

JOHN HORTON of Sudbury, Vermont 1813-1894

JOHN HORTON (John 6.605; William 5.307; Moses 4.135, 3.36; Solomon 2.6; Thomas 1.1. Jenks, Margaret R., Descendants of Thomas Horton of Milton & Rehoboth, MA, 1984, #6.605.) was b. ca 1813 Orwell. Sudbury VR: John Horton, b. CT, son of William & Mable Horton, d. 26 Jan. 1894 age 81-5-3, married, currier.

He m. say by 1835, SARAH A. GROVER, b. ca 1818 Sudbury, VT; d. bef. the 1880 census.

- John Horton was a marble peddler in 1850 and a stone cutter in 1870 & 1880. Unless John Horton carved the stone for his infant daughter, Ladaskie A. in 1837, there are no records of any stones he carved. In 1850, he was most likely peddling marble for Stephen L. Goodell of Brandon.

H. A. HOTCHKISS, Poultney 1850s prof. on agent for allow & adom

H. A. Hotchkiss was paid \$20.00 for the Sept. 3, 1850 gravestone for Miles Hotchkiss. This stone has was carved all in capital letters and he "DIED" had a very fancy "E". They all used "AE" rather than "age". Several other East Poultney stones have been found with the same "DIED" and one in Castleton.

Probably H. A. Hotchkiss was a son of Miles Hotchkiss and either carved or purchase his father 's stone.

No H. A. Hotchkiss has been found in the area at this time. Can the "H. A." be a misreading of "H. M." or "Horace W."?

Unfortunately all of the Poultney town records were lost in a fire in 1862.







Hovey, James

Part of the research on the Southworth carvers of Dorset & Benson

Too much of the data here is based on the old LDS PAF & IGI files that contained too many errors. All need to be revised. See the file folder.

See also the "Mirror Man" file

However, James Hovey of Mansfield, CT with a picture of a stone he carved in Slater, James, *The Colonial Burying Grounds of Eastern Conn...* p. 33. The face on the pictures stone is much like the face of "Mirror Man". The lettering needs to be compared.

Interest in the Hovey family of Mansfield, CT centers around finding that the Benjamin Southworth, b. 14 Nov. 1805 Dorset, VT was a grandson of Josiah & Miriam (Hovey) Southworth of Mansfield, CT and Dorset, VT. Benjamin Southworth, moved to Benson, VT between 1830 & 1840 where he opened a marble shop & carved gravestones. Unless Benjamin returned to CT to learn the trade of marble carving, it was learned in Dorset. Marble quarries were opened there as early as 1785. There are a number of men, including Jonas Stewart & his son, who are known to have carved stones in the Dorset area in the early 1800s. Certainly marble was the major industry of the area as Benjamin was growing up. A question remains: Why did Josiah Southworth move to Dorset, VT between 1791 & 1800?

Mansfield, CT is next to Columbia, CT where the Collins family of carvers lived. Could Josiah Southworth have been a carver?

A James Hovey carved gravestones in Mansfield in the 1750s. He must have been born say by 1720-25. Several possible James have been found in the Mansfield records. The James Hovey, Jr. b. 1695 was uncle of Miriam (Hovey) Southworth. Miriam's first cousins.

James Hovey, b. 1725, son of James Jr. was a good age to have been the carver; James Hovey, b. 1737 son of Edmund, was probably too young to have carved stones in the 1750s. One other James Hovey, b. 21 June 1719 Malden, MA (IGI) son of James & Elizabeth (-) Hovey has appeared. He could be a son of James Hovey, Sr. if the death date for the first wife Deborah is wrong. More research is needed. The James, b. 1743, son of Nathaniel & Abigail (-) Hovey of Tolland, was too young to be the carver of Mansfield.

FHL's PAF program (known to contain many errors) shows James b. 1674 Brookfield, MA son of James & Priscilla (Dane/Dean) Hovey. Hovey Gen. #5: James2 of Ipswich, m. Priscilla, not dau. of John Dane. Torrey's NE Marriages p.391 lists a James, d. 1675 m. 2 Nov. 1670 Priscilla Warner, they of Ipswich & Brookfield. Savage 2:470 James of Ipswich son of Daniel & Rebecca (Andrews) Hovey, had a son Daniel & was killed by Indians 2 Aug. 1675. Thus James' ancestry needs further research.

FHL's PAF program shows Deborah Barlow as dau. of ? & Mary (Pemberton) Barlow. Torrey's NE Marriages p.42 lists Edmund/Edward Barlow d. 1697, m. by 1661 Mary Pemberton, b. 1636, they of Charlestown. Savage 1:117: Edward Barlow of Malden, m. Mary dau. of James Pemberton bef. 1660 as her father's will shows they had children. [Hovey Gen. p.68 agrees]

I hope this information will be of help to you. It took me years to connect Edmund to his family. Doing New England genealogy in Dallas is not very expedient.


You may recognize my name. You sent me copies of your charts on John PERS and Anthony PEIRCE in June of 1993. Looks like we are related once again.

PARENTAGE OF DANIEL HOVEY.



HE origin of Daniel Hovey, the ancestor of the American Hovey family, has hitherto been unknown to genealogists, and it would have continued to be a matter for investigation had it not been for a chance discovery in 1905 by John Albree of Swampscott, Mass. He was making a search in the

Boston public library for a copy of a work mentioned in an account of the unfortunate Sir Henry Moody, son of Lady Deborah Moody, the versatile, interesting and almost forgotten English woman of noble birth and breeding who "was (good, poor lady) almost undone by buying Master Humphries farme, Swampscott." The library possesses four copies, and by chance the one Mr. Albree chose for examination proved to be the one with the record of the birth of Daniel Hovey. The title is: "G. de Saluste du Bartas: His Devine Weekes and Workes, with a Compleate Collection of all the other most delightfull Works Translated and written by yt famous Philomusus Iosvah Sylvester Gent: London Printed by Humfrey Lownes, dwelling on Bread Street Hill, 1621."

The eye of the reader caught the following on page 200:-

Daniel Hovey his boke hee was born in waltham aby y' 9th of August 1618. Son of Richard Hovey of y' sam town, sent him by M' John Gibons y' minister of that town, sent him as a token from him in 37. y' yer of the pequod wars.

Daniel Hovey.*

This inspired further search, and on page 266 the record again appeared in different form:—

Could this be indeed fresh material? Was it a fact that at length had come to light a record made over two centuries ago? Was it an autograph? As to the last it was an easy matter to verify the signature by that on the will at the Essex probate office and other family papers. It was also readily found that no record was known as to the place of Hovey's birth, nor as to the exact date. Why should he have chosen this book for this record? The thought suggested itself to Mr. Albree that some knowledge of the personality of the founder of the Hovey

family and his associates might be found in the book.

The volume itself is a large octavo of thirteen hundred pages, bound in full leather. In the middle of each cover are the letters D and H, stamped deeply, each being separated with a conventional bookbinder's design. These are the initials of Daniel Hovey's name; and does the fact that they are in so conspicuous a place indicate that he had a pride in the possession of his books? Possibly these initial letters may have been stamped on the covers in England as the book was about to be presented to young Daniel, who was then but nineteen. In his will he makes specific bequests of books, and from their number and character it is known that he had a good library. This particular book, however, is not mentioned by name. But there is sufficient internal evidence to trace the book into his possession, by the entries in different styles of chirography and at various dates.

On the inside of the front cover is written:-

Mary Wise.

At page 155 is this orphic statement, not however in Hovey's handwriting:—

On page 556 are written in different handwritings these several statements:—

The second of these statements, that of the grandson, is crossed out, perhaps by some later owner who thought that in this way he could dispose of any evidence of possession or ownership by another.

The history of the ownership of the volume appears to be complete and without a break from Daniel Hovey. It went first by will to the grandson Daniel, then by sale to Francis Wainwright, and then, by gift, to Joseph Sewall, who was the pastor of the Old South Church, in Boston. Thomas Prince, who accumulated the Prince library, was his associate, and a number of Sewall's books are in the Prince library now, whether by gift or purchase is not material at this late day.

Guillaume de Salluste du Bartas, the author of this book, was a French poet, born in 1544, who died of wounds received in the battle of Ivry, having commanded a troop of horse in Gascony. His principal work, "La Divine Sepmaine," an epic poem on the creation of the world, was so popular that thirty editions were issued within six years after 1579, when it first appeared. It was translated into Gascon French, Italian, Spanish, German,

English, Latin, and, later, Swedish and Danish.* Its style and religious tone made it a great favorite with English writers in his time, and was influential in forming English style. Joshua Sylvester, a Spenserian poet, translated this as well as the "Weekes and Workes" of Du Bartas into English. This poem is divided into portions for reading each week, hence the name "Weekes."

After the discovery of this book and the manuscript entries, Mr. Albree wrote to the clerk of the parish of Holy Cross, Walthams England, requesting verification of the record. The curate, Rev. J. Henry Stamp, answered, saying that the parish registers were under his charge, and enclosing an attested copy of the record of baptism of Daniel Hovey, which corresponded exactly with the statement in the book. He, also, subsequently sent copies of all the Hovey baptisms, marriages and burials recorded in the register, copies of several issues of a monthly historical publication issued by the parish, and five views of the church. The publication contained much of the history of the parish and information concerning Rev. John Guibon, who gave the book to Daniel Hovey. The copies of records sent by Rev. What is now the town or village of Waltham Holy Cross known as Waltham Abbey, as far back as the days of Hardicanute, was the hunting lodge of the Danish thane Tovi or Tovius, known as Tovi the Proud. Tovi subsequently founded there a small convent; and, through the wastefulness of Tovi's son Atheston, his family lost the grant in the days of Edward the Confessor. Waltham reverted to the crown; and it was subsequently granted to Harold, who built a new church or enlarged the existing one, dedicating the foundation to the Holy Cross May 3, 1060. Harold's body was buried by the high altar in the church. After the Conquest, various benefactions were received. Queen Maud gave a mill and Queen Adeliza the tithes of Waltham to the abbey, while from Stephen was received the confirmation of all privileges.*

The great forest there was long known as the forest of Waltham, and the part yet remaining is called Epping forest.

At Waltham Cross is the beautiful cross erected between 1291 and 1294 by Edward I. at one of the resting places of the corpse of Queen Eleanor while on its way to burial in Westminster Abbey. It is of Caen stone, and is supposed to have been designed by Pietro Cavalini, a Roman sculptor.


Waltham Abbey, or Waltham Holy Cross, is a market town of Essex county, and lies thirteen miles north of the Liverpool street station, London, on the Cambridge branch of the Great Eastern Railway. The town lies in a hollow, and the streets are for the most part crooked and narrow.

Waltham was the home of John Fox, the martyrologist, and

there a considerable portion of his work was written.

The parish has had several famous minisiters. Rev. John Guibon, who presented the copy of Du Bartas' "Weekes and Workes" to Daniel Hovey, was a resident of Waltham as early as 1629, and succeeded to the curacy of the Abbey church. He left Waltham in 1640, going to London, where he appears to have been preferred to the living of St. Anne's, near Aldersgate. He eventually became a member of the Westminster Assembly of Divines, and was elected chairman of one of the three committees into which the Assembly was divided. Like his great predecessor, Bishop Hall, Mr. Guibon retained his affection for his old parish. He was ejected from the living of St. Anne's, and soon after died of consumption, the burial taking place in Waltham.

DANIEL HOVEY AND HIS DESCENDANTS.



ANIEL HOVEY, the ancestor of the American Hoveys, was born at Waltham Abbey, in Essex county, England, Aug. 9, 1618, being son of Richard Hovey, a glover, of that place. He was apparently a man of education, and the fact that the curate of his parish church was friendly to and interested in him

while he was in his teens and far away in a strange land, indicates that there were elements in his character which drew and held attention to him. He was one of the early settlers of Ipswich, ✓ Massachusetts, in 1635, at the age of seventeen. Feb. 5, 1637, the town granted to him six acres of land on Muddy creek; and also "Granted to Daniell Hovey, an house lott, I acre of ground on the South syde of the Town River, having a house lott, granted to William Holdred on the West, and a house lott granted to Thomas Sherman on the East. Also six acres of planting ground, lying on Sagamore Hill, having a planting lott, formerly granted Henry Wilkinson on the West, and a planting lott granted to William Holdred on the East: to enjoy the sayde Landes, to him, his heirs, or assigns forever. Entered this 27th day of March 1639."* The freemen of the town granted to William Holdred a house lot of half-an-acre adjoining Daniel Hovey's on the southwest, being on the south side of the river, and bounded by the house lot of Roger Preston on the southwest; also six acres of planting ground on Sagamore hill adjoining Daniel Hovey's planting lot west, and the planting lot of Roger Preston on the east; the grants being entered April 9, 1639; and both of these lots were conveyed by Mr. Holdred to "Daniel Hovey of Ipswich, planter," and, also, one dwelling house built on the house lot and all the fencing belonging to both lots. Entered April 10, 1639.*

Could this be indeed fresh material? Was it a fact that at length had come to light a record made over two centuries ago? Was it an autograph? As to the last it was an easy matter to verify the signature by that on the will at the Essex probate office and other family papers. It was also readily found that no record was known as to the place of Hovey's birth, nor as to the exact date. Why should he have chosen this book for this record? The thought suggested itself to Mr. Albree that some knowledge of the personality of the founder of the Hovey family and his associates might be found in the book.

