropriate time. I can't remember whether there were any county directories around 1849-52 but am pretty sure I would have looked at them either at the state library or at the Vt Hist Soc in Barre if there were such. As the marble mill was included in the deed with a number of other industrial premises, it is entirely possible that the marble mill was leased out to someone. I have found an instance in the 1830s in Upper Canada where a marble mill occupied a part of a larger water-driven mill that is now a historic site, and was operated by a tenant. This comes from a newspaper advertisement. You will note in your deed that the slate manufactory was let out. The tenant's name of course would not turn up in the deeds. I wonder, however, whether a tenant would turn up in the annual assessment rolls for Castleton, should they happen to survive? Often assessment rolls name both occupier and owner, and given that the marble mill in Hydeville seems to have been a separate building, that might be another avenue to pursue.

In your transcription of the deed you don't include the name of the seller at the beginning. Dudley B. Fuller was the purchaser. If you can fill in that detail I would be grateful. It will give another name to follow up.

I've done some searching on my newspaper database subscription to follow up on this, and I find in the NY Herald of 2 Apr. 1858, p. 1 that Dudley B. Fuller in 1858 purchased three steamships from the Collins line for \$50,000. He was of the firm of Fuller, Lord & Co., iron merchants, at the corner of Cedar and Greenwich Streets in NYC. Of greater interest is the Boston Daily Courier of 19 March 1849, p. 4:

"Rutland and Whitehall Railway. A.W. Hyde, Dudley B. Fuller of New-York, W.C. Kittredge, Edward F. Hodges of Boston, and B.F. Langdon, have been chosen directors of the company."

So Fuller was involved in an effort contemporaneous with purchasing the mills in Hydeville to extend a railway through Castleton. I have seen other articles on this which I will have to go back and find. A.W. Hyde I think is a Castleton local; I saw some other refs to him and will need to check again when I have time.

There is a great article in the St Alban's Daily Messenger, 6 Oct. 1853, p. 3 entitled "Slate and Marble Quarries". It includes the following: "There are I think the same number of mills for sawing marble in the towns named, as quarries, though located miles in various directions. Of the whole number, I only inquired the amount of work done at two, which may perhaps be about an average. The Hydeville Company at Hydeville, sells 12,000 feet per month valued at 33 1-3 cents per foot. Total sales in one year \$48,000. Clement, Gilmore & Co., at Centre Rutland, sell 10,000 feet of white marble per month; sales for one year \$50,000...." This reprinted from the Rutland Herald.

All of this suggests that a further deeds search on "Hydeville Marble Company" or even "Hydeville Company" might be worthwhile. But thus far, still no mention of Ben Field. I wonder where one would find the incorporation record for the company? It need not have been incorporated in Vermont, as some of the marble companies were NY incorporations.

The Pittsfield (NY) Sun, 4 Sept. 1856 p. 3 notes the destruction by fire of the Latting Observatory near the Crystal Palace in NYC, recently occupied by the Hydeville Marble Works Co. whose loss was estimated at \$100,000, only \$17,000 of which was insured. All searches on the phrase "Hydeville Marble" turned up a variant of this story. At first glance this would seem to be another Hydeville, but given that Fuller was of NYC it is entirely possible that the company had occupied a large building in NYC to warehouse the marble they were selling into the urban market. More to follow up on.

I've been doing a lot of research on early marble mills, and early efforts to sell headstones extra-locally, and working through to the companies that earlier coalesced into the Vt Marble Company, so again the timing of all this is interesting.

Finally, yesterday I had a few minutes at the Castleton town clerk's office. There are no deeds with Ben Field's name in the index till much later than we are interested. The deed I copied was for (I did not write the given name down) Field et al. Well, I could not find a Field anywhere in the recording. I will need to go back & search more when I don't have other things in mind. This deed I did copy is for a marble mill in Hydeville, the west section of Castleton.

Hydeville Co., inc. under virtue of Legislature of State of Vermont, Nov. 7, 1849, of Castleton, Rutland Co. for \$10,000 in satisfaction of Dudley B. Fuller of NYC sells a tract in Village of Hydeville bounded by Main Road to Fair Haven (now Rt. 4A); east by highway to West Poultney (now Rt. 30); south by Rutland-Whitehall rail road; west by Langdon Mill yard. It included power, 6 water wheels, 1 fire proof grist mill with 4 runs of stones in good order; 1 large slate manufacture leased to Hydeville Slate Co at rent of \$100/year; 1 large marble sawing mill & machinery; 1 wood saw mill by Langdon Mill; another saw mill. circular saw mill & mill house, all to Dudley B. Fuller. Recorded March 27, 1858.

So we now know there was a marble mill in Hydeville. I must pull an old map I have as the area of the deed is now the main intersection of Rt. 30 & Rt. 4A with the only traffic light in Castleton.

I could be wrong as to the road to the east of the lot. There is another road a mile or so west of Rt. 30 that could be called the road to West Poultney.

There is nothing in the vital records for Ben Field in Castleton.

Hi again Peggy. I just checked "Ben Field" on the LDS's new beta-test site <http://pilot.familysearch.org/recordsearch/start.html#>. One of the datasets they have there is the 1850 US census, which is now 83% complete, including for Vermont. You can search, and then click through to see images of the pages. Well, the search for "Ben Field" and "Vermont" turned up six variants, one of them in Albion, Orleans County, New York, about 35 miles west of Rochester. Spafford Field, 61, b. (1789) Vt, was listed as a Marble Dealer, and his son Ben, 34, as a Marble Dealer. Living with them was Andrew Montgomery, 20, b. Ireland, a Marble Cutter, and the household immediately preceding was headed by one Am Hunt, 39, a Marble Sculpter. The Field children aged 34 and 30 were born in Vermont, and those 18 and 16 in New York. The other search results were named Benjamin Fields, whereas this one is specifically Ben Field, and in the right trade. The location also positions him well to be soliciting a market across Lake Ontario in Toronto and Port Hope. The latter is in fact immediately north of Albion, which is only a short distance in from the lake. The Ontario lakeshore was served by marble dealers in Rochester earlier in the century. Perhaps Ben had tried to move in the direction of vertical integration in the late 1840s, only to be stymied by the economic downturn of the closing years of the decade, selling out his interest in Vermont and returning home to NYS?

It turns out that this family was much involved in the stone

business. http://www.archive.org/stream/fieldgenealogybe01pier/fieldgenealogybe01pier_djvu.txt is a Field genealogy published in 1901. Ben's grandfather Amos Field moved to Dorset, Vermont in 1775. It says of Amos that "By the marriage of the eldest daughter with Justin Kellogg, and by intermarriage with the Kent family, has sprung a numerous band of relatives in that town not inaptly represented by the — at one time — well known marble firm of Holley, Field & Kent, a trio of cousins, by whose enterprise and activity thousands of dollars worth of marble was annually quarried and prepared for market." It doesn't say there that Amos did anything but farm, but the biography of his son Amos Jr. (#1041) says that he assisted his father "on his farm and about his marble quarries". Amos Jr moved to Adams, NY where he died in 1829.

