Girl's Volleyball



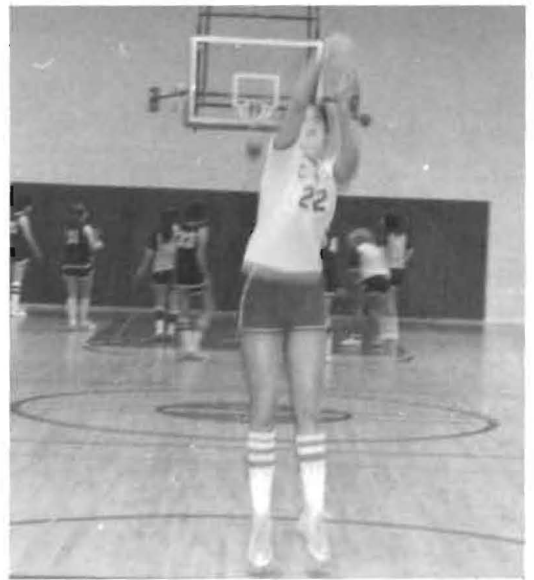

Orientation



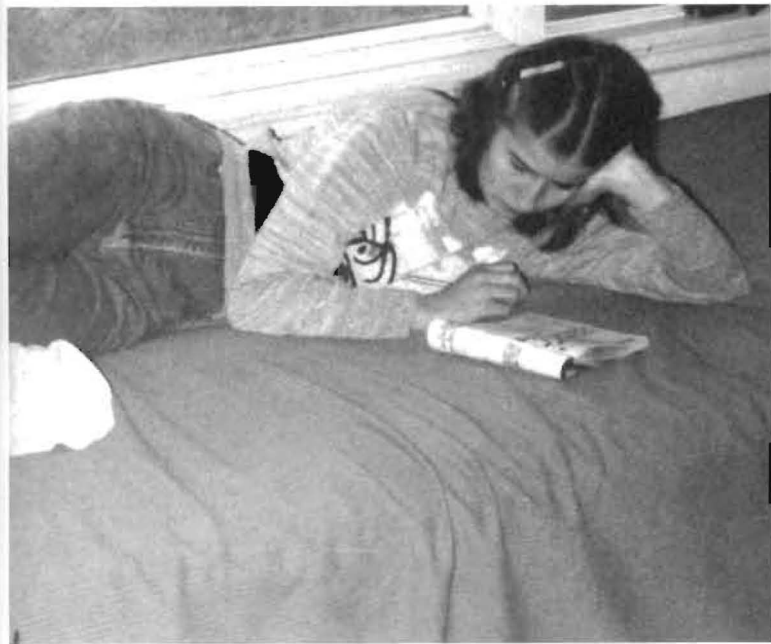

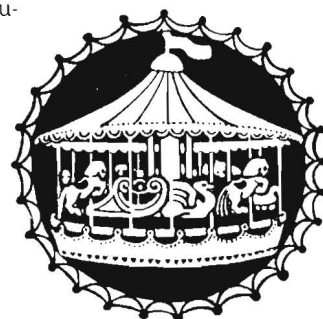