The volume itself is a large octavo of thirteen hundred pages, bound in full leather. In the middle of each cover are the letters D and H, stamped deeply, each being separated with a conventional bookbinder's design. These are the initials of Daniel Hovey's name; and does the fact that they are in so conspicuous a place indicate that he had a pride in the possession of his books? Possibly these initial letters may have been stamped on the covers in England as the book was about to be presented to young Daniel, who was then but nineteen. In his will he makes specific bequests of books, and from their number and character it is known that he had a good library. This particular book, however, is not mentioned by name. But there is sufficient internal evidence to trace the book into his possession, by the entries in different styles of chirography and at various dates.

On the inside of the front cover is written:-

At page 155 is this orphic statement, not however in Hovey's handwriting:—

The second of these statements, that of the grandson, is crossed out, perhaps by some later owner who thought that in this way he could dispose of any evidence of possession or ownership by another.

The history of the ownership of the volume appears to be complete and without a break from Daniel Hovey. It went first by will to the grandson Daniel, then by sale to Francis Wainwright, and then, by gift, to Joseph Sewall, who was the pastor of the Old South Church, in Boston. Thomas Prince, who accumulated the Prince library, was his associate, and a number of Sewall's books are in the Prince library now, whether by gift or purchase is not material at this late day.

Guillaume de Salluste du Bartas, the author of this book, was a French poet, born in 1544, who died of wounds received in the battle of Ivry, having commanded a troop of horse in Gascony. His principal work, "La Divine Sepmaine," an epic poem on the creation of the world, was so popular that thirty editions were issued within six years after 1579, when it first appeared. It was translated into Gascon French, Italian, Spanish, German,

The selectmen of Ipswich granted to him six pine trees, presumably for timber, at two times, three on Jan. 2, 1678, and

three Dec. 15, 1679.*

Daniel Hovey married Abigail, daughter of Robert and Elizabeth (Franklin?) Andrews of Ipswich, about 1641. Mr. Andrews died in 1643, having given to Mr. Hovey a legacy of ten pounds. In the settlement of the estate of Mrs. Hovey's brother Thomas Andrews, a prominent schoolmaster, Mr. Hovey certified to the county court as follows:—†

The real estate transactions to which Mr. Hovey was a par besides those that were grants from the town in the earl days are as follows: He owned, with others, twenty-five acr of marsh, which was divided Jan. 30, 1658.* He bought sever acres of upland and meadow in Topsfield, bounded north a northeast by the pond, east by a part of the Ipswich common south by upland and meadow of Robert Andrews and west common land and meadow, June 12, 1660.† When he was livi at Quabog, he conveyed a piece of marsh and "my farm in Tor field woh my son John now liveth in, to him he surrendering to i his land in Ipswich," and paying forty pounds and allowing the grantor thirty shillings a year during the latter's life; a also "my division of land at wheall brooke." June 13, 1671 While Mr. Hovey was still at "Quabaugh," he conveyed one-hi of an acre of land in Ipswich, lying on the south side of the rive together with the frame of a house standing on the adjoining land of his son Daniel and some shingles at Topsfield, May 1672.§ When Mr. Hovey lived at Hadley he sold twenty-fo rods of land in Ipswich, being part of that lot called Knowlton lot, on the south side of the river, May 1, 1677. After M Hovey's return to Ipswich, he sold one and one-half acres plowing land lying on the south side of the river in Ipswich, Fe 11, 1688-9. He also conveyed six acres and seventy-one squa rods of pasture land in Ipswich April 23, 1689.** He also co veyed one and one-half acres of plowing land in Ipswich, lyi on the south side of the river, next to the lot last above describ Oct. 12, 1689.††

Mrs. Hovey died between 1676 and 1683. He died in I wich April 24, 1692. His will was proved Oct. 31, 1692.

JAMES HOVEY², born in Ipswich, Mass., in 1650. He was one of the first settlers of Quabog, in Hampshire county, Mass., in 1668, and received a grant of a homelot, upon which he built a house and lived.

He married Priscilla, daughter of John Dane of Ipswick in 1670.

Mr. Hovey was one of the signers of the petition to the general court dated Oct. 10, 1673, praying for the incorporation of the settlement, and that it might receive the name of Brookfield.

The following is a copy of Mr. Hovey's signature to this petition:

The request was granted, and Quabog became a town, its name being changed to Brookfield.

Mr. Hovey was killed by the Indians, when a considerable

number of his townsmen were massacred, Aug. 2, 1675.

Mr. Hovey's wife Priscilla survived him; and she returned to the court an inventory which was taken Sept. 25, 1676. She was appointed administratrix. The inventory states that "Only ye land at Brookfeild by Reason of ye Indian wars & the Desolation at her dispose for the bringing up of the Children & when they Come to age to be devided amongst ye according to law." The following is a copy of the inventory:—

He married Hannah, daughter of Richard and Mary Pratt of Malden May 31, 1677; and died in the summer of 1693, administration upon his estate being granted to his brother John Hovey, sr., of Topsfield June 9, 1693. The inventory of his estate amounted to £11, 12s, 8d, being all personal: £1, 4s, of this amount was of "Things prized at Ipswich." The estate was declared insolvent; and Thomas Holman and Nathaniel Pitcher, both of Milton, were appointed commissioners to examine claims.

It is not often that the name of Slap or Slapp, as it was more commonly spelled, is found in genealogical queries. So of course I was interested in your query in *Branches and Twigs* for Winter, 1994.

In answer to your question, Daniel Hovey was the son of James and Deborah (Barlow) Hovey and was born in Malden, Massachusetts, 7 December 1710, according to *The Hovey Book* (1913) which traces the descendants of Daniel Hovey of Ipswich, Massachusetts. Your ancestor, Miriam, is number 328 in *The Hovey Book*.. I obtained my copy of the book from the circulating library of the New England Historic Genealogical Society, 101 Newbury Street, Boston.

Since I am a descendant of Elizabeth (Slapp) Hovey's brother, Major John Slapp, I did not copy much from that book when I borrowed it about ten years ago -- except the answer to your question.

I assume that you would be interested in the ancestry of Elizabeth Slapp, also, although you may already have it.

I have included a copy of her father, John Slapp's, will. If you want a better copy you can obtain one from the Windham Probate Court, P. O. Box 34, Willimantic, Connecticut 06226.

I have also included the notes sent me from Mss C 2396 which was written by a grandson of Elizabeth and Daniel Hovey and told about his family. In 1992 I asked the research service of the NEHGS to find any Slapp material for me that they had. The portion I have is chiefly about the Slapps but doubtless there is more about the Hoveys since it is a Hovey manuscript. Note the Slapp portion begins on page 30 of the Mss. The cover letter explains what they were able to find.

I hope this material is of use to you. If you are interested in the Slapps, I would be happy to compare notes.



MISCELLANEOUS EPITAPHS

Several curious epitaphs have been written upon dogs, pigs and horses in Rutland County, which have created much sensation and amusement in the community, which we insert here.

DOG MONUMENT.

Selah H. Langdon, merchant and owner of the linseed oil mill in Castleton village, in about 1840 owned a white bird dog of which he was very fond. But the dog had a habit which was the means of his death. He frequented the kitchens and back yards of his neighbors very much to their annoyance; and several times he had been known to walk in siyly and grab a piece of meat which was ready for dinner and run away with it. One evening early, a gun was heard and Mr. Langdon found his dog shot dead. That same evening he and several of his intimate friends were assembled in his room near the oil mill, as was frequently the case, to have a smoke, tell stories, play cards and sip a little New England rum, when about midnight it was suggested that they give the dog a respectable burial. So they dug a grave on the south side of the flume to the oil mill, a few feet from the water, and there buried the remains of his pet and neighbor's pest.

Thomas J. Ormsbee of Sutherland Falls suggested that a gravestone be erected to commemorate the event, which was agreed to by the party, and in a few days it was placed at the head of the grave, a conspicuous object from the mills and store; and everybody doing business there had the curiosity to read it. It ran as follows:—

Thanks to my few friends that I have lived to a good old age & lived happy. They protected me against my foolish enemies, to the last. SHOT.

Mr. Ormsbee was connected with the marble works at the Falls at the time and he got Deacon Humphrey to engrave the stone. After the stone was loaded and started for Castleton, the Deacon had the curiosity to know more about such a singular epitauh and wanted to know whose it was.

Mr. Ormsbee then gave him a history of the dog and event. The Deacon was horror struck and indignantly exclaimed:— "Sacrilege! Sacrilege! Had I known what it was for I never would have engraved it."

The cpitaph was composed by Mr. Langdon the owner of the dog.

PIG MONUMENT.

In the summer of 1876* Mr. Charles G. Childs of Sheffield Mass., had two fine pigs presented to him by Mr. W. E. Baker of Boston. They were sent to Castleton, Vt., and on the trip one died; and after several days the second one died.

Mr. Childs had it placed in a casket taken over to Neshobe Island and buried in the grove on the south-eastern point of land that extends into Lake Bomosecn.

Mr. Childs got a marble monument for the pig and on it was engraved the following epitaph:—

FRATERNAL WELCOME—A PIG DIED—BERKSBIRE.

The monument stood there several years, but the hand of vandalism defaced it; and when the island was fitted up for a summer resort the remains of the monument were dumped into the lake.

It is to be regretted that this monument could not have remained to have added to the attractiveness and interest of the island

DOG MONUMENT.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Slasson of West Rutland were always charmed with the beauties of Lake Bomoseen and used to spend much time in visiting its shores and camping in its shady groves. One summer Mrs. Sinsson lost a little pet dog, which she honored with a funeral procession, and buried its remains on the eastern shore of the lake near the water's edge. On the grave they erected a small marble monument upon which was engraved:

SANCHO PANZA, May 1865.

This mark of respect for the dog seemed singular to many people, and particularly so to a wag, who composed a hymn for the occasion. It was not sung however nor even found out till some time afterwards. We copy the hymn to Sancho entire:

Poor Sancho! sweet dog! thou art gone;
Thou'lt rest no more on our sofa;
And never gnaw another bone;
Nor bark at a lazy loafer.
No more will stones be thrown at thee.
Nor dry thy locks before the fire:
Nor chase the tom cat up a tree;
Nor lift thy leg to post or brier.
That bless'd dog-beaven is thy lot,
Where all are fed the best yeal cuts,
The most delicious steaks and chop,
And communion with clever sluts.

EPITAPE ON A HORSE.

Arunah and Pitt W. Hyde of Hydeville were in company in the Slate business and owned a mare that was over-worked and abused by

the teamster. One night she died, and one Levi Phillips wrote the following epitaph on the stable door. O'er yonder green hill lies "Runey's" old nag:

Pat. Welsh drawed her off with a bull and stag.

Peace to her ashes her labors are o'er. She'll feel the lash of the tyrant no more.

Pitt W., read it first and began to rail against the author, but when "Runey" came up and read it, said; "Oh that is sublime, if I knew the author I would give him a barrel of flour."

EPITAPH BEFORE DEATH.

When Castleton was first being settled, with only a few dwellings scattered here and there along the valley of Castleton river, there lived a man under the shadows of Bird's Mountain, by the name of Keasel. One evening a stranger called and wanted to stay over night. Keasel told him that he would keep him over night and give him his meals and lodging provided he would write him an epitaph. The stranger assented to the proposition: onebaif to be written that evening and the other half next morning. Supper was prepared for the weary

traveler and partaken of with a relish. When supper was over he took a seat in front of the large open fire place in which blazed one of the most cheerful fires of rock maple wood, so common in those days, and repeated the following stanza:

There was a man who died of late.
The angels did impatiently wait.
With out stretched arms and wings of love.
To bear him to the realms above.

Keasel seemed very much pleased with this part of the epitaph, and the evening was very pleasantly spent. The stranger retired and slept comfortably all night. In the morning a fine breakfast was prepared for him, for it was not often that the Keasel family had an opportunity of enjoying such entertaining literary gentlemen. After breakfast the stranger took his pack on his back stood near the door with his hat in his hand, and repeated the remainder of the epitaph:

While they disputed for the prize, Still hovering around the lower skies. In slipped the Devil like a weazel And down to Hell kicked Old Keasel.

Keasel was indignant and started for the stranger who went out of the door about six inches in front of Keasel's boot.

JOHNSON STYLE RIVER VALLEY ORNATE CARVERS

Thomas Johnson of Chatham, CT, 1750-1789 was the 3rd generation of carvers in his family. The Cooley stones in Rutland County, VT are similar to his work, but done after his death. [Slater. James A., The Colonial Burying Grounds of Eastern Connecticut... [57-60 hereafter Slater]

Laurel Gabel suggested the following six men who copied the work of Thomas Johnson and

could have carved these Vermont stones.

Joseph Gleason (ca 1783-1818) William Crosby 1764-1801 Peter Buckland 1738 - 1816 Orange Hurlbutt d. 1814 Abel Lyman 1749 - 1828 Hosea Roberts 1768 - 1815

No records have been found on any of these men in Rutland County.

Peter Buckland's brother, William Buckland, settled in North Poultney in about 1784 and died there in 1795. Peter did not carve the Johnson Style stones Dr. Caulfield credited to him. There is one stone in the cemetery, near where William lived, that I think Wm. Carved in his Conn. style. All of the family stones done, before 1815, were carved by Enos Clark of Middletown, the next town to the east of Poultney.