There is quite a biography there of Ben's father Spafford Field (#1048) who was born in Dorset in 1789: "Spafford Field was born in Dorset, on the old Field place, and while a young man became interested in the marble business. The Dorset quarries were first opened in 1785, and soon an extensive business in this line was built up. The early quarry-men labored under great disadvantages, for the want of proper machinery to saw the marble. The first attempt at sawing was made by Spafford Field, about 1813. He put in operation a gang of saws, on the site occupied by Major Hawley's mills, in South Dorset. This first mill was constructed in accordance with the best knowledge then possessed on the subject, but it could saw but very little marble. However, soon after great improvements were made. In 1829 he moved to Weedsport. Mr. Field was married when he was twenty-one years of age to Sarah Cushman Collins, who was seventeen years of age. Early in the twenties they moved from Dorset, Vt. with their five children, to Brutus— now Weedsport — New York. Two children were born there. In 1829 they went to Albion, where they lived permanently. Two children were born here. Mr. Field died there, December, 1869, aged eighty years...."

There is no biography of Ben in the book but there is apparently a photo of him in the original. He was born June 12, 1816 in Dorset.

Two sons of Spafford's brother Alfred Field were involved in the stone trades, too. There is a good deal about this branch of the family on Peggy B. Perazzo's website "Stone Quarries and Beyond", in the section on California carvers. Google "Spafford Field" and "marble" at once and you will find the link to the main material (that's easier than trying to navigate through the Quarries site to it), though there is much else on her site about them as well. Alfred's sons Frederick and Charles travelled in the 1840s, selling marble, and then returning and setting up marble businesses in Dorset. Charles was in partnership with his cousins

Edson Holley and Duane Kent. Frederick set up in Chicago and then moved to California after the general business downturn in 1872 or 73.

The Perazzo site also has an obituary of Spafford Field's widow Sally, and an obituary of Hon. Ben Field from 1876. The latter notes that "in his early manhood he was engaged at the above village [Albion] in letter cutting on head-stones. Subsequently he became interested in politics, and, abandoning his early occupation gave his attention to the contract business, especially to the building of railroads, some of the most prominent lines in the country having been constructed under his skillful superintendence."

Perazzo also quotes an article "The Field Houses in Dorset" by Anna E. Gilbert, c.1961, with the Dorset Historical Society, as follows:

"By the time Alfred's children, Frederick, Charles, Janette and Ellen came along in the 1820s, the quarrying of marble was becoming very important in Dorset. Every young fellow learned to cut marble and little marble shops were common. Frederick and Charles both left the farm for the marble business. Frederick first went out to Albion where his cousins were and soon after established the first marble shop in Chicago. He and his brother Charles travelled (sic) through Illinois, Indiana and Michigan selling marble for many years. I have a letter from their father to Frederick telling how he had filled his order.* He had driven to Castleton and had bought \$162 worth of stones and was shipping them by canal and the Lakes from Whitehall to him at Chicago. They had an office in Niles, Michigan, because Frederick had malaria in Chicago. There, about 1847, they got acquainted with a young minister, Parsons Pratt...."

And again:

"It is worthy of note how many of the Field family have been connected with marble and other mining operations. Frederick and Charles were important members of one of the largest marble companies here in Dorset - the Holley, Fields and Kent. When that was flourishing in the 1850s they were salesmen of this Company and traveled a great deal of the time. When the Civil War came on this Company like all the others was hard hit. But after a few years they were operating again and some of the quarries furnished the headstones for the Gettysburg Cemetery. In 1872 Frederick went to California, still in the marble business, and two or three of his sons became mining engineers.... Charles Field's son, Charles A. Field, sold marble for the Vermont Marble Company in countries all over the world. He came to Dorset in the 80s with trunks of curios he had collected. We were thrilled with the wonderful foreign curious. I still have a card case from Japan and a cane he brought my father. He took most of the things to California and they were burned at the time of the San Francisco earthquake and fire."

She also copies from the Dorset Historical Society a letter of 28 April 1844 from Alfred Field in Dorset to his son Frederick in Chicago. This is really interesting, as it mentions shopping for headstone blanks in Castleton from Mr. Hyde who had a mill 2 1/2 miles outside the village (meaning Castleton village, so I imagine Hyde had the mill you turned up at Hydeville), but ended up buying from Shermans whose mill was in the village (i.e. of Castleton). It sheds light on how headstone blanks were selected and how they reached distant markets as early as the 1840s. The 1850 Castleton census on p. 206 lists Aruanah W. Hyde, 50, b. Vermont, Marble Man, real estate worth \$40,000, and on p.

183 Carlos S. Sherman, 31, b. Vermont, Marble Dealer, no real estate listed, but a number of other sculptors and stonecutters with him. Here are the relevant parts of the letter on the Parazzo website:

"Now for the business part of your letter.... Your delaying so long to write Lead me to Conclude That you had Given it up. But fortunately for me, Norman, arrived here Saturday with 4 Horses to buy Stone, he remaned here until Tuesday noon, we took one pair and went to Castleton The other are Still here fiting for Market Wednesday morning we Called on Mr. Hyde Said he had Stone aplenty 2 ½ Miles from The Village took us into his wagon and Carried us to his mill and we look(e)d over ten or twelve Thousand foot and found nothing we wanted. There was all Grades of Colour from pale to blue black but not a white Stone to be found we return(e)d to The Village and Call(e)d on The Messrs Sherman's They were all absent but would be home at Evening we Call(e)d again and found They had Stone ten or 12 Thousand but They were all at Whitehall 15 Miles I found by Enquiring They were Edged only on one Side I Then told Them what I wanted and That was The privilege of Selecting. They said at once They Could not allow me to do So They had done it years past for one dollar pr ft at the Mill but They found it was injuring The (Cost?) of their Stone (wist?) and Came to The Conclusion last year That They would do it no mor(e) and They must abide by it Every man must take an average lot of Sutch as They Selected for their first Quality The next Question of Course was how Soon Can you Saw Edge and box 300 ft of Stone, and what will you tax Extra for Edging and boxing 7 or 8 Cints was The reply and Could have Them Ready in Eight or ten days I asked Norman what The Expense of Edging and he Said five Cents pr foot and Thought There would be no difficulty in obtaining Stone Cutters to do The work and advis(e)d to Send Them on as They were The next morning we went to Whitehall and after Labouring hard from ten oclock to ½ past 4 P. M. we succeeded in selecting 41 headStone which measure (e)d 300 ft and put aboard The Boat for which I pay fifty Cents pr ft. foot Stone 30 cts a piece Edged all Round whole amount \$162.30 payable one year from date If you want to make it Larger you may allow me 6.00 for The Three days I was out I Expect you will be Some disappointed That you Cant have all The first rate Stone But I have Certainly done the best for you That I Could I think we have been verry fortunate in our Selectoin (Selection). "In regard to transportation you have ben verry particular in your directions which I am Glad to see. Though you require Something more of Boatman Than men in This region are in The habit of I have always been in the habit of trusting to much to other peoples honesty and perhaps in This Case I have Come farther Short of propriety and reason Than you have Exceeded

"The Stone are mark(e)d F Field and Co Chi(c)ago Ill Care of Newbury & Dale. I Spoke also of having Them Deliver(e)d to Holt & Palmer But The Capt Said Their Landing place was inconvenient to Get at, and mentioned another which he Thought more Commodious and furthermore he Said if Thaire was a vessel in The Harbour waiting for Loading He would See it put on board and Save Some Expense for Stodge. They were Ship(pe)d in The name of Sherman Brother & Son, the Gentleman which I Bot of Their usual practice of taking Rupt (?) was to mention The number of Pieces Ru? (Reported?) in Good order to Deliver at Sutch place and They Consider(e)d Them accountable for all damages arising from Their Carlessness The rason of its being Ship(pe)d in Their Name. They Loaded the boat and I might Look to Them in Case of Damage No. of pieces 82. The responsibility in Selecting is not one Quarter as Great you will See by The blunders you find in Reading my Letter That my head is Somewhat Confused The Transportation on The Stone will mak(e) a tremendous hole in your hundred dollars - but never mind that tell them your Partner down East has money Enough...."

Norman mentioned in the above letter I think was Norman Spafford Field (b. 1818), not one of Alfred's sons but a son of his brother Spafford, which would make him Ben's next younger brother. So if he was involved in the stone business in Dorset and Castleton in 1844, one can understand Ben becoming involved, too.

Whitehall is not far from you, the landing place about 11 miles west of Hydeville and about 15 from Castleton, where stone had to be loaded to take it west via Lake Champlain etc. Whitehall became the terminus of the railway through Castleton that I mentioned in my last as being promoted in 1849.

Well, I think I've found our man. What remains unclear is the capacity in which he was involved with the mill at Castleton in 1849. The Hydeville Co. would still be well worth searching for in the Castleton deeds, and it would also be nice to track down the deed of "Field et al." It is conceivable that Ben Field might have been a partner, but it seems more likely that he simply bought stone there. Only further research will show for sure.

Well, I've spent an inordinately long time on this yesterday and today, and I have lots of work I have to complete by Tuesday (when our long Canadian Thanksgiving Day weekend is over). But great stuff

A. Frisbie's work is so much like the work of the Caswell's, he may have been part of that group of carvers under the direction of Enos Clark & his students, Marcus Stoddard & David Mehurin and probably Jesse Caswell & for a short time, William Vaughn.

Was A. Frisbie, Amos Allen Frisbie, a close relative to both of the James Frisbies?

With Amos Allen Frisbie a close relative to James Frisbie, d. 1845 and the fact he had strong ties to the area, met his 2nd wife there, is almost certainly he was the "**A. Frisbie**" who was paid \$12 for James Frisbie's stone. It appears this was a payment for securing the stone that was almost certainly carved in Middletown Springs and similar to his father's stone and others believed to have been carved by Josiah Caswell.

Janet Muff has named this carver "Wheelchair Wheelie"

This carver used a poor quality of marble that has badly shaded and used lower case lettering to for names on the earliest stones. It could be Benoni Gleason who carved these stones for his parents and his four children. All of the lower case lettered stones are dated before his death. Benoni Gleason signed his will with an X.

John Hall of Sudbury was an early carver in this area. Could Benoni Gleason been working for him and working from Hall's stencils? Then on his own, carved his family stones