William Crosby, 1764-1801 did carve the Thomas Chester, 1790, "Johnson Style" stone in Ledyard, Conn. Crosby did own at various times part of the Johnson quarry, [Slater, p. 65]

Orange Hurlbutt, died in 1814, was paid for the stone of William Crosby. He owned part f the

"Johnson" quarry and his estate contained many stone carving tools. [Slater 66]

Hosea Roberts, 1768-1815, was in partnership with William Crosby and Orange Hurlbutt that was dissolved in 1797. He owned part of the "Johnson" guarry. [Slater, 66]

The Cooley family was from Greenfield, MA & no doubt of the Springfield Cooley's. Could these stones have been brought up from Conn.?

Ebenezer Drury was from Shrewsbury, MA & served in the Revolution under Capt. Benjamin Cooley, Wife Hannah was dau, of Ebenezer & Tamar (Wheelock) Keyes.



Working on a rough, brown sandstone from Middletown, Holland's typical effigy had traces of hair on the forehead, crowns, foliate borders and distinctive 'eyeballs'.

Wethersfield example: Elizabeth Francis, 1767

JOHNSON, JOSEPH: Middletown, CT, @1698 - 1770



Using a smooth, hard, reddish sandstone, Joseph Johnson characterized his stones with elaborate foliate borders of vines, fruits, flowers and leaves, neatly carved lettering and an ovoid face with a distinct chin. He used an abstract design for children and often on footstones.

Glastonbury example: Eunice Loveland, 1751

JOHNSON, THOMAS I: Middletown, CT, 1690 - 1761



One of Connecticut's earliest cutters, he used two designs on a rough sandstone — one with only careful lettering and pin wheels in the finials, the other with a fierce, winged, toothed skull crowned with a wavy-lined cap.

Glastonbury example: Lieutenant Joseph Smith, 1725





Son of Thomas I, they worked together after 1740 and it is hard to tell the work of one from the other, if indeed separateness did exist. The face, foliate border and crown resemble that of Joseph Johnson, but this sandstone was a rough, pourous, dark brown material. He used a stylized fleur-de-lis abstract also which sometimes resembled a 'nebbish'.

Glastonbury example: Lieut. Josiah Hollister, 1749

JOHNSON, THOMAS III: Chatham, CT, 1750 - 1789



Using the same quarry and design as his father, the effigy now takes on an upswept feathered wing, a threedimensional facial feature and an intricate "superstructure" over the head. After Thomas's death, the image continues and becomes more elaborate, being then associated with the 'Johnson Shop'.

Benjamin Cooley and Ruth Beach

Adapted from History of Pittsford, Vermont, by A. M. Caverly, with added information primarily from Detroit Society for Genealogical Research, Vol. 3, pages 203, 204. Benjamin Cooley, the son of Benjamin Cooley and Mary Needham, was born April 30, 1747, at Greenwich, Massachusetts, where he grew to young manhood. Benjamin's older brother, Gideon, served as a soldier in the French and Indian War, during which time he traveled in what became the state of Vermont. One particular wilderness part of this area, which had been designated Pittsford, received his highest admiration, and eventually, in 1766, he traveled back from his home in Greenwich, to make a more thorough exploration. He was able to secure promise of a deed to just the spot he wanted, if he would occupy and improve the land. Thus encouraged, he hastened to Greenwich to get his younger brother, Benjamin, to accompany him to Pittsford and assist him in making improvements upon his land. But Benjamin being only nineteen years of age, his father refused to give him his time. It was finally agreed that Gideon should remain in Greenwich and work for his father one year, in compensation for a year of Benjamin's time. Gideon's share of the contract having been performed, early in the summer of 1767, the two brothers, taking a package of provisions, axes, shovel and hoe, set out on their one horse to make for themselves a future home in the wilderness. After arriving in Pittsford they made a rude shelter, then commenced a clearing, and in a short time began to build a log house. In this they paid little attention to the rules of architecture, but gave to it such shape and proportions as appeared to them best adapted to their more urgent necessities. Their living consisted mostly of game with which the woods abounded, though the streams contributed no insignificant amount of fish. With the exception of one or two trips to Bennington to procure a few of the necessities of life, they spent the summer at Pittsford. They enlarged their clearing, completed the house, and made such general arrangements as would enable them to resume their improvements another year to better advantage. In the fall they went back to Greenwich where they spent the winter. Early in May the next year they returned to Pittsford, bringing with them the seeds for a future harvest. Up to this time Benjamin had supposed that he was to share equally with his brother in the land they had taken up, and in the improvements. But now, to his great disappointment, he learned that Gideon had both the land and the improvements secured to himself. This produced some alienation of feeling, and Benjamin left his brother, went to the township of Addison and took up a lot of land on the border of Lake Champlain. Gideon, however, remained in Pittsford, and with the assistance of a hired man, continued the improvements upon his land. During that season he raised some corn, potatoes and other vegetables, and got his place ready for the reception of his wife and children the following year. He returned to Greenwich in the fall, and during the winter made the necessary arrangements for the removal of his family. In the meantime, Benjamin had labored at Addison through the summer of 1768, but in the fall he suffered so severely from intermittent fever that he abandoned his land upon the lake and returned to Greenwich. During the winter, Gideon, probably actuated by sympathy for his brother, and by desire of reconciliation, applied for, and obtained, for Benjamin, the pledge of a deed of one hundred acres, on condition that Benjamin should improve and occupy it. This was satisfactory to the younger brother; the past differences of the two were forgotten; and they made the needful arrangements for removing to the wilderness of Vermont as early in the spring as the condition of the roads would permit. Procuring two horses for the occasion, Gideon, his wife and five children, accompanied by Benjamin, set out about the first of May on the journey. Their scanty furniture and domestic utensils were packed in sacks that were carried upon the backs of the horses. Thus encumbered, their progress was necessarily slow, but after a toilsome journey, attended with many vexatious delays, they reached the humble log cabin far removed from the haunts of civilization. This dates the beginning of the settlement of Pittsford by the European race. The exact day was not recorded, but that it was in May there can be little doubt. They at once "set up house-keeping," and during that year the two brothers worked together. By hard labor they succeeded in raising a comfortable supply of provisions. Besides cultivating the land which had been cleared on Gideon's lot, they made a clearing and some other improvements on Benjamin's lot, which was located a little more than a mile north of Gideon's tract. The two Cooleys having performed their part of the contract, in the fall they were presented with deeds to their lands. Thus one solitary family is quietly settled in the wilderness of Pittsford. During the winter of 1769-70 the Cooleys stay close to home. Early in the spring, however, Gideon emerges from his seclusion and reports himself to the world. It appears that the family had passed the winter comfortably, living in part upon vegetables raised the previous season, and in part upon venison, an abundance of which was readily obtained. Most of the cooking was done in a small iron kettle brought with them from Greenwich. This utensil was preserved in the Cooley family as a relic of that olden time. There is a tradition in the family that the brothers also killed seventeen bears that winter Gideon reported that some leisure hours during the past cold months had been used in the preliminary arrangements for making maple sugar when spring came. The brothers manufactured sap-sprouts, and from split logs excavated small troughs (the antecedents of buckets). They were obliged to obtain their kettles from Bennington, but on account of the depth of snow it was impossible to go there with a horse. Gideon had now made the journey on snow-shoes. Without a load this was easily accomplished, but after he had purchased his two kettles and attempted to return with them, their combined weight was more than he could carry. Being determined to accomplish the object of his journey, he carried one kettle a short distance, and setting this down, returned and got the other; and thus he persevered until he had carried both home. How much sugar was made that spring as the effect of this labor is unknown, but it is reasonable to assume that their grocery bill for the year 1770 contained no maple sugar. Benjamin devoted his time to improvements upon his tract, though he continued to board in his brother's family until 1771, when he built a log house. In this he resided alone until the eighteenth day of February, 1773, when he married Ruth Beach. She was born in Morristown, New Jersey, January 11, 1756, but at the time of her marriage was residing in Rutland, Vermont. After occupying the log house a few years Benjamin built a new frame one. In the year 1770, seven individuals with their families, influenced by the glowing accounts they had heard of the new country, cast their lot among the pioneers of the wilderness of Pittsford; and each year after that brought more settlers, so that a town was born. Benjamin Cooley was very active in the affairs of the town, being Clerk and Treasurer for many years, and also serving on various committees, including those to lay out land and highways; in addition he was an officer in the militia, eventually reaching the rank of Colonel. The early settlers had scarcely become established in their new homes, ere they found themselves involved in a controversy which had for some time existed between New Hampshire and New York, respecting their division line. Both states claimed the area that became Vermont, and although New Hampshire had granted much of the land, the unscrupulous governors of New York were selling it again (to put money into their own pockets). The original settlers were understandably upset by people trying to take over the land they had improved, lived upon, and grown to love. When petitions to the New York government failed to curtail the unjust sale and seizure of land, the inhabitants took matters into their own hands to prevent such activities. The men of Pittsford and the adjacent area organized themselves into a military corps and assumed the name of Green Mountain Boys, in derision or defiance of a threat said to have been made by Governor Tryon of New York that he would drive the rebellious settlers into the Green Mountains. Apparently the Green Mountain Boys, in their dealings with the Yorkers (as the New York officers were called) were governed by a code of laws enacted by their own conventions. They were careful to have all these laws faithfully executed, and were ready to mete out to any offending Yorker such punishment as they considered due for the quality of his crime. One of these penalties occasionally, though not often, inflicted was the application of the beach seal, termed in allusion to the great seal of New Hampshire affixed to the grants made by the governor of that province, of which the beach rod well laid on the naked backs of the Yorkers and their adherents was humorously considered a confirmation. There is one well-authenticated instance of the infliction of the beach seal punishment within the limits of Pittsford. It appears that a New York surveyor, with several assistants, was sent into the area to locate some land, Intelligence of their appearance and object rapidly spread, and in a few hours Captain Benjamin Cooley, at the head of a party of the Green Mountain Boys, was in rapid pursuit. The Yorkers were overtaken, arrested, and brought before three men who acted as judges. After going through the forms of a trial the verdict was to the effect "that the head surveyor should have the application of the beach seal and that his assistants should be discharged on condition that they pledge themselves to offend no more." The surveyor was accordingly tied to a tree, and the beach rod was applied to his naked back, or (as Benjamin Cooley was accustomed to phrase it) was given a "sound drubbing." The culprit was then warned that if he repeated the offense the punishment would be death. This transaction was published on the authority of those who had frequently heard Col. Cooley give an account of it, and no one acquainted with him would doubt his veracity. The disturbances growing out

the same.

As I did my research I found myself living with Emily in very real and deep ways. She had looked her fears in the face and had lived. I could too. "The Province of the Saved / Should be the Art - to Save -" (Fr659).

My research took many forms. I read the poems, the letters, several biographies, reminiscences and essays. I listened to the tapes. At Harvard I saw Emily's bureau, the one in which she kept her poems, her piano, her writing desk, and several of her manuscripts. I contacted owners of Newfoundland dogs, spending time with the huge bear-like creatures in an effort to get closer to Emily's Carlo. And I spent much time in Amherst. At the Jones Library I read letters written by Emily's father, Edward Dickinson; sermons by the Reverend Charles Wadsworth, her beloved "Philadelphia"; articles on tuberculosis, Bright's disease, conditions of the eyes, hypertension, lupus, and anxiety disorders and depression, along with family orders from the local Amherst pharmacy and records of the eye doctor in Boston who treated Emily for a mysterious eye condition.

At the Frost Library I thrilled to the vision of a lock of her hair, like spun gold, and the copy of her Latin book, reported to be a gift from Austin and shared with Abby Wood. I especially enjoyed finding the comment in one of the margins, "Due Monday – how mean!" along with a drawing of a man with a large nose and a serious expression whom I took to be the professor of Emily's Latin class.

I went to Mount Holyoke College where I talked with Martha Ackmann. I stood at Emily's gravesite in Amherst, silent beside the stone, the letters speaking of eternity: "Called Back." I walked her walk from Amherst Academy (a plaque in a parking lot

marks the spot) to the Mobil gas station on N Pleasant Street, the site of the house in which the poet lived between the ages of nine and twenty-four. How irreverent to replace her house with a gas station! Time marches on.

Best of all was my time at the Emily Dickinson Museum. I spent many hours in her bedroom, her parlor, sitting in her garden, talking with Cindy Dickinson, Jane Wald, Betty Bernhard, David Garnes, and the various and helpful guides, year after year, in all seasons; taking the path to the Evergreens, walking through her brother's Italian style, "hedge away" house that she had so often visited Before she didn't anymore.

As I continued getting to know Emily and ultimately writing about her, I was healing all the while. Many people came into my life who not only helped with my research, but also brought new companionship, new life.

One was not new. Charlotte Zolotow had been my editor at Harpers for six books and fifteen years. Retired by the time I began my research, she lent me her entire collection of Dickinson books, along with her support and an introduction to an Amherst resident, author Shulamith Oppenheim. Shulamith became a close friend, in addition to introducing me to Polly Longsworth. Before I knew it, polly was not only a colleague but also a friend, answering my many questions for more than ten years. She knew all the answers except one, Where did Carlo sleep? I have never found anyone anywhere who could answer that question, although david Garnes from the Museum sent me material on pets in New England in the mid-1800s. Thank you, David!