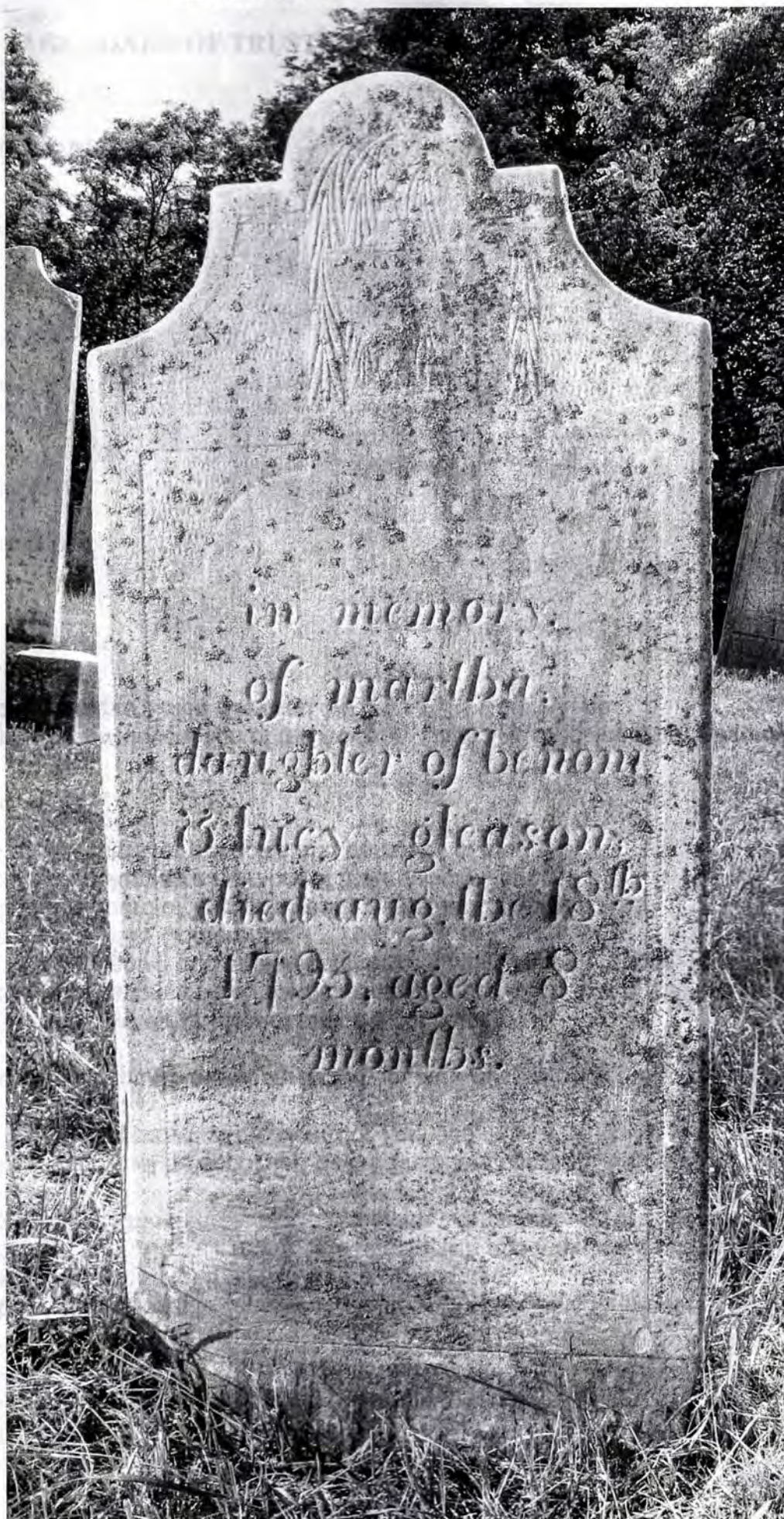

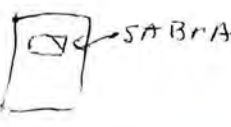

Good quality marble deposits extend into Brandon. E. W. Judd of Middlebury began the sawing of marble in Brandon about 1811, the first sawing of marble in this county. The marble was brought from Pittsford to Brandon on Otter Creek. In 1828 Justus Hyatt built a marble mill on the lower falls. In 1845 Stephen L. Goodell ran the mill and was carving grave stones. He enlarged the business, purchased quarries, and in 1865, formed Brandon Statuary Marble Company which erected a large mill on the upper falls at a cost of \$48,000. [Smith & Rann, p. 489].

It appears this was a payment for securing the stone that was almost certainly carved in Middletown Springs and similar to his father's stone and others believed to have been carved by Josiah Caswell.

Janet Muff has named this carver "Wheelchair Wheelie"

This carver used a poor quality of marble that has badly shaded and used lower case lettering to for names on the earliest stones. It could be Benoni Gleason who carved these stones for his parents and his four children. All of the lower case lettered stones are dated before his death. Benoni Gleason signed his will with an X.

John Hall of Sudbury was an early carver in this area. Could Benoni Gleason been working for him and working from Hall's stencils? Then on his own, carved his family stones

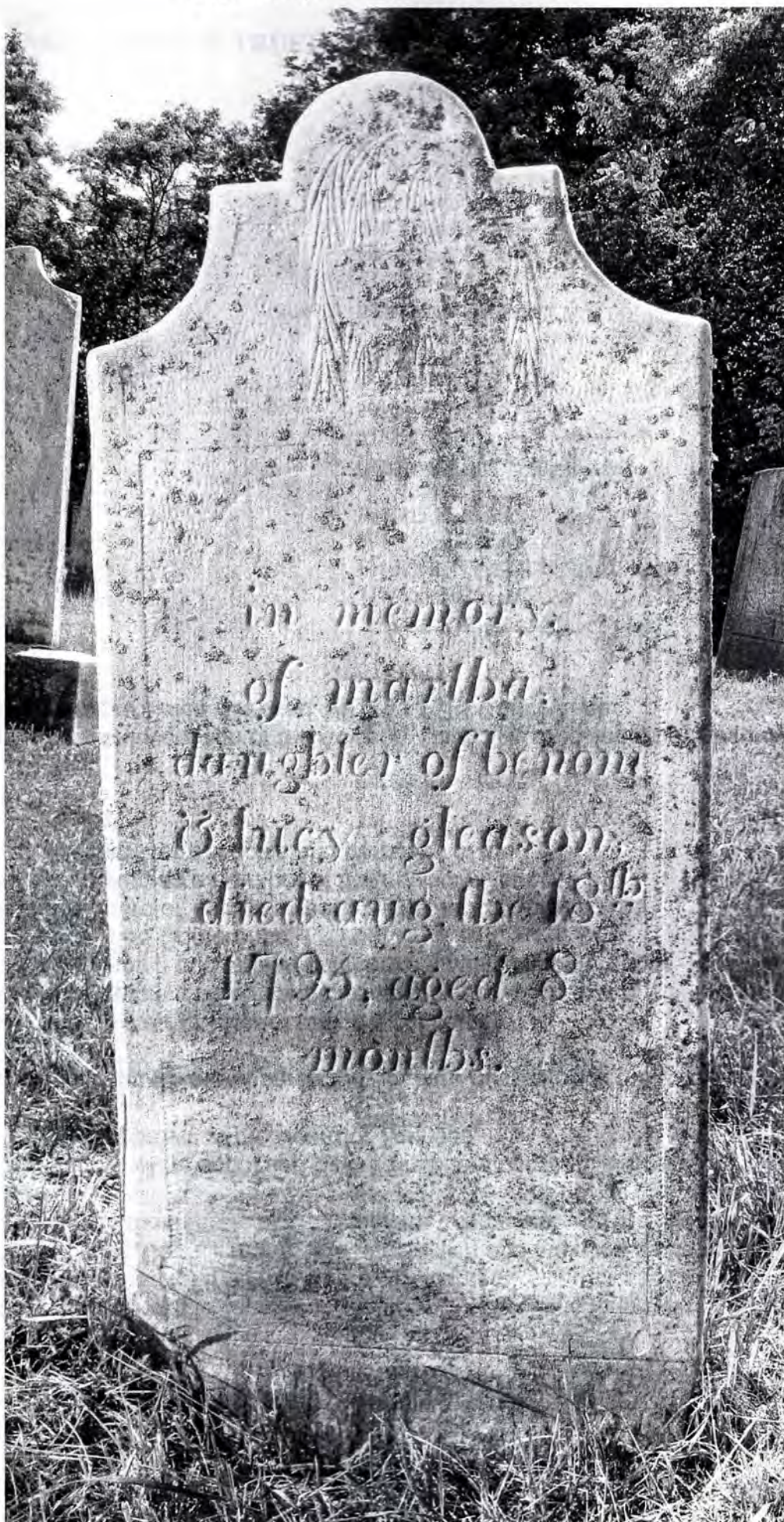

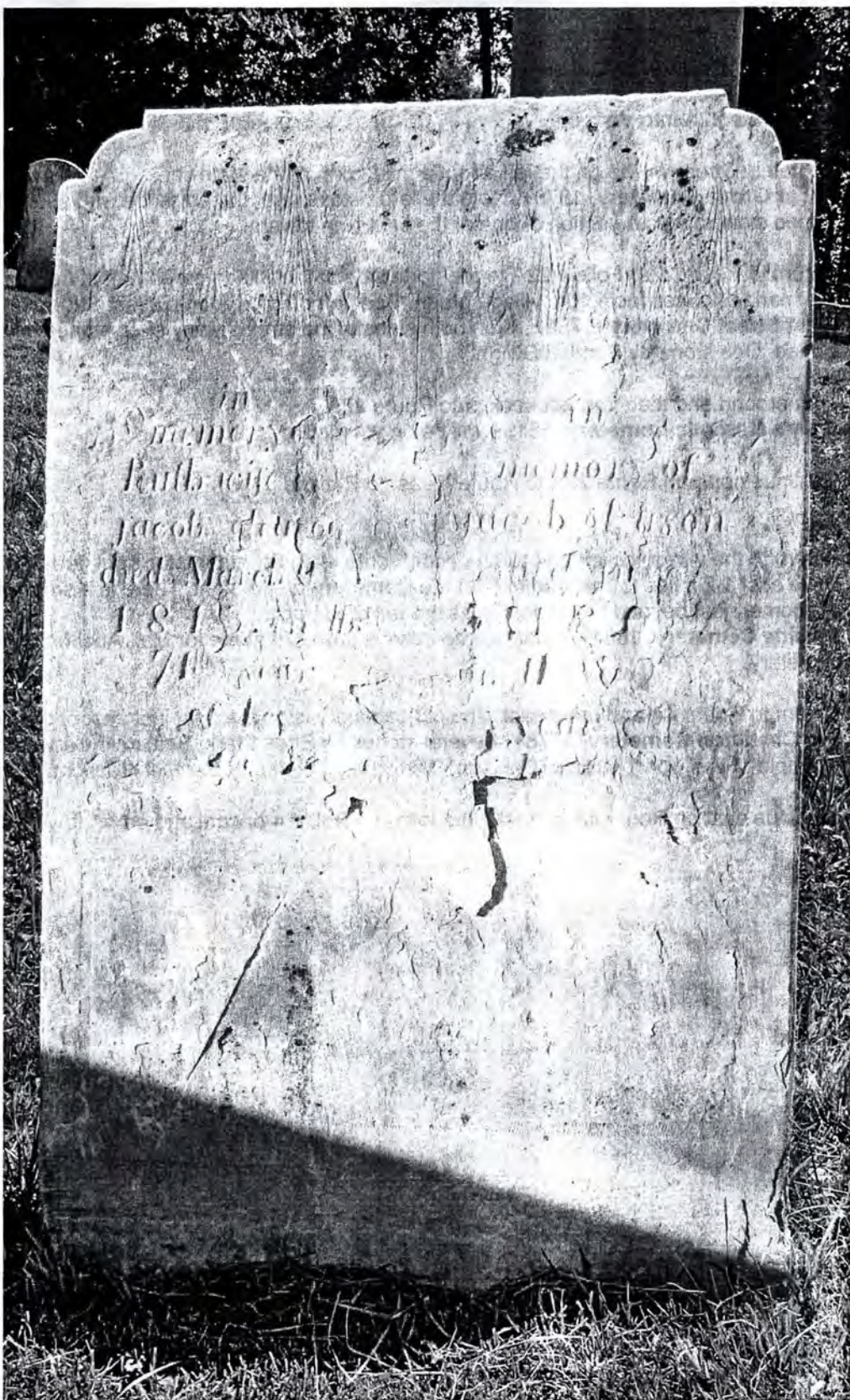

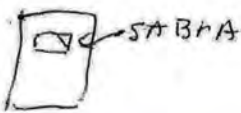

Good quality marble deposits extend into Brandon. E. W. Judd of Middlebury began the sawing of marble in Brandon about 1811, the first sawing of marble in this county. The marble was brought from Pittsford to Brandon on Otter Creek. In 1828 Justus Hyatt built a marble mill on the lower falls. In 1845 Stephen L. Goodell ran the mill and was carving grave stones. He enlarged the business, purchased quarries, and in 1865, formed Brandon Statuary Marble Company which erected a large mill on the upper falls at a cost of \$48,000. [Smith & Rann, p. 489].

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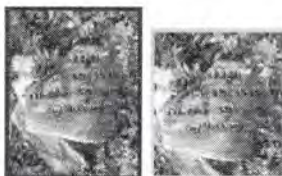

DEACON ASA HALE OF RUTLAND

Deacon Asa Hale, b. 6 Nov. 1759 Glastonbury, CT, died Dec. 2, 1843 age 84 years Rutland. SAR marker by his stone in the North Main Street Cemetery, Rutland. (Swan, Marvel G., "Early Families of Rutland," p.188)

He m. Dorcas Mead, b. 24 Jan. 1763, d. 16 Oct. 1824, dau. of James & Mercy (Holmes) Mead. Buried North Main St., Rutland. [ibid]

Asa took an active part in the Revolutionary war. He often advertised for flax seed which he made into linseed oil at his mill. [ibid]

Asa Hale of Rutland was **paid \$76.54** for the gravestones of Deac. Matthew Finton and Mrs. Hannah Finton. (Swan, Marvel G., "Early Families of Rutland," p.136. Matthew and Hannah were some of the first in Rutland to die in the epidemic that swept Vermont in the spring of 1813.) There is no indication Asa Hale was a carver. He probably acted as an agent for William Denison. See the Denison work. The stones stand, facing west, (1994), near the rear of the North Main Street Cemetery.

Asa Hale's estate accounts make no mention of gravestone carving tools. [Rutland District Probate 20:103-06]

JOHN HALL of SUDBURY

"John Hall of Sudbury, [? Sr. or Jr.] taught his cousin, David Hall (1795-1860) of Pittsford to carve gravestones." (Caverly p. 349) How are they cousins?

JOHN HALL (Sr.) of SUDBURY

"John Hall was a native of Connecticut. He married and had one son, John, grown to manhood, when he located in this town in 1774. The family resided on the west side of the creek, though the exact lot occupied cannot be determined. They removed to Sudbury about the year 1780." [A.M. Caverly, *History of the Town of Pittsford, Vermont*, 1872, p. 50]

John Hall was b. ca 1755, d. 26 Nov. 1832 Portland, NY. [Mary Anne Z. Wheeler, *Sudbury Vermont*, 2000, p. 46]
He m. June 7, 1781 Pownal, VT, Sarah Reynolds, b. ca 1763, d. after 1840, dau. of Caleb Reynolds.

A family tree on Ancestry, with no documentation: John Hall, b. June 21, 1757, son of a Ruth Seynour, d. Nov. 26, 1832 Portland, Chautauqua, NY, m. June 7, 1781 Pownal, VT, Sarah Reynolds. He enlisted at Ticonderoga in 1766 in Capt. Downs Co. of Sharon, Litchfield, CT and served several places and at the Battle of Monmouth.

In Sudbury, John Hall was a moderator in 1789 & was at the Dorset Convention [Hemenway 3:]

"John Hall of Sudbury [?Sr.or Jr.] taught his cousin David Hall [1795-1860] of Pittsford to carve gravestones." (Caverly, p. 349)

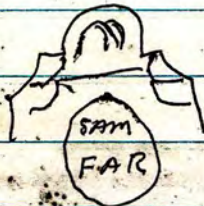

Job Winslow, Jr. s. of John Winslow and Margaret Cooley, d. of record June 18, 1825 at Pittsford, VT (Town Rec.), but neither the record nor the extant portion of his gravestone include his age at death. His parents married of record in 1780 and his father purportedly died in 1785 with Job, Jr. estimated to have been born circa 1783.