Another new friend, professor/poet Joy Ladin, spent hours with me going over the poems on a trip I made to Amherst one cold winter to spend a week alone there with my dog, walking those same roads walked by Emily and Carlo when the temperature

The streams contributed no insignificant amount of fish. With the exception of one or to be seemed a procure a few of the necessities of life, they spent the summer at Pittsford. They enlarged their clearing, completed the house, and made such general arrangements as would enable them to resume their improvements another year to better advantage. In the fall they went back to Greenwich where they spent the winter. Early in May the next year they returned to Pittsford, bringing with them the seeds for a future harvest. Up to this time Benjamin had supposed that he was to share equally with his prother in the land they had taken up, and in the improvements. But now, to his great disappointment, he learned that Gideon had both the land and the improvements secured to himself. This produced some alienation of feeling, and Benjamin left his brother, went to the township of Addison and took up a lot of land on the border of Lake Champlain. Gideon, however, remained in Pittsford, and with the assistance of a hired man, continued the improvements upon his land. During that season he raised some corn, potatoes and other vegetables, and got his place ready for the reception of his wife and children the following year. He returned to Greenwich in the fall, and during the winter made the necessary arrangements for the removal of his family. In the meantime, Benjamin had labored at Addison through the summer of 1768, but in the fall he suffered so severely from intermittent fever that he abandoned his land upon the lake and returned to Greenwich. During the winter, Gideon, probably actuated by sympathy for his brother, and by desire of reconciliation, applied for, and obtained, for Benjamin, the pledge of a deed of one hundred acres, on condition that Benjamin should improve and occupy it. This was satisfactory to the younger brother; the past differences of the two were forgotten; and they made the needful arrangements for removing to the wilderness of Vermont as early in the spring as the condition of the roads would permit. Procuring two horses for the occasion, Gideon, his wife and five children, accompanied by Benjamin, set out about the first of May on the journey. Their scanty furniture and domestic utensils were packed in sacks that were carried upon the backs of the horses. Thus encumbered, their progress was necessarily slow, but after a toilsome journey, attended with many vexatious delays, they reached the humble log cabin far removed from the haunts of civilization. This dates the beginning of the settlement of Pittsford by the European race. The exact day was not recorded, but that it was in May there can be little doubt. They at once "set up house-keeping," and during that year the two brothers worked together. By hard labor they succeeded in raising a comfortable supply of provisions. Besides cultivating the land which had been cleared on Gideon's lot, they made a clearing and some other improvements on Benjamin's lot, which was located a little more than a mile north of Gideon's tract. The two Cooleys having performed their part of the contract, in the fall they were presented with deeds to their lands. Thus one solitary family is quietly settled in the wilderness of Pittsford. During the winter of 1769-70 the Cooleys stay close to home. Early in the spring, however, Gideon emerges from his seclusion and reports himself to the world. It appears that the family had passed the winter comfortably, living in part upon vegetables raised the previous season, and in part upon venison, an abundance of which was readily obtained. Most of the cooking was done in a small iron kettle brought with them from Greenwich. This utensil was preserved in the Cooley family as a relic of that olden time. There is a tradition in the family that the brothers also killed seventeen bears that winter. Gideon reported that some leisure hours during the past cold months had been used in the preliminary arrangements for making maple sugar when spring came. The brothers manufactured sap-sprouts, and from split logs excavated small troughs (the antecedents of buckets). They were obliged to obtain their kettles from Bennington, but on account of the depth of snow it was impossible to go there with a horse. Gideon had now made the journey on snow-shoes. Without a load this was easily accomplished, but after he had purchased his two kettles and attempted to return with them, their combined weight was more than he could carry. Being determined to accomplish the object of his journey, he carried one kettle a short distance, and setting this down, returned and got the other; and thus he persevered until he had carried both home. How much sugar was made that spring as the effect of this labor is unknown, but it is reasonable to assume that their grocery bill for the year 1770 contained no maple sugar. Benjamin devoted his time to improvements upon his tract, though he continued to board in his brother's family until 1771, when he built a log house. In this he resided alone until the eighteenth day of February, 1773, when he married Ruth Beach. She was born in Morristown, New Jersey, January 11, 1756, but at the time of her marriage was residing in Rutland, Vermont. After occupying the log house a few years Benjamin built a new frame one. In the year 1770, seven individuals with their families, influenced by the glowing accounts they had heard of the new country, cast their lot among the pioneers of the wilderness of Pittsford; and each year after that brought more settlers, so that a town was born. Benjamin Cooley was very active in the affairs of the town, being Clerk and Treasurer for many years, and also serving on various committees, including those to lay out land and highways; in addition he was an officer in the militia, eventually reaching the rank of Colonel. The early settlers had scarcely become established in their new homes, ere they found themselves involved in a controversy which had for some time existed between New Hampshire and New York, respecting their division line. Both states claimed the area that became Vermont, and although New Hampshire had granted much of the land, the unscrupulous governors of New York were selling it again (to put money into their own pockets). The original settlers were understandably upset by people trying to take over the land they had improved, lived upon, and grown to love. When petitions to the New York government failed to curtail the unjust sale and seizure of land, the inhabitants took matters into their own hands to prevent such activities. The men of Pittsford and the adjacent area organized themselves into a military corps and assumed the name of Green Mountain Boys, in derision or defiance of a threat said to have been made by Governor Tryon of New York that he would drive the rebellious settlers into the Green Mountains. Apparently the Green Mountain Boys, in their dealings with the Yorkers (as the New York officers were called) were governed by a code of laws enacted by their own conventions. They were careful to have all these laws faithfully executed, and were ready to mete out to any offending Yorker such punishment as they considered due for the quality of his crime. One of these penalties occasionally, though not often, inflicted was the application of the beach seal, termed in allusion to the great seal of New Hampshire affixed to the grants made by the governor of that province, of which the beach rod well laid on the naked backs of the Yorkers and their adherents was humorously considered a confirmation. There is one well-authenticated instance of the infliction of the beach seal punishment within the limits of Pittsford. It appears that a New York surveyor, with several assistants, was sent into the area to locate some land. Intelligence of their appearance and object rapidly spread, and in a few hours Captain Benjamin Cooley, at the head of a party of the Green Mountain Boys, was in rapid pursuit. The Yorkers were overtaken, arrested, and brought before three men who acted as judges. After going through the forms of a trial the verdict was to the

effect "that the head surveyor should have the application of the beach seal and that his assistants should be discharged on condition that they pledge themselves to offend no more." The surveyor was accordingly tied to a tree, and the beach rod was applied to his naked back, or (as Benjamin Cooley was accustomed to phrase it) - was given a "sound drubbing." The culprit was then warned that if he repeated the offense the punishment would be death. This transaction was published on the authority of those who had frequently heard Col. Cooley give an account of it, and no one acquainted with him would doubt his veracity. The disturbances growing out

a few months later Ruth gave birth to their third child. Benjamin returned to Pittsford to assist his fellow townsmen in defending their possessions. Before escaping, the Cooleys hid some of their belongings in the cove near the house, but these could never afterwards be found. From this period to the close of the war the inhabitants o Pittsford saw perilous times. The Indians, instigated by the British, were almost continually lurking in the vicinity, ready at any moment to take advantage of the defenseless condition of the inhabitants, who, although they built a fort as a place of refuge, had to hunt and farm in order to survive. The area of Pittsford had in former years been the Indians' favorite hunting ground, and they were familiar with every part of it. Not unfrequently they were also guided by a despicable set of Times, who understood the exact location and condition of every family in the township. Some of the inhabitants were taken away captive; houses were plundered an burnt; and other acts of devastation were committed. Benjamin Cooley served his countrymen well, both in helping the workings of the community and participating in military action at various places as the war progressed. In 1778 he traveled to Greenwich to see his family, and as he was about to return to Pittsford, he urged his youngest brother, Caleb, to accompany him. Their father, as a special inducement to go, offered to give Caleb one hundred acres of the wild lands in Pittsford. He consented to go, for a few months, and the two brothers resided together, cooking their own provisions and living mostly on wild meat and corn bread. The corn used had either to be pulverized in a mortar, or carried to Charlestown or Bennington to be ground, as neither of the grist-mills in Pittsford was then in a condition to do work. In 1779 Benjamin returned his family to Pittsford, as the dangers had subsided somewhat, though not as much, perhaps, as was thought. The next April Ruth became ill and was being nursed by Mrs, John May. One evening Benjamin went on horseback to carry their friend to her home. While returning, his horse suddenly stopped and appeared very much frightened. "What!" said the Captain, "Do you smell a Tory?" By applying his whip to the animal he succeeded in forcing him along. No more was thought of the circumstance at the time, but in 1781, while Captain Cooley was on duty at the fort, he received a note from Roger Stevens, Jr., a former resident of Pittsford who had joined the cause of the British. He was in the vicinity at the head of a scouting party of Indians and Tories and requested an interview with the Captain, appointing a time and place. He asked Benjamin, moreover, to appear there with his side arms, and assured him that he would meet him alone, unarmed, and as a friend. The Captain complied and had a long visit with his old neighbor. In the course of the conversation Stevens remarked to the Captain that he supposed his former townsmen censured him very much for the part he had acted in the war; but he stated that he had been governed by his convictions of duty, and that not with standing the course he had taken, he was then and always had been, a friend to the people of Pittsford, and that he had done them many favors of which they were entirely Ignorant. He said that when the Indians had taken any of their number prisoner he had used his influence in saving their lives, mitigating their sufferings, and effecting their release from captivity. To convince the Captain that he had refrained from exercising his power to harm the inhabitants, he asked him if he remembered the evening when returning from Mr. May's when his horse became frightened and refused to proceed, and Benjamin had inquired of the animal if he smelt a Tory. The Captain replied in the affirmative. "Well," said Stevens, "I was but a few feet from you with a party of Indians, and might easily have killed you or made you a prisoner; but wishing you well I refrained, though against the wishes of the Indians."The war continued, mainly in parts distant from the Green Mountains and at last resulted in victory for the Americans. But all was not automatically peace and prosperity. The people of Pittsford, along with their neighbors, had a long struggle to recover from the effects of the revolution, especially from the problems of debt, currency devaluation, and not enough crop harvest to feed all the people. As one of the chief officers of the town Benjamin Cooley did his utmost to see that justice was done, and that the people should make every effort for the common good. Because of their faith in him he was several times elected by his friends and neighbors to be their representative to the General Assembly of the State; he serve in this capacity during the years 1790, 1791, 1792, 1793, and 1797. Gideon Cooley, who first saw visions of settling Pittsford, and enlisted the help of his brother Benjamin to accomplish his dream, did not remain to live out his days here. Though he served with his townsmen during the Revolutionary War, and took part in the struggles after, he decided, in 1793, to pioneer again, and moved on to Canada with his family. Several of the other brothers and sisters settled in Vermont, at Pittsfor and adjacent towns; and even the parents came eventually. Military, civic, and agricultural interests were augmented in the life of Benjamin Cooley by the sincere and deep interest he had in religion. Both he and Ruth were faithful members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and as there was no place of worship for this denomination in Pittsford, the meetings were for some time held in their home, the frame house that had early replaced the log cabin. However, on one occasion in 1798 an unusually large congregation had assembled to attend the Quarterly Meeting. In order to provide dinner for so many people, very hot fires were built in the large fireplaces. A chimney caught fire, and the house and most of the contents were burned, the people being too excited to carry to a place of safety the things that were thrown from the upper windows. One young man did save a large iron kettle from the flames by carrying it across the small river to a safe place. Another house was soon built, the second floor being made into a hall for church meetings. In this, over the years, Colonel Cooley taught a Bible Class, the class continuing beyond the time of his death. After some time the members met in other quarters, but each year, on a certain Sunday in October, they assembled out at the old Cooley home accompanied by as many townspeople as cared to join them, held services, and had a picnic dinner. In 1927, more than a hundred years after the death of its founde the "Colonel Benjamin Cooley Bible Class" erected a small white marble monument near the house he built, the inscription being: "House 100 ft. w. erected by Col. Benj. Cooley in 1798. Second floor planned and used for first Methodist preaching in Pittsford. -- Col. Benjamin Cooley Bible Class 1927, "Benjamin and Ruth reared a large family of sons and daughters. Some of them stayed in Vermont, and others, with their father's love of adventure, pushed on to the frontiers of New York and Michigan, Benjamin Cooley is described as a man who had received a religious education and was deeply imbued with the spirit of Christianity; who had toiled with his neighbors to lay broad and deep the foundations of the social and religious institutions of Pittsford; who was foremost in every enterprise pertaining to the material prosperity of the people; and who was looked upon as a model of stability, and the embodiment of almost every manly virtue. He and his devoted wife, Ruth, who was also highly esteemed, lived to the ages of sixty-four and sixty-seven, respectively, and their passing was a great loss to the community. They were buried in the cemetery back of the church in Pittsford, their gravestones containing the following inscriptions: In Memory of Col. Benj. Cooley He was one of the first settlers in this town, An officer in the Revolutionary War, Died Feb. 27, 1810 in the 65 year of his age.