He is called "Job" [q.v. Jobadiah?] in the two federal censuses in which he appears at Pittsford while the town cemetery record calls him "Jebediah." He is also called "Jeb" in the Pittsford town records regarding his children. The town records that include Job also include multiple erroneous family associations, erroneously calling the death of son Loyal as Lloyd, the son of Loyal's own elder brother Elhanah and his wife Elmina. But, finally Job's wife's own fully extant gravestone clearly calls him as Job.

There is a long write up on him in: Smith & Rann, *History of Rutland Co.*, 895-96. "At the age of fourteen he was bound as an apprentice for a term of seven years to learn the trade of marble mason. There were marble quarries in Plymouth from which are taken different grades and colors of stone as well as slate. He sailed for the United States in 1852 landing in New York. He worked in a large marble shop four years, then found his way to Vermont. There he accepted a position with the West Castleton Railroad and Slate Company. After a few years in the area, he went into business for himself with James Coulman making mantels and monuments, chiefly of marble.

"He became interested in the business of marbleizing slate and introduced some new colors "Plymouth Black," "Prince Rock," "St Ann's" and others. He was skilled in marbleizing slate to make it resemble marble. The business grew. Work on a mantel was nearly completed; when he through the mantle into the tub to be marbleized. He also fell in and both were marbleized. [ibid]

"In 1870 his factory was destroyed by fire. Soon after he formed the Fairhaven Marble and Marbelized Slate Company. [ibid 896] "In 1881 R. Hanger settled in Fair Haven and built the mills he now operates. [1880s] He has two quarries and employees between 40 & 50 men. He has shipped over 200,000 feet of slate in one year." [ibid 544] There is a picture of him on page 545.

HANGER, RYLAND, the subject of this sketch is descended from an ancient family of Holsworthy, North Devon, England, and is a son of William and Harriet Hanger, of Plymouth, county of Devon. William Hanger held a position under His Majesty's government in Plymouth Dock as foreman of smiths in the navy yard; and afterward labored successfully as an evangelist and minister of the gospel in parts of South Devon and East Cornwall. He was beloved and respected, and died in 1849 at the age of fifty-seven. He had nine children, of whom Ryland is the seventh.

Ryland Hanger was born in Plymouth, county of Devon, England, in 1830. During his youth he was given but limited educational advantages, and at the early age of fourteen was bound as an apprentice for a term of seven years to learn the trade of marble mason. During his apprenticeship his naturally studious and investigating turn of mind led him outside of the mere mechanical work of his trade. There are marble quarries at Plymouth, from which are taken different grades and colors of stone, as well as slate. These different varieties he studied and became thoroughly familiar with their grain and the veining in their surfaces. On the completion of his apprenticeship he was offered by his employer a position as foreman. But another destiny awaited him; he had heard of the attractions offered in the New World and read a traveler's record of a tour in America; this, with his natural thirst for travel, his desire for broader knowledge of the world and his natural love for republican institutions, prompted him to sail for the United States, which he did in 1852, landing in New York. There he worked in one of the large marble shops four years and then found his way to Vermont on a visit to a friend. Here he was persuaded to accept a position with the West Castleton Railroad and Slate Company. This company had been organized about two years, and at that time were the only ones engaged in the slate business in Vermont. He remained with the company three years, when he removed to Hydeville, and was employed by the Hydeville Slate Company one year, and one year by the Forest Mining and Slate Company.

He now felt a desire to enter into business for himself, and for that purpose removed, in 1859, to Fairhaven and associated himself with James Coulman in a building previously used for a woolen factory by Hiram Kilburn. The firm of Coulman & Hanger continued in a small way, making mantels and monuments, chiefly of marble; at the same time they introduced a few slate mantels and experimented with the different colors in the endeavor to make them a successful article of sale. This was no easy task at that time, when marbleizing of slate was in the hands of one or two persons. In 1861 Mr. Coulman desired to visit England; the business prospects of the firm were not over-flattering, and he accordingly sold out to Mr. Hanger. The business depression incident to the war was spreading over the country; no specie was in circulation and the necessities of trade forced dealers in mantels to exchange them for boots and shoes, pork and other farmer's produce; but they still sold. Greenbacks were then issued, business revived, and Mr. Hanger says that while they were looked upon with some suspicion by a few, they appeared beautiful in his eyes and he was glad to get them.

About this time new colors were introduced in the marbleizing business by him, such as "Plymouth Black," "Prince Rock," "St. Ann's," "Venetian," and several others. These, with the others previously used, made a large variety, and their artistic use gave a wonderful impetus to the business. The little woolen factory began to present a scene of busy life, and on many occasions the light of the burning midnight oil shone in Mr. Hanger's "sanctum," while he carried on his experiments; on many occasions his enthusiasm kept him at work until morning dawned.

Marbleizing was at that time looked upon as a secret process, and was very jealously

guarded; consequently Mr. Hanger had to do most of his work in person for several years, and much of it after his men had left the shop. On one occasion he had a large mantel to marbleize by the dipping process; the work was accomplished all but a heavy shelf, in the handling of which he was thrown into the tub and shelf and man were both marbleized together.

In the course of his experimenting, slate lamp bases were introduced; previous to this black and white marble only had been used. Mr. Hanger obtained a sample of the black and determined to imitate it; he made a number of samples, but so suspicious were the trade that they did not care to handle them, fearing numerous imitations; hence the first slate lamp bases that were made were traded for a box of lamp chimneys. It was not long afterward that 75,000 lamp bases were made and sold by him in one year.

James Pottle was subsequently taken into partnership with Mr. Hanger, and the business was rapidly increased. In 1870 their factory was destroyed by fire and shortly afterward Mr. Hanger formed the Fairhaven Marble and Marbleized Slate Company. In this organization he retained his interest until 1875, when he sold out and for a time rested from his work. After a period of quiet he found that an inactive life was not to his taste, and purchased property in Hydeville, where he is now located in the same line of business. Hydeville promises fair in the near future to contend in friendly rivalry for supremacy in the slate business of the county.

The reader of the preceding chapters of this work need not be told that the slate business, one of the most valuable features of which is the marbleizing process, which enables manufacturers to imitate the various marbles, woods and other attractive surfaces, is one of the greatest industries of the State; it ranks next to the marble industry in Rutland county and is a source of great wealth and prosperity. For much of its present success it is not too much to say that the community is indebted to the subject of this sketch.

While on a visit from New York to England in 1854, Mr. Hanger was married to Annie E. Downing, of Elburton, parish of Plymstock, near Plymouth, England. Through all of his subsequent career she was his sympathizing helpmate until her death. She died in 1871. They had no children.

NOAH D. HART, prob. RUTLAND.

Accts. of Oliver Patterson, Adm., 4 May 1829. [Rutland Dist. Probate 13:403-04]:

Noah D. Hart was paid \$21 for the gravestone of **David Patterson** who died 21 June 1827 in 64th y., SAR. West Street Cem., row 18, broken in 1955. The old broken stone was replaced in 2010 by Tom Giffin of VOCA. The broken original stone remains behind the new stone. The other Patterson stones in the cemetery have basic lettering, no decoration.