My work with Cindy as co-editor on the edition was a joy, frustrating at times, exhausting, but also exhilarating. During this same period Julie Harris was performing *The Gin Game* in Stamford, Connecticut, near where I was living. I wrote her a note, telling her I was coming to see the play and that I was writing a book about Emily Dickinson and was there any way I could take her to lunch. We had met a few times and had talked some years earlier when I was working on my book about Joan of Arc. She quickly wrote back saying yes, she would love to join me for lunch. My excitement knew no bounds!

The upshot was that we met on Valentine's Day at an Italian Restaurant in Stamford. We talked for more than two hours about "our Emily," as we liked to call her, I deep in my novel, she preparing to tour in *The Belle of Amherst*, recreating her performance of nearly twenty-five years before. I remember asking her a question I knew better than to ask, but I couldn't help it. "You may not want to answer this," I said.

John Hitchcock, a tanner by trade, was. a native of Connectieut, where the most of his early life was spent. He married Abigail Chapman and located in Saybrook, where were born the following children, viz.: John, J Remembrance, Joseph,, Chapman, Benjamin, Abigail, Lydia and Anna. About the year 1780, he removed from Saybrook to Surry, JSf. H., where he resided till 1785, when he bought of Samuel Drury, said to be of Alstead, H.' H., one right of land, *minus* one hundred and ten acres, in Pittsford, the deed being dated the 10th of May, and it was in consideration of £16 L. M. He pitched one hundred and ten acres of this right—the third-division lot of the right of Jedediah Winslow—on the northwest slope of what has since been known as "Corn Hill." It covered the farm now owned by Amos 0. Kellogg. This he deeded to his son John, May 23, 1785, and then purchased the lot forming the farm now owned by his grandson Capt. Charles Hitchcock. He assisted his son in clearing the land and building a house on the side of the hill some eighty rods east of the present residence of Mr. A. C. Kellogg, and they transplanted an orchard near the house, some of the trees of which are still standing. At that time the road leading north from Joshua Morse's, passed some rods west of the present road, and on through land owned by Amos Kellogg, and a branch of it crossed Sucker Brook a few rods below the saw-mill. The family came here as soon as comfortable quarters could be prepared, and it is evident that they resided here together for a time, or until a small clearing and a house could be made on the other lot where Capt. Charles Hitchcock now lives; and then the father and other members of the family removed to the latter place, while the eldest son, John, who had married Hannah Weed, [danghter of Jacob Weed] remained on the former place of which he had a deed.

Calvin Drury, the second son of Ebenezer, was born in Templeton, Mass., May 8, 1765, came to Pittsford with other members of his father's family, and married Azubia, daughter of Rev. Eleazer Harwood, about the year 1790. He located on the home farm upon which he built a house which stood about three rods north of the house now owned by the heirs of the late Austin Andrews. His wife Azubia died about 1824, and he married Sarah, danghter of Jacob Weed, September 22, 1825. He was industrious, frugal, of sound judgment, and took a deep interest in everything pertaining to the prosperity of the town and the Christian Church.

"Proceeding down the creek, on the western side, ... you come to the marble Factory. The marble in this village, which is now wrought on a large scale, and extensively diffused over the county, was discovered by **Eben W. Judd**, the present principal proprietor, as early ad the year 1802. A building on a limited plan was erected, and machinery for sawing the marble (the idea of which had its origin in the inventive mind of the proprietor) was then first put in operation. In 1806, a new and commodious building, two stories high, and destined to comprise sixty saws, to be moved by water, was erected, and had continued to the present day [1859]."

"The saws are made of soft iron, without teeth, and are similar in form to those, which are used in sawing marble by hand, in the large cities in Europe. The softer they are the longer they last." "The marble until lately has been obtained chiefly from a quarry, situated within a few feet of the mill. During three or four of the last years, much has been procured, at the time of low water, at the bottom of the creek, immediately above the falls. It is raised from its bed, partly by means of wedges, but principally by blasting." "The marble, after being sawed into slabs, is manufactured into tomb stones, currier's tables, jams, mantle pieces, hearths, window and door caps and sills, side boards, tables, sinks and various other kinds of furniture. These articles are transported to Montreal, Quebec, Boston, New York and even Georgia. The machinery has sawn annually, from five to ten thousand feed since the year 1808."

"This was the first manufacture of marble upon an extensive scale in this state, and the machinery for sawing on this plan was the first in operation by **Dr. Judd...** [A footnote adds that Isaac Markham was the one who actually invented the marble saw.] In anticipation of establishing the manufacture of marble, in the spring of 1803, he obtained from Appleton Foot a lease for 999 years of the right to dig marble on any part of his lot, between his house and the creek, the foundation of which was marble throughout, and the privilege of erecting a mill. He afterwards obtained a title to the land in fee, and occupied the house on it, until he built, on the same site, the large brick house, now owned by Dr. Nathaniel Harris."


"Dr. Dwight on his visit in 1810, says of this marble and its manufacture, "A quarry of marble has been discovered in the bank of the river just below the bridge, a continuation of the ledge, which forms the falls. It is both white and dove-colored, elegantly variegated, and of finer texture than any other, which has been wrought hither in the United States. It is sawn, ground and polished by water machinery; and is cut and carved, with an elegance not surpassed on this side of the Atlantic."

"Dr. Judd purchased the quarry of beautiful block marble, on the shore in Shoreham, which he transported by teams and extensively manufactured at his mill."

"In the year 1820, he received into partnership his son-in-law, **LEBBEUS HARRIS**, son of Lebbeus Harris, Senior. By them the business was largely prosecuted, and agencies for the sale established in some of the large cities, and in Western, New York.

In 1837, the whole establishment was brought to a close by the death of both partners. Mr. Harris died in April, at the age of forty-five, and Dr. Judd, in September at the age of seventy-six. The mill has never been in operation since. Dr. Nathaniel Harris, a brother of Lebbeus, who has also been engages in the business in various ways, continued the manufacture on a small scale for a few years, but has now, for many years been in the practice of dentistry. Mr. Daniel Judd, son of Dr. Judd, still prosecuted the business on a small scale in a shop near the former factory."



Kelly remained in Vermont and was selling marble in Wallingford. No probate payments have been found for the brothers and only the one signed stone has been found.

The Weller stone is a typical stone for the period. No probate records through 1850. There are a number of family stones in the Green Hill Cemetery in Wallingford, however, as of March 2016, none are on FAG.

You are so kind to remember to send me the Kelley information. I had not found the information about Alfred and Albert.

I haven't used the Family Search for the census, but I have used Ancestry.com (which you have to pay extra for). The last time I find Seth Kelley is in the 1860 Santa Rosa, Sonoma Co., CA census, p. 421 with Thomas A. and George F., all listed as being born in Virginia! Oh well, it begins with a V.

We have a diary written from 1852 to 1869 by my great grandfather John Marcellus Griffith (found in Tyler's *History of Dorset*) who married Mary Kelley, dau. of Timothy. (Kate {Hill} Kelley, Mary's half sister is the subject of the letters in our book.) JMG went from East Dorset to the Minneapolis/St. Paul area first to do the original survey of that city, returned to Vt. and then went by ship to Panama, walked across the Isthmus, and took a ship to San Francisco, and did the original survey of Amador County, CA in addition to buying a farm and prospecting for gold. In that diary, Seth, Elihu and Thomas (TAK) were often with him in both Minneapolis and California and were mentioned. I, too, have been unable to find Seth after 1860 in the census, and the last he is mentioned in the diary is about 1859. One of the Kelley descendents (of Micajah) says that Thomas died in 1863 in California. I can not cite his source. I have been in touch with him. I found his information on www.Ancestry.com about Seth since your e-mail, and he has nothing on him. He is jlsayward@aol.com. He signs his e-mail JL so I don't know his full name, but he has been very helpful. He has no further info on Seth. Their brother Elihu J. Kelley married JMG's sister Mariah Griffith and lived in Vt.

Thank you again for the information. If I ever find Kelley information that I think you might not have, I will be sure to remember you. I can't begin to tell you how much your cemetery records have enhanced what I have been able to glean about the Kelley extended family. I am now using them to make Mercy Stafford Eddy's Diary (from Wallingford) more meaningful. Her husband Oscar was son of Eliphalet Kelley's dau. Hannah (Kelley) and Alden Eddy of Wallingford. You probably know all this!

Thanks for responding so fast.

I would bet that your A. and A. Kelley are Albert and Alfred. Yes, they did go to California, and that is mentioned in a letter dated March 1857. I found a reference to them on Ancestry.com that said they lived in Susanville, Lassen Co., CA, and I have looked at the entire Lassen Co. census for 1880 or 1900, and do not find them. However, I did find their brother George F. who married a third Button sister, Emily, (Albert m. Eunice; Alfred m. Charity) and his family is in the 1880 Susanville census: George F. 55, Emily 49, Clarence 28, Frank A. 26, all born Vt., and Edgar A. 10, b. Cal., so Alfred and Albert could easily have been there also. On a chart I have, I have indicated that Albert d. 1900, and for the life of me I can't find where I have the documentation for that. I have cut and pasted the portion of the Kelley chart showing Elihu's family (some of the dates can be added when I get the Wallingford cemetery inscriptions!) in case it would provide you with any new information. The chart doesn't paste correctly, but from the superscript you can know the sequence.

I continue my membership in VOCA to support their efforts. I've been so grateful to find the stones of many of my ancestors because of the care that those old cemeteries get.

I will look forward to the Wallingford book. I had copied a few pages for reference, but the names I look up never seem to be there, and I can't wait to have the whole thing!





ALBERT & ALFRED KELLEY, Danby [A. & A. Kelley, East Clarendon] WILLIAM W. KELLY, Wallingford

The twin brothers, Alfred & Albert Kelley signed an East Clarendon 1837 gravestone. Were they apprentice carvers in 1837 when about 20 years old. Did they decided carving was not for them and by 1870 they had moved to Petaluma, California. Several other family members had also gone to California. Their older brother, William W. Kelly remained in Vermont and was selling marble in Wallingford. No probate payments have been found for the brothers and only the one signed stone has been found.

East Clarendon Cemetery, stone signed "A. & A. Kelley" ENOS K. WELLER / DIED / APR, 30, 1837, / AE 51

The Weller stone is a typical stone for the period. No probate records through 1850. There are a number of family stones in the Green Hill Cemetery in Wallingford, however, as of March 2016, none are on FAG.



Only very briefly in Rutland, VT in the 1848-1850 period, trained in Arlington-Sudbury, VT.





B. H. KINNEY PROGRAM INTERESTS MEMBERS

The life of B.H.Kinney, gravestone carver and sculptor, who lived 1821-1888, was brought vividly to VOCA at the program following lunch at the May I meeting.

William D. Wallace of the Worcester, MA, Historical Museum gave a chronological report on Kinney's life which began in Peru, MA, while his mother was on a family visit from Sunderland, VT.

In 1837-38 he apprenticed in a shop in Arlington, VT, where he learned to work marble. In 1841 he and his brother Charles announced the establishment of their first marble and stone shops in Barre and Amherst, MA. Though he worked short periods in Sunderland, Rutland and Burlington, most of his working life was in the Worcester, MA, area.

Wallace read of the happenings in Kinney's life, including financial difficulties and his determination to be a sculptor. He showed slides of the types of gravestones, busts and cameos he carved.

One of the typical Kinney gravestone designs is a circle on which the name of the deceased follows the curved edge at the top of the circle, the age follows the bottom curve and the death date is horizontal in the center.

Adding to the program were family members from the area who offered a few stories passed in the family, and a great-great-granddaughter of Kinney's, Virginia (Mrs. Alfred Y.) Durell of East Brookfield, MA, who is the owner of a cameo which portrays Kinney's artist friend, William Otis Bemis, which had been shown in a slide. Members enjoyed the chance to see the beautiful piece up close.

At the close of the meeting Wallace left copy of his book, "B. H. Kinney. Gravesrone Carver and Sculptor" with the editor and it is now in the VOCA files.

monument such as that or villard stone (u. 186) and his wives Polly (d. 1829) and Nancy (d. 1855) in Rural Cemetery, Rutland. The stone is 4' and is signed at the lower left front corner of the main block, "KINNEY./ Worcester."

A very unusual Kinney monument is in the West Millbury cemetery. It is essentially a tapering, pointed-top headstone set into a low, moulded-edge white marble base. In the incised style with a combination of traditional and plain-cut types, it is inscribed, "HANNAH W./ Wife of Sam'l Bannister / & daughter of Peter & Lydia Holman./ died in Worcester / Nov. 25, 1843; / aged 35 y'rs." The signature "B. H. Kinney./ Worcester" is in the lower left front corner, above the marble base.

Of the known Kinney markers, specific information regarding the purchase of only eight could be found in record of payment is from the estate of Caleb Mirick A. The Payment of Princeton (d. 1841), whose circular at the carbon of Princeton (d. 1841). the Worcester County probate records. The earliest the Meetinghouse Cemetery (figure 11) is recorded on 2 January 1842: "Pd C. M. & B. H. Kinney for Grave Stones [\$]21—" This included both headstone and footstone, but the latter does not survive. The marker for James Adams (d. 1843) in the Kendall Plain willer 70 FA Cemetery, Barre (figure 13), complete with laurel wreath and oak leaves, is one of the most handsomely decorated circular-style stones from the Kinney workshop. Adams's executor 'Pd for G[rave] S[tone] for deceased \$30.00," but the Kinneys are not mentioned and the date of payment is not recorded. The grave of Dwight Estabrook (d. 1842) in Center

A third bust from 1849 is that of J. S. C. Knowlton, editor of the Worcester Palladium, now in the collections of the Worcester Historical Museum, and the earliest Kinney sculpture known to survive.