DAVID / PATTERSON / PVT / CONTINENTAL / LINE / REV. WAR / AUG. 7, 1863 / JUNE 21, 1827

Who was **NOAH D. HART**, b. ?, say by 1805, d. no surviving stone in Rutland about 1955 when the DAR ladies copied the cemeteries.

However there is a Rutland vital record card dated 7/22/21 for the Pleasant St. cemetery:

Noah D. Hart, d. 1822, Sculptor. This stone is not on the DAR lists and was illegible or gone by 1993. If this actually read 1832 it could be for the carver.

The Rutland Herald of 16 Sept. 1823 noted: "**N. D. Hart** invented teasing machine for clothiers." [Dawn D. Hance, Extracts from the Rutland Weekly Herald, 1821 - 1825, p. 34]

Then on 22 Aug. 1826: Rutland: "J. Grove & J. Dike Jr. have Hart's improved machine for raising knaps on cloth. Williamstown, VT, Elijah Paine, Judge of US District Court in VT, says **Noah D. Hart** of Rutland, invented the machine." [ibid, 1826-1830, p. 21]

Who was **Noah D. Hart of Rutland in 1829**? Is he the same man who invented the machine for raking knaps? If so, he probably was not the man who died in 1822 or the records should read 1832.

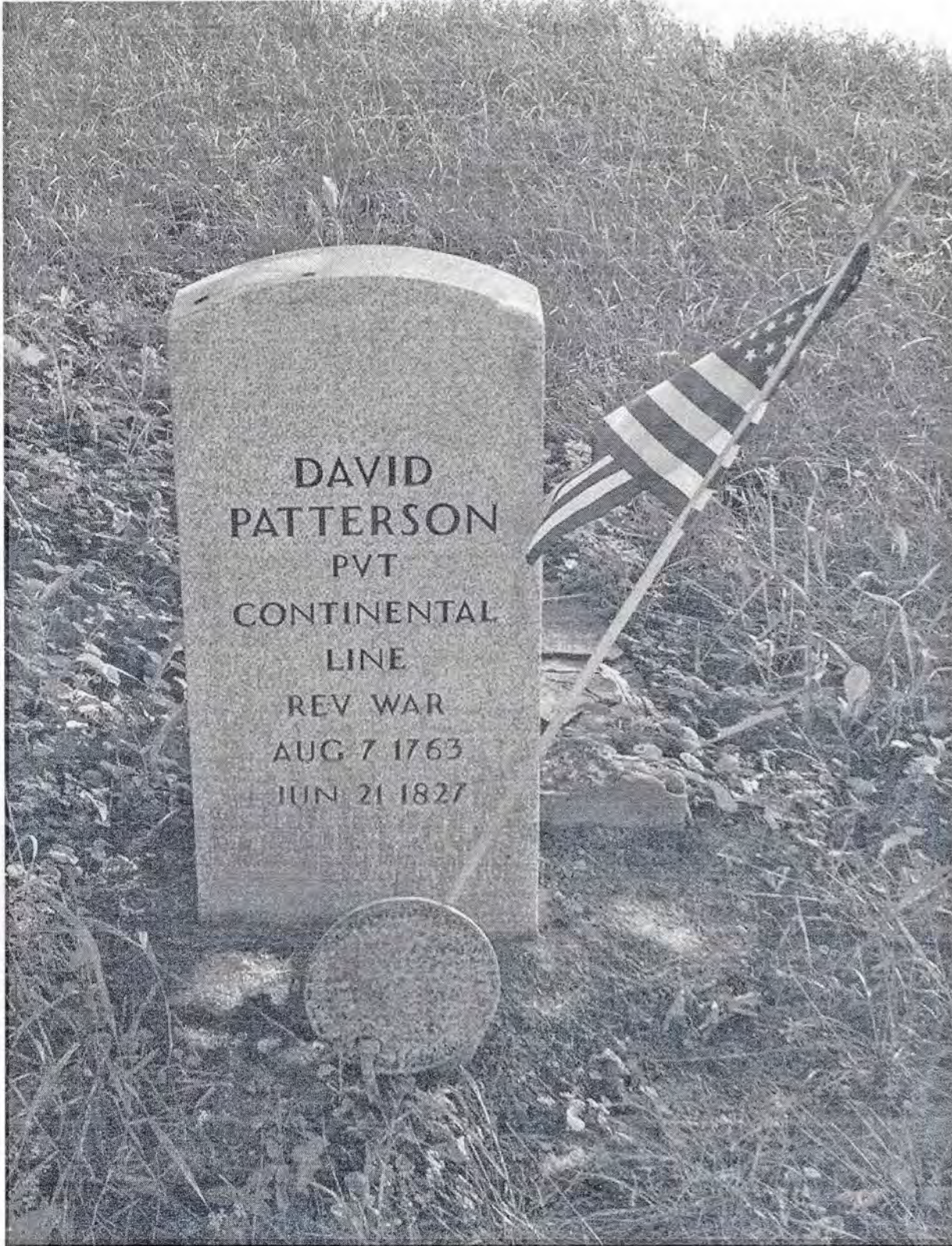
Josiah Hart served in the Revolutionary War from CT. It is said that during the war he was in a party of soldiers that camped near a spring on the Dyer farm (South Main St area near the Clarendon line)... [Hance p. 408]

Edward Dyer settled in Rutland in 1789. On his farm, Capt. Josiah Hart, & a party of Rev. soldiers camped while on their way from Bellows Falls to Ticonderoga. Soon after the war, Mr. Hart visited Rutland, sought out the spring near which the encampment was made & resolved to settle there which he did. He constructed the first church in Rutland Village and died in 1811 age 72. He had a grandson George D. Hart. [Smith & Rann p. 323]

In June 1784 master builder John Ramsdell and Issachar Reed began construction of the new Meeting House, which was located on the west side of North Main St, (just south of the cemetery). It was constructed of pine lumber that came from Josiah Hart's farm on Cold River Rd. West. Hart also helped in construction. [Hance, 264]

Coroner - The Hawley / Holley Family of Dorset, Bennington Co., VT

The study of this family has been undertaken to identify "H. Hawley, Scupl. Dorset" signer of the 1823 stone for Maria Young in the Green Hill Cemetery in Wallingford. I believe that either Hiram or Harvey Hawley was the carver. Both listed "Marble" as their occupation in 1850. The vital records seem to use the Holley spelling, the census the Hawley spelling. From the records studied, the name Hawley/Holly/Holley seem to be interchangeable.

In 1900 at Auburn, Cayuga Co., NY census, grandson Eli K. Holley, was a commercial traveler for the marble works.

1. **JUSTUS HOLLEY [HAWLEY]** was b. 5 Feb. 1765 CT (not in Barbour Coll), d. 29 April 1849 age 86 y. 2 m. Dorset, VT VR, bur. Maple Hill Cem.