From 19 July through at least 25 July 1849, Kinney was in Spencer with W. O. Bemis and his family. 28 They fished, talked, read and, on Wednesday 25 July, Bemis wrote, "carry Kinney to Oakham." Was the trip perhaps for the purpose of setting a stone or

cutting an inscription?

The significance of 1849 as a pivotal year in Kinney's career, marking his transition from marble cutter to sculptor, is further supported by the Bemis journal. On 9 September Bemis observed, "-- receve a letter from Kinney - in Boston doing great things in comming before the world as a sculptor -" A few days later, on Wednesday 12 September, Kinney and Bemis left Worcester via "the cars" at 10 A.M. and arrived in Boston about noon.29 Once there they "put up at Millikens" and set about calling on the artists of the day in the city and the surrounding towns. They visited Alvin Fisher, "saw some splendid things in his room - Show them up like a gentleman." Bemis also mentioned a visit to "my old master, [Francis] Alexander." On Saturday 15 September in the morning they "walk out to Newton . . . to see [Robert] Ball Hughes the sculptor — Saw him modle on his 'Fisher Boy.' "30 They later in the day went to visit "[Thomas Hewes] Hinckleys the cattle painter" who was not at home, but his "servant give us the key to his studio saw his pictures -"

Was Kinney a student of Ball Hughes? Had he been studying with him when Bemis wrote that Kinney was in Boston "doing great things in comming before the world as a sculptor"? If not, with whom did he study?

The possibility of a Kinney relationship with Robert Ball Hughes as "master" was subsequently suggested by an entry in the Bemis journal while the Kinney family was in Vermont. On 23 January 1850 Bemis

28. Unmarried at this time, Bemis's family included his father, step-mother, and siblings and their children.

29. The Worcester & Boston Railroad departed from the Foster Street station, not far from Kinney's studio (perhaps one of the reasons for the location of his shop). The train, which began operation in 1835, made several

wrote, "-receave a letter from Kinney - want me to send Ball Hughes letter -"

The record of the second Mechanics Exhibition, 1849, offers the most complete indication of Kinney's output during that first year as a sculptor. Held in September, this time at the "Halls on Union Street," Kinney exhibited the busts of Rev. Dr. Thompson and J. S. C. Knowlton, along with medallion portraits of Bass Otis, the artist who had visited Worcester in August that year, and of fellow Worcester artist, Henry Woodward.31 For his efforts, Kinney was awarded a silver medal by the six judges, and received these comments:

Mr. Kinney's success and rapid progress in his art are very gratifying. His bust of Dr. Thompson commands a general voice of admiration, in which the Committee gladly joins. The likeness of Mr. Knowlton arouses various criticisms, some considering it excellent, while others cannot trace the resemblance. This difference divides even your Committee. The Medallions are very good likenesses, in an agreeable style for the likeness of a friend.32

divine fire ...

Between the September 1849 Mechanics Exhibition and March of 1850, Kinney had moved with his wife and two small children to Vermont. There they remained, although moving about, until April of 1852. A letter dated 28 March 1850 from William Otis Bemis to B, H. Kinney - perhaps never mailed offers no address for the recipient but does mention the Kinneys being close to family and asks, "Is Mrs Kinney homesick now - when she can get maple melasses enought to eat -" Bemis went on to extoll the virtues of maple syrup and to offer his image of Kinney:

oh' maple molasses - will drive away the thought of absent friends - and dround the "blues" in sweetness - It seems to me I can See Kinney eating Seven griddle cakes swimming in molasses - and then haveing th "dispeptia" "very bad" soon after -

The presence of the Kinney family in Vermont is later confirmed by the Sunderland census for 1850. when Kinney, his wife and their two children are living with his parents. Subsequently, on 6 August in the Rutland census, Kinney is listed, alone, as a sculptor living at a local hotel.

The reasons for the Kinney family's move remain





Allen & Alanson Adams.

William and Charlotte's stones are identical and almost certainly were made by Allen & Adams, his business partners. Sally and Harriet's stones are identical and a little too early to have been by Allen & Adams.

There is no indication William C. Kittridge, an attorney, was in the marble business in any way except as a

business partner with Joseph Adams and Alonson Allen.



Garrett Lawrence was born between 1755 & 1774 (26-45 in 1800 census), he died after May 1806.

He m. before 1800 census -?-, born 1755-1774, Rutland, a flowery, benevolent ad by Garrett Lawrence says his wife has been induced by others to leave. [Rutland Weekly Herald. Saturday May 3, 1806]

They had a daughter, under age 10 in 1800.

He was not listed in the 1791 VT census.

Clarefular 1800 Castleton census: Garrett Lawrence: 1m 26/45; 1f 0/10, 1f 26/45 [M32-52-41] Garrett Lawrence was of Clarendon from 1801 to 1808.

On 24 Aug. 1805, Isajah Mason, Garret Lawrence & Eph. Blanchard signed a petition for the turnpike. [Rutland Weekly Herald, p.7]

There were letters waiting at the Rutland Post Office for Garrett Lawrence on 4 Jan. 1802, 3 May 1806 & 16 April 1808. [Rutland Weekly Herald, 1802, p. 7, 1806, p. 3, 1808 p. 34. There are no records of him in the area after this date

Garrett Lawrence was said to have carved the 1804 stone for Sheriff Jonathan Bell for which he was paid \$30. The stone was carved of gray marble taken from Rutland's first guarry. The guarry was deeded to Lawrence of Clarendon by Levi Foot in 1801. [Swan, History of Rutland, p. 528-29] William Denison was a later owner of this quarry. Garrett Lawrence may have just been an agent for William Denison did the lettering on the bottom panel of the Jonathan Bell stone. The remainder of the stone is so badly worm, it is hard to closely examine the lettering. As could this be who won. Denisor learn & to cause?

Jonathan Bell was born 22 Jan. 1755 Cornwall. Conn. & died 22 April 1804 Rutland, son of Ketchel and Sarah (-?-) Bell. He served in the Revolutionary War. He m. 14 May 1779 Cornwall, CT, Susan Canfield, d. 20 Sept. 1819 at Youngstown, NY. [Swan. p. 41]

Ethiel Cushman was paid \$2 to dig the grave. George Buck made the coffin for \$10. Garrett Lawrence furnished the gravestone for \$30 [Swan p 41-42] [Go in & again check the lettering]

Jonathan Bell, Esg. / died, April 22, 1804 / age 49 years. He served in the Revolutionary War. "He was seventeen years Sheriff of the County of Rutland the duties of which office he discharged with high reputation to himself & Usefulness to the public."

On base of stone, carved by William Denison: "Active intelligent & enterprising, A friend to order & good government."

JAMES LINCOLN, DANBY BOROUGH

If the James Lincoln, b. 1803 VT was a carver in Dorset – Danby, he was probably did not carve stones in VT till after 1820 & removed to Wisc. 1850-1860.

"A James Lincoln came from Dorset & settled quite early in the (Danby) Borough. He was a worker in marble here, before stone saw mills were built and was the first of whom we have any knowledge, to hew out grave stones. His work may be seen in nearly all the cemeteries in town. He removed west many years ago." [Boston Transcript #6222., 31 July 1918] [Williams, J. C., History of Danby, Vermont, Rutland, 1869, p. 189] GEOLOGY: "Upon the north end of "Aeolus" or Dorset mountain, are extensive quarries of the finest marble, which are being worked since 1840, and the vein of marble in that portion of town seems to be inexhaustible." [ibid. p. 319]

James Lincoln settled in Danby before 1800. [Smith & Rann, *Hist of Rutland Co.*, p. 582] (No census or VR to support this.) Previous to 1840 James Lincoln and others gained a livelihood here hewing gravestones out of the native marble. [ibid. 587]

"Marble has been & is now, the principal manufacture of the town. This commenced about the year 1840, & considerable importance is attached to it. Previous to that time, grave stones were hews out by James Lincoln and others." [Williams, History of Danby, page 85 & 189]

See also the work of Cyrus Adams, of Pawlet, d. 1800 and Jonas Stewart. There are quite a few early stones either of them could have carved.





Joseph E. Manley, son of Fobes and Wealthy (Hill) Manley, was born February 15, 1831, at Proctor, then Sutherland Falls, in the old town of Rutland, Rutland county, Vermont, where he was educated in the common and select schools of Pittsford and Chittenden. After attaining his majority, being desirous of higher educational advantages, he entered Castleton Seminary, then a leading institution, under the charge of the Rev. E.J. Hallock. While a student at the seminary, he supported himself by teaching school in the winter, and employing his vacations in farm labor. In 1854 he graduated, after which he engaged in the marble business. He is recognized as an expert in all matters relating to the deposits and working of this stone and has accomplished much for the development of the marble industry. He is author of an article on the "Marbles of Rutland County," embodied in the first report of Professor Collier, of the Vermont board of agriculture, and which is an exhaustive treatise upon the subject.

At the age of twenty-eight, Mr. Manley was chosen justice of the peace for Rutland county, and he received the high compliment of thirteen consecutive elections. During this long period he tried many hundred cases, both civil and criminal, and his decisions were characterized by such impartiality and excellent knowledge of law that jury trials were resorted to in only two instances, and only one appeal from his decision was reversed in the county court. During his term of service he secured a small but well selected library, and occupied his leisure hours with the study of the law. In 1874 he entered the office of Hon. C.H. Joyce, of Rutland, and at the March term of the following year he was admitted to the Rutland county bar, since which time he has been actively engaged in practice, his services having been especially sought in the settlement of estates as administrator and commissioner. For six years prior to 1892 he held the office of special prosecutor. In 1894 he was elected judge of Rutland county court, and served for six years in a manner entirely creditable to himself and satisfactory to the public.

Judge Manley has ever been an active and intelligent laborer in religious, moral and educational fields. He has been a member of the First Congregational church of West



GRANVILLE, New York Cemeteries

Starting at the Slate Valley Museum, drive east on Main St. to the yellow blinkers, turn left onto North Street, and stay on North Street [the left fork of the road].

Mettowee Valley Cemetery, is on the right, half a mile north of the blinkers. Victorian to modern stones with some old stones moved from other early cemeteries.

As you enter the main part of the cemetery there is a large monument containing Mr. Wood's statue. This monument is for the Wood and Pember families. Beyond is the 30 foot high oblast for the Laing-Temple family. Both of these monuments manufactured at Rock of Ages in Barre, VT and delivered by train. Train tracks were laid up to the cemetery for the delivery.

A small Masonic Cemetery by the road.

St. Peter & Paul Byzantine Cemetery, on right just beyond the bowling alley up a dirt road. Many ethnic stones.

Mount Carmel Catholic Cemetery, 1.3 miles north of the blinker, on the right. Some early ethnic stones.

Old Middle Granville Cemetery, on the left, 2 miles north of the blinker light. Several Revolutionary soldiers and first settlers,

Elmwood Cemetery: Across from Chapman's store, before a bridge, turn right onto Depot Street. Pass the old depot and trail where the train tracks have been removed. Continue to the cemetery. Follow the cemetery road staying to the right, past the Civil War Memorial. The purple slate stones, carved in Welch, are in this area. Near the east edge of the cemetery there is a new red slate stone. Looking east over this stone you can see the slag pile for this red slate quarry.

To see the quarry, continue on Depot Street to Fox Road. The quarry is right by the road. Sheldon Slate Co. is on the hill.

Continue on Fox Road to Route 31, left and continue north to Poultney, Route 30, trough to Castleton, etc.

Pass the Barn Restaurant on the left. The Pawlet post office is on the left just before Cemetery Hill Road, that is just before a bridge. Drive up the hill.

Old Pawlet Cemetery, on the left, 1776+, with a number of stones by Jonas Stewart & his shop, other face stones by an unidentified carver.

Mettowee Valley Cemetery, on the right, 1806+. See the sundial and the inscribed family bible. Return to Route 30 South.

Dorset:

Maple Hill Cemetery, 1777+, south of Village on the left. The front section has stones by Zerubbabel Collins, [Including stones for some of his close rélatives], Samuel Dwight, all of Shaftsbury, Jonas Stewart from Claremont NH, Hiram or Harvey Hawley of Dorset, the Southworth family, E. Sykes, I. Dickinson, and others.

One mile farther south is the old **Norcross – West 1785 marble quarry hole** (now swimming hole). Park on Kelly Road, just north of the quarry, east side of Route 30.

Continue south on Route 30 to Manchester Center, then south on Route 7A.

Manchester:

Dellwood Cemetery, 1791+, south of Manchester Village. There are Collins, Dwight, and Stewart stones in the old section near the entrance. Many beautiful Victorian stones in the newer sections.

Continue south on 7A, through Arlington, Shaftsbury to Bennington. There are interesting old cemeteries along this route.

Or

Return north on Route 7A. After passing the busy intersection with Route 30, watch on the right for Cemetery Road and Center Hill Road

Factory Point, 1781+, several signed stones near the front, Collins and McKee.

Return to Route 7A north.

East Dorset, 1808+. Of interest: The stone for Bill Wilson, 1895-1951, founder of AA and his wife, Lois Burnham, founder of Al-Anon are by the center road. In the front row is a stone with a markers for both Revolutionary War service and United Empire Loyalists.

Continue north to Danby:

The large Scottsdale Cemetery will be on your left.

Continue north on Route 7A, it becomes Route 7, to Wallingford.

Wallingford:

Green Hill Cemetery, 1775+, right side of Route 7. In the old front section see a stone by Enos Clark, Zerubbabel Collins and a stone signed "H. Hawley, Dorset."

Continue north to Clarendon and Rutland.

Leave the Slate Valley Museum return to Main Street and turn right (east), drive 2 miles to the yellow blinker light, turn right onto Route 30 south. Continue south about 5 miles. Pass the Barn Restaurant on the left. The Pawlet post office is on the left just before Cemetery Hill Road, that is just before a bridge. Drive up the hill. Pawlet:

Old Pawlet Cemetery, on the left, 1776+, with a number of stones by Jonas Stewart & his shop, other face stones by an unidentified carver.

Mettowee Valley Cemetery, on the right, 1806+. See the sundial and the inscribed family bible. Return to Route 30 South.

Dorset:

Maple Hill Cemetery, 1777+, south of Village on the left. The front section has stones by Zerubbabel Collins, [Including stones for some of his close relatives], Samuel Dwight, all of Shaftsbury, Jonas Stewart from Claremont NH, Hiram or Harvey Hawley of Dorset, the Southworth family, E. Sykes, I. Dickinson, and others.

One mile farther south is the old **Norcross – West 1785 marble quarry hole** (now swimming hole). Park on Kelly Road, just north of the quarry, east side of Route 30.

Continue south on Route 30 to Manchester Center, then south on Route 7A.

Manchester:

Dellwood Cemetery, 1791+, south of Manchester Village. There are Collins, Dwight, and Stewart stones in the old section near the entrance. Many beautiful Victorian stones in the newer sections.

Continue south on 7A, through Arlington, Shaftsbury to Bennington. There are interesting old cemeteries along this route.

Or

Return north on Route 7A. After passing the busy intersection with Route 30, watch on the right for Cemetery Road and Center Hill Road

Factory Point, 1781+, several signed stones near the front, Collins and McKee. Return to Route 7A north.

East Dorset, 1808+. Of interest: The stone for Bill Wilson, 1895-1951, founder of AA and his wife, Lois Burnham, founder of Al-Anon are by the center road. In the front row is a stone with a markers for both Revolutionary War service and United Empire Loyalists.

Continue north to Danby:

The large Scottsdale Cemetery will be on your left.

Continue north on Route 7A, it becomes Route 7, to Wallingford.

Wallingford:

Green Hill Cemetery, 1775+, right side of Route 7. In the old front section see a stone by Enos Clark, Zerubbabel Collins and a stone signed "H. Hawley, Dorset."

Continue north to Clarendon and Rutland.

THE MEHURIN FAMILY OF MIDDLETOWN SPRINGS, VT

The study of this family has been undertaken in an effort to identify "D. Mehurin, Sculptor" who signed the stone of Dr. Socraties Hotchkiss who died in Wells Feb. 27, 1810 in the 36th year of his age. Several other stones in Wells, East Poultney and Middletown Springs would appear to have been carved by the same hand and date from 1809 to 1813.

Two men of this name were living in Middletown Springs in this period: DAVID MEHURIN, b. 5 June 1755 Bridgewater, MA, d. ca Dec. 1812 Middletown Springs, VR; and his son DAVID MEHURIN, b. 25 Dec. 1786, d. 21 April 1857 age 71 y. Middletown Springs, VT.

In 1810 when D. Mehurin signed the Hotchkiss stone, David Sr. was 55 years old and David Jr. was 24 years old. I can't say, for sure, which David was the carver, but from the item in the History of Rutland County, David Jr. was most likely the carver. Because of so many similarities between the work of Enos Clark, Marcus Stoddard and David Mehurin, it is quite possible that all three worked in the same shop and more than one worked on the same stone.

Enos Clark, an older brother of the late General Jonas Clark, as early as 1807 [prob. much earlier], manufactured marble by hand in Middletown. Jonas was apprenticed to Enos. Their stock was taken from a quarry on a part of the farm then owned by Elihu Andrews in the north part of Tinmouth; the quarry property composed about two acres. In 1810 the "Andrews Quarry," as it was then called, was owned by General [Jonas] Clark, who employed two workmen, David Mehurin and Marcus Stoddard, who afterward became joint owners. Stoddard subsequently built a small mill in Middletown and procured his stock from the "Andrews Quarry," The quarry property was subsequently sold to Moses Ambler, and again to Edward Woodruff, and in the 1880s was the property of Isaac D. Stubbs. The quarry produced white and mottled (or blue and white) marble. Specimens may be found in Poultney, Castleton, Middletown and probably other places, which will compare favorably with any now [1880s] in the county. (Smith & Rann, Hist. of Rutland Co., p.181)

DAVID MEHURIN, (David3, Hugh2,1) was b. 5 June 1755 Bridgewater, MA, d. ca Dec. 1812 Middletown Springs, VT VR.

These stones do not appear to be Enos Clark's work. Most certainly both David Mehurin; Marcus Stoddard & Barton Clark, were apprentices of Enos Clark. The following may be the work of either David Mehurin or Marcus Stoddard. Stoddard & Mehurin's work is much the same and they probably worked together. Also, Barton Clark may have worked in the same shop.

David Mehurin was born in 1786 thus he probably did not carve stones on his own much before 1806. He was paid \$20 for in 1827 for Azor Perry's stone.

Marcus Stoddard was born about 1790 thus he probably did not carve stones on his own much before 1810. He signed the 1816 stone for Ezekial Perry.

Barton Clark, son of Enos, was born in 1791, thus he probably did not carve stones on his own much before 1811. He was paid in 1826 \$23 for ?Benjamin Coy's 1825 stone.

Jesse Caswell was born in ----. He was paid for the Samuel Terrill 1834 stone.

Since the majority of the Mirror Man stones are in the old Benson cemetery, and before the 1800 census, could James Hovey, probably a close relative of Miriam Hovey Southworth be the carver?

The Southworth's were neighbors of the Hawley's in Dorset. Did they learn marble carving there? Was this the occupation that prompted the move from Mansfield, CT to Dorset, VT between 1791 & 1800?

Some time between 1830 & 1840, Benjamin F. Southworth moved his family to Benson, VT & opened his own shop. It was in operation until around 1933. It was the third building on the road to Benson Landing, west of Stage Road.

The big question remains: Who was "Mirror Man?" Could stones be backdated as much as 40 years? Laurel Gabel says "no". In the Old Benson cemetery I found 4 stones by the carver I call "Mirror Man" and 1 more in the old Temple Cemetery in the SW part of town, also several children's stones probably by the same carver, and 2 other face stone with much the same writing.

So far only 7 "Mirror Man" stones have been found: 5 in Benson, 1 in Castleton, 1 in West Rutland, There are 2 more stones in Clarendon that Laurel though were by the same carver, yet the face is somewhat different, the writing matches. At this point I attribute them to "Parentheses Man" as he used () around the husband's name.

All are of these stones are dated in from February 1791 to April 1798, are for women. Was Benjamin F. Southworth "Mirror Man?" No, but could his father, Josiah have been "Mirror Man" and lived in Benson for a short time? Benson, Dorset, VT and Mansfield, CT land records need to be searched.

Mansfield, CT is next to Columbia, CT where the Collins family of carvers lived. Could Gordon, Chester or Josiah Southworth have been carvers? Why are there no "Mirror Man" stones in Dorset or Pawlet & so many in Benson? All pre-1800 cemeteries in Rutland Co. have been visited.

The work of all known Rutland County early carves has been examined and none of the lettering matches the work of "Mirror Man" or "Parenthesis Carver" work.

More research needs to be done on the work of these early carvers.

Carver, Benjamin, 1774-1849, of Castleton by 1790 but the lettering is just not his known style.

Clark, Enos, of Middletown Springs by 1789. This is just not his style.

Denison, William, Rutland & Castleton. This is just not his known style.

Hovey, James. One of his stones in CT has sort of the double ring around the face, however it's not this happier face. We need to see his lettering. Laurel Gabel did not think he was the man. (see her letters)

Humphrey, Joseph, 1770-1852. At 16 cane to Rutland. There is no record of any of his early stones.

Potter, Milton, of CT in 1790, of Pittsford by 1800, some of his lettering is the same.

From the Southworth file:

JOSIAH SOUTHWORTH, Jr. (Josiah), b. Dec. 20, 1750 Mansfield, CT VR. [d. July 8, 1818; Southworth Gen. p. 223 or at Mexico, Oswego, NYI

He m. Aug. 18, 1773 Mansfield, CT VR, MIRIAM HOVEY, b. April 5, 1750 Mansfield, CT VR, d. after 1833 Mexico, NY, dau. of Daniel & Elizabeth (Slapp) Hovey of Mansfield.

Moved to Mexico, NY about 1808. [Southworth Gen.]

A James Hovey carved gravestones in Mansfield, CT in the 1750s so he was probably born say by 1720-25. How was he related to Miriam (Hovey) Southworth? One James was her uncle, two were 1st cousins.*

Sometime after the 1791 census and before 1800 Josiah moved to Dorset, VT. His occupation and the reason for the move is unknown. Marble quarries were opened in Dorset in 1785. Could this have been the reason for his move? James Hovey, no doubt a close relative of Miriam was a gravestone carver in the 1750s in Mansfield, CT. Could Josiah have been a carver, even possibly "Mirror Man"? Did he live in Benson for a time before 1800? To date his own gravestone has not been found.

James Hovey, of Mansfield, CT, gravestone carver.

James Slater, The Colonial Burying Grounds of Eastern Connecticut..., p. 33 includes a picture of a stone James Hovey carved. The stone is in bad condition, but from a rubbing in the book, it appears to be a face within a round border. None of the lettering on the Hovey stones has been shown for comparison with the "Mirror Man" stones.

MIRROR MAN or LOOKING GLASS CARVER

He is so named as the faces are sort of reflected in a mirror with a frame around them with a handle, and feathered wings. The face is very sweet. Nothing has been found in the Rutland County probate to help identify him. All but two of these stones are for women and their daughters. One of the women was unmarried. The daughter's stones have only a scallop shell for decoration. The early probate that might have helped with Samuel Moulton & Asahel Smith, was lost to fire. These are the only stones I can attribute to this carver. The old cemeteries in Orwell, the next town north of Benson, were investigated, but no more stones were found.

It is possible this carver is the same as the one I call "(Parenthesis Carver)". There are several other early

stones with much the similar lettering.

(PARENTHESIS CARVER)

There are two stones in the South Flats Cemetery in Clarendon. This carver places () around the husband's name. The lettering is similar to Mirror Man's lettering. Also some children's stones with a similar shell motif. No clue has been found as to the carver. There is nothing in the probate files.

Dear Peg,

WOW! Congratulations on your newest find! I LOVE this "Mirror Man" carver and am excited to think that you may get him pinned down. Thank you for sending the photocopies of your photographs; it really helps to see the examples. You had sent me a great colored photograph of the Esther Campbell stone (W. Rutland?) some time ago. He is such an interesting carver!

Thinking about your questions:

No, I don't think that the "Mirror Man" style stones were backdated by very much, if at all. In other words, I don't feel that they were carved in the 1820s or 30s. If you haven't already, you might send a photograph to Sally Brillon. She might have one or two of these, or know where there are others. It is also possible that Bob Drinkwater or Jim Slater may also have seen similar examples. (?) Jim lives in Mansfield Center, CT and IF Southworths were carving before they came to VT it is conceivable that something of their work remains in or around Mansfield. Also, IF they were carvers, it would not be unusual to find one or two stones sent back to the hometown. This is a long shot, but perhaps worth a check.

There WAS a Connecticut carver named James Hovey who worked in the 1750s and was from Mansfield, CT. His work appears rather primitive, but I don't have a lot of examples and so should not judge. I wonder when his children were born, their names, and whether his children migrated to Vermont. I should think the Hovey/Mansfield connection would be worth checking out.

From what you sent, it appears that every one of these stones was dated in the 1790s, the earliest in 1794 and the latest in 1798. Does this hold true for all of the stones that you have identified so far? Allowing for some backdating in 1794 or 95, that four or five year carving span is a fairly short and well defined "window." Are there urns/willows in the same lettering style, marble color, shape, etc.? Do any of these markers have footstones? If not, is there someone who died in 1799 - 1800 who might have carved these?

When checking local records, would you also keep an eye out for the names Gideon Smith, Abraham Collins, Roger Booth? These are NOT prime suspects, but they are known carvers that might be connected somehow to your "Mirror Man" carver.

It is hard to tell for sure from the photocopies, but I am suspicious of the Abigail Nash and Hannah Abbot stones. The stone shape, borders, lettering look a little (?) like Roger Booth's work.

I checked the computer listing of 19th-century carvers and found the Hawley entry that you sent. There is also a G. Hawley listed from Vermont with a working date of 1831. I believe the Bennington Library or Museum has a list of men who worked in the marble industry from Vermont. Some of these were probably marble cutters or quarry workers and others were gravestone carvers, men who made table tops, mantles, etc. There is a listing for H. Hawley who signed the 1823 stone for Maria Young in Wallingford, VT. (This may have come from you.)