He m. Sept. 1790 VR, **ELIZABETH FIELD**, b. 29 Oct. 1773 CT, d. 28/29 Nov. 1858 age 85y. 1 mo., VR, bur. Maple Hill Cem., prob. dau. of Amos Field of Mansfield, CT, an early settler of Dorset. [Resch, p. 51].

Justus built the Wade Inn (Story of Dorset). He came in 1780 age 16 and was in the Battle of Bennington. He settled on West Road where he was a farmer and tailor. Elizabeth Field was a babe when her family came to Dorset from Mansfield, CT. Their children: Laura, Almeda, Electa, Harvey, Hiram, Martha, Justus, Spafford F., George H., Harriet, Rhoda. [Aldrich, *Hist. of Bennington, Co.*, 1889, p. 417.]

Tyler Resch's, *Dorset in the Shadow of Marble Mountain*, Dorset Hist. Soc., 1989, p. 52] Justus Holley came from Richmond, MA. [Richmond was established in 1765 from plantation lands in Berkshire Co., MA. There is nothing in the book of VR's on Justus or his parentage.] He served as a fifer in Capt. Robinson's Bennington militia, where his request for a gun instead of a musical instrument was refused because of the regiment's need for a musician. [Not listed as a pensioner in the 1840 census.] They lived on West Road where he combined farming and tailoring. He would travel the valley each fall to cut garments and prepare them for women to sew during the winter.

Justus at age 16 was at the Battle of Bennington. He came to Dorset in 1780. He was a musician. He had played the fife at the Battle. Humphrey, Zephine, *The Story of Dorset*, 1924, Rutland, p. 50. Justus lived in Bennington till 1790 when he married Elizabeth Field. He walked to Dorset to see his bride to be. He built his first house where Wade's Inn is located, but soon moved to West Road. (Humphrey, p. 74) On p. 204 she adds: "Justin Jr. lived where his father had, 4 children. His brother George m. dau. of Uriel Kent.

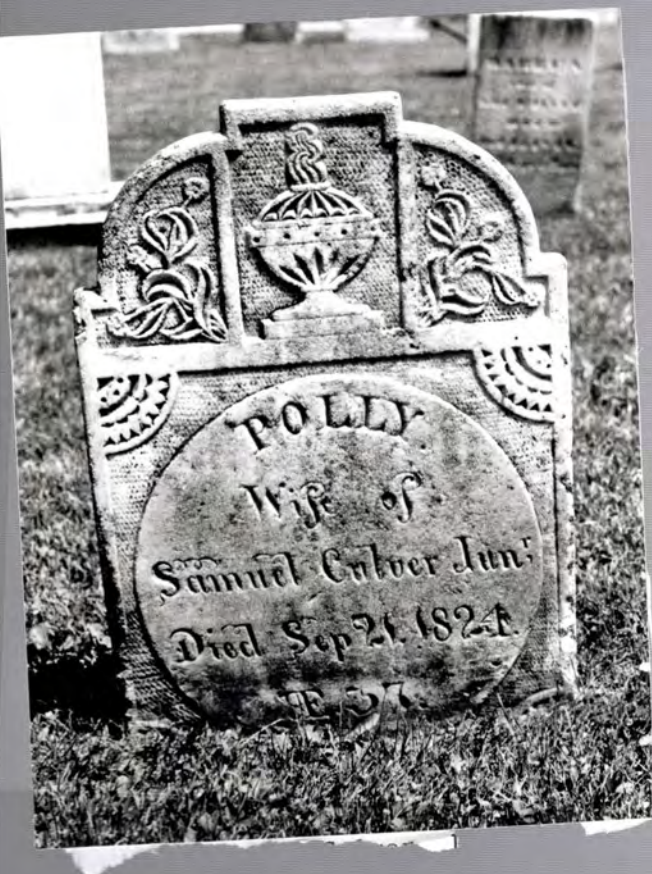
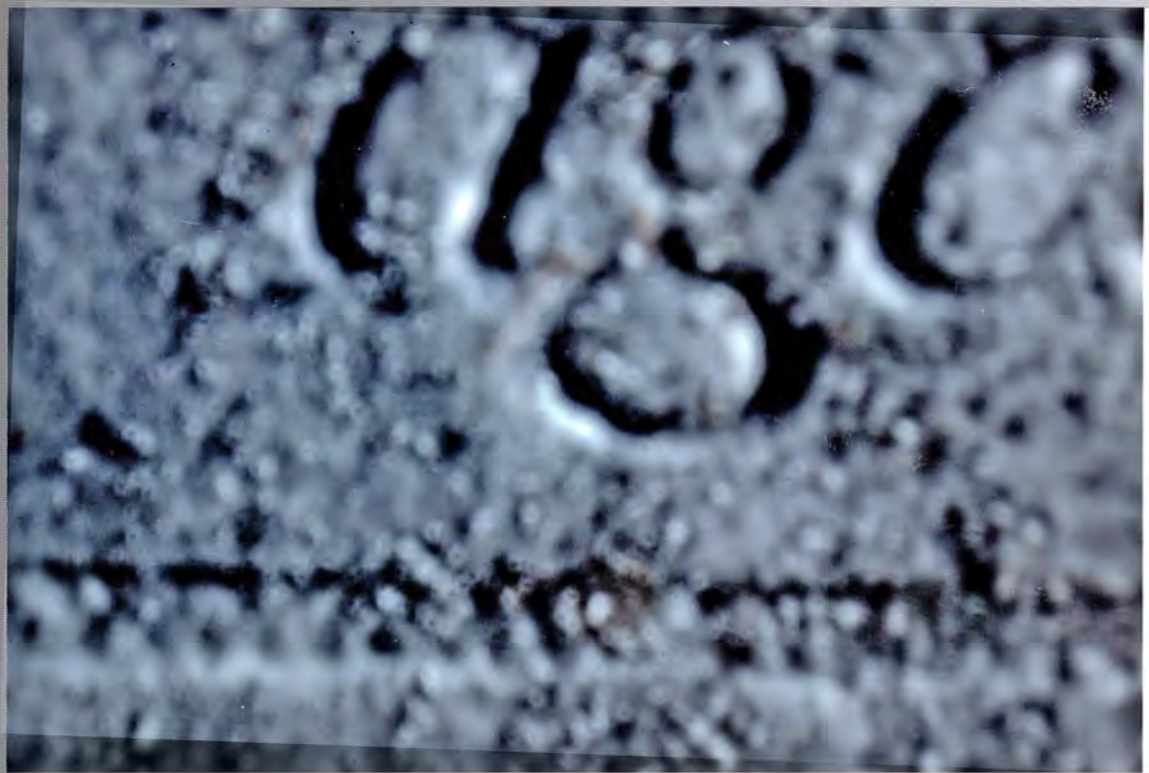