I would really love to be in Vermont in October -- or anytime, for that matter. Unfortunately, we will be away from October 8th to the 13th. And then on the 14th Barbara Rotundo, Cathy Wilson, Warren Roberts and his wife are arriving to stay here while attending the Pioneer Society conference in Pittsford. I think Warren and his wife might leave on Sunday or Monday, but Barbara and Cathy plan to stay until the 19th. I have a lecture at the Strong Museum on the 24th and leave on the 26th for my annual "sloth week" (three women get together in Florida every year -- one of the women has a condo on Sanibel -- we sleep, eat, and read as the mood hits. Very lazy; very nice.) And so it goes....

I too am leery of the Asa Baldwin signature on that stone. Am not sure what it does or does not indicate. ANOTHER carver that needs study...

I better stop here. Wish you were closer (or better yet, wish I were closer).

Keep in touch. Is there anything here that might help in your search? I do get over to the Mormon center and can use the computerized IGI easily enough. Let me know if you have any specific questions.

Dear Peg,

Thanks for your 10 September letter.

I just looked at page 33 in Jim's book. Can't reconcile James Hovey's rather primitive style with your mirror man of the 1790s, but perhaps there is some indirect link. (?) Mirror man seems to have a definite style and a very definite carving span. He also seems to be pretty good.

I got twenty minutes on the Mormon computer last night and did a little bit of what I'm afraid was somewhat aimless searching in the Hovey lists. I will have to go back and do a better job -- I didn't have your material with me and so probably missed some clues. If you want to make a list of specific questions for me to check, I can usually get twenty minutes of computer time by going over as soon as they open to sign up, and then just returning for my time slot. They have opened up another LDS research center on the other side of town, so the one close to us has cut way back on hours.

I remember talking to Mr. Galusha at the little museum at Shaftsbury -- many many years ago. Mr. Galusha is dead now, but he was a wonderful source of local lore and information about the Shaftsbury burying ground. He said that some of the very early marble, which he deemed superior, came from West Mountain. He told me that the West Mountain marble was easy to get at and was used before any real quarries existed. (?) His wife may still run the little museum in the church next to the burying ground.

Thanks for passing on the information re: Giles Hawkings Tomlinson who "was last seen leaving Marbledale, CT headed into the wilderness of Ohio in 1835..." That's such a neat name; I pulled it up in the IGI and can now supply a happy (?) ending. (Enclosed)

Justus Gardner Moore "J. G. MOORE", CLARENDON SPRINGS, VT

Justus Gardner Moore, b. Clarendon Feb. 24, 1843, d. April 23, 1924 age 84-1-19, married, son of Andrew Moore & -?- Powers. St. Albans, VT VR. He was buried in the Greenwood Cemetery, St. Albans. He m. Harriet Power, 4 children.

On FAG, under his name there is a long obituary from the Rutland Herald. Justus Gardner Moore, a native of Clarendon Springs, died April 15, 1924. He was a corporal in the 12th VT Inf. Co. K. His business was burned out twice in St. Albans fires.... However there is the picture of the family stone in Rutland.

"West Clarendon, Chippenhook - Across the bridge was a small marble works making mostly grave stones. J. G. Moore was proprietor.

"The cemetery in Chippenhook has many of the early stones. The marble that could be easily worked, was by

the same token, not very long lasting as so many badly weathered markers can testify.

"In the cemetery where Col. Edmond's grave has been marked are perhaps a dozen other graves marked by the white granulated remains of those early stones. [Clarendon, VT 1761-1976, p. 91]

A large quarry hole exists near Clarendon Cave on the west side of West Tinmouth Road, a quarter way up Suzie Pitcher's Peak. Opened before 1869 and operated into the 1880's. Large marble blocks were moved by ox teams to finishing mills in West Rutland. The quarry owned and operated by Wm. F. Barnes. [ibid. p. 104]

The family stone in Evergreen Cemetery, Rutland, for 12 members of the family, included a number of names lacking death dates including Justus G Moore. It is most likely J.G. Moore prepared this stone.

HEWITT, Mahala, d. Sept. 27, 1868 age 71 y., signed "J. 6. Moore, Clarendon Springs" In 1981 this stone was down and broken with the signature showing. By 1995 it had been reset with the inscription missing & signature missing. [Pittsford, Congregational Cemetery, Pittsford.]

1850 Clarendon, VT census: Andrew Moore, 38, Ireland, carpenter; Marcia, 33, VT; Justus, 10 VT & other children. [M432-927-415A]

1860: Justus was not located

1870 Clarendon, census: Justus G. Moore, 30 VT, stone cutter, \$2500 real estate; Hattie A., 19 KH; Hunt, John P., 22 VT stone cutter; Lampman, Henry, 19 VT stone cutter; Perry, Jerius, 20 VT, stone cutter. [M593-1024-394B]







Sheldon, Morgan and Slason Quarries

"The partnership of Sheldon (Lorenzo) and Morgan (David, Jr.) opened their first quarry in the swamp in 1844. That year Moses Perkins, administrator of Asa Hale's estate, sold thirteen acres on the west side of the cedar swamp to Morgan. During the summer of 1848 David Morgan, Jr., and company were selling monuments, tomb tables and headstones from their quarry in West Rutland through their agent James Everson.

"In the spring of 1850 the company erected an eight-gang steam mill. It burned in April 1851. It was replaced

in 1851 or 1852.

"About that time, the company changed its name to Sheldon (Lorenzo & Charles) Morgan (David Jr. and Slason (Charles H.). In 1854 the mill was sawing day and night with about 200 men employed.

"David Morgan retired from the firm in 1857. " [Hance, Dawn D., *The History of Rutland Vermont, 1761-1861*, pp. 535-36]

Leave the Slate Valley Museum, return to Main Street and turn right (east), drive 2 miles on Route 149 to the yellow blinker light, turn left onto Route 30 north. In about 2 miles the **Wells Cemetery** will be on your left. Continue on Route 30 north to **Poultney**. The entrance to the **Poultney Town Cemetery** is ½ mile beyond the stop light on the right.

From the stop light in Poultney, drive north on Route 30 about 3.3 miles. Look for the trail where the trains formerly crossed the road. Take a sharp left onto Saltis Road.

North Poultney, Hosford Crossing Cemetery; 1784+. Most of the stones in the front row were carved by Enos Clark of Middletown Springs. Included is the stone for William Buckland, 1795, who carved stones in CT.

Continue north through Castleton Corners, traffic light, to Route 4 east to West Rutland Exit 6; east on Business 4 to first left, Pleasant Street.



MAIN STREET by Morris Rote-Rosen. Thirty five years ago we interview Harriet (Mrs. W. B.) Woodard for out column, She was then in her 98th year – a grand old lady.... "Those were the happy days," said Mrs. Woodward, "then we came to Granville about 1867, and we purchased the Washington Hotel." The hotel stood on the site of the present Henry D. S. Allen block on Main Street. Woodard sold the Washington Hotel to Sid Skinner who conducted it until April 15, 1873, when the hotel burned and the fire destroyed a valuable harness racer "Waltzing Dan." Mr. & Mrs. Woodard purchased a small building known as the "marble shop" on the site of the present Ritz Theatre.."

The "marble shop" was taken down to clear land for the construction of the "Mettowee House" by Woodard. Mrs. Woodard recalled the time when they purchased the "marble shop" building and in it lived an old Indian squaw and she was so large she was removed from the house onto a lumber wagon to take her to her new home. The new hotel of the Woodard's was known as the Mettowee Valley House and it was erected in 1873, sold later to William T. Munson and destroyed by fire early Wednesday morning February 7, 1894. [The Granville Sentinel, Thurs. Sept. 30, 1971]







We met John and Kathleen (Roberts) Rowan and their lovely young daughter Ann on our Main Street. Ka'hleen said how she enjoys reading "Main Street" and then inquired if we could write something about the Mettowee House. We Informed her that thirty-five years ago we interviewed her great-grandmother, Harriett (Mrs. W. B.) Woodard for our column. She was then in her Sath year - a grand old lady and as lively and as joily as a teen-ager. Well, Kathleen, let es in phantasy call on your great-grandmaker, Harriett Towlard.

"I was born in Saratoga on May 5, 1839, When Martin Van Buren was President of the United States," she said, and "I have lived through the administrations of twenty-four presidents. I hope to observe my 96th birthday anniversary on May 5, next year (1937)," Since we came to interview her we asked her how she felt as she was nearing her century mark in life. "Isn't it awful," she said with a twinkle in her eye, "I ought to feel ashamed of myself for being that old. But, I have had a lovely time, a good husband and fine children," she said.

We observed her during our interview as she leaned back in a comfortable chair. She was dressed like a young lady getting ready to go to a party. Allired in a patterned silk dress, her white hair neatly combed, she looked extraordinarily spry for her age. Her eyes were full of sparkle, her color as clear as a school girl's complexion and the wrinkles on her face imprinted by the advancing years, gave her lines expressive of humor and good nature.

"I know your father," she said "and we have been friends for many years." Then leaning forward in her chair she winked her eye and in a lower tone said: "But, you needn't tell your mother about it." Then she relaxed in her chair and laughed heartlly. "My father and mother," said Mrs. Woodard lived in Saratoga when I was born. My father's name was Louis Clayton and my mother was a Richardson ... Lucy Richardson. I was four years of age when we moved from Saratoga to Wallingford, Vermont."


She thought for a moment and "I can just remember when we moved. Father was the restless kind and we moved from one place to another, to Wallingford and to Windham in Vermont. I was married in Peru, Vermont, in the old hotel there on July 4, 1857, when I was eighteen years of age and we came to live with my husband's parents in the town of Hebron, what is now (1936) Nelson's, on the State Road. That's where we went housekeeping with Mr. Woodard's parents who conducted a hotel? there."

"Those were the happy days," said Mrs. Woodard, "then we came to Granville about 1867, and we purchased the Washington Hotel." The hotel stood on the site of the present Henry D. Allen block on Main Street. Woodard sold the Washington Hotel to Sid Skinner who con-

ducted it until April 15, 1873, when the hotel burned and the fire destroyed a valuable harness racer "Waltzing Dan." Mr. and Mrs. Woodard purchased a small building known as the "marble shop" on the site of the present Ritz Theatre.

THE METTOWEE VALLEY HOUSE, after the fire, February 7, 1894. It was built in 1873 by William B. Woodard and he sold it to William T. Munson in 1891. Mr. Munson built the Munson House cn its site and it was destroyed by fire January 2, 1910. The Ritz Theater now (1971) stands on its site.

The murble shop! was taken down to clear the land for the construction of the "Mettowee House" by Woodard. Woodard recalled the time when they purchased the "marble shop" building and in it lived an old Indian squaw and she was so large she was removed from the house onto a lumber wagon to take her to her new home. The new hotel of the Woodards was known as the Mettowee Valley House and it was erected in 1873, sold later to William T. Munson and destroved by fire early Wednesday morning, February 7, 1894.

When the hotel burned, Grant Sweet, who had only recently been married, was living with his bride there and they were forced to leave the building in a hurry. Another tenant, John sustained serious Evans, sustained serious injury to his spine and legs. when he was forced to jump from the upper floor of the hotel. The servants employed in the hotel, then owned by Win. T. Munson, had a narrow escape leaving all their clothing and belongings behind them.

Will E. Roberts, who in later years was a partner in the McHenry and Roberts firm, was who had a narrow another He was aroused at escape. one o'clock in the morning and found himself almost trapped in the fire. He threw his bed sheet out of the window and slid When he reached to safety. the ground he remembered leaving his valuable watch ir his room. He climbed back into his room through the window, grabbed his watch, and again had to slide down the bed sheet as the fire enveloped the building.

Mrs. Woodard spoke about the ctivities in the Mellowee Valley House When it was under her and her husband's management. "We held parties in the hotel for the benefit of Trinity Episcopal Church of which I was a member." she said, "tickets sold for five cents and they had good things to eat for that price, usually we served pie, also cheese and coffee, and all for five cents and now and then we would change the bill of fare to coffee and doughnuts." With election time approaching, we asked Mrs. Woodard who she was voting for.

"Vole?" asked Mrs. Wood-"My husband made me promise that I would never vote. When the women were given the vote my husband came home disgusted and said: "Hell will be to pay now. The women .can. votel" I carried out his wish, with one exception; when Ella (Mrs. Wyman) practically forced me to come out to vote for Hoover and I That was my first and last vote. As for the present election, I would not know who to vote for. My husband was a Democrat."

During our visit with Mrs. Woodard, she mentioned the coming of the Hallowe'en party which was to be given for the benefit of the Granville children. She said that she was out to see the party and the parade in 1935 and enjoyed seeing the happy, youngsters having the time of their young lives. As we started to leave, Mrs. Arch Woodard (her daughter-in-law) said that grandma takes care of her own room, makes the bed and dusts the furniture and keeps herself immaculately tidy. When we got up to reach for the door, we said to Mrs. Woodard: "Save us a piece of your 100th birthday anniversary cake." But that was not to be. Mrs. Woodard passed away July 16, 1937, in her 98th year. Her husband died in 1910.


