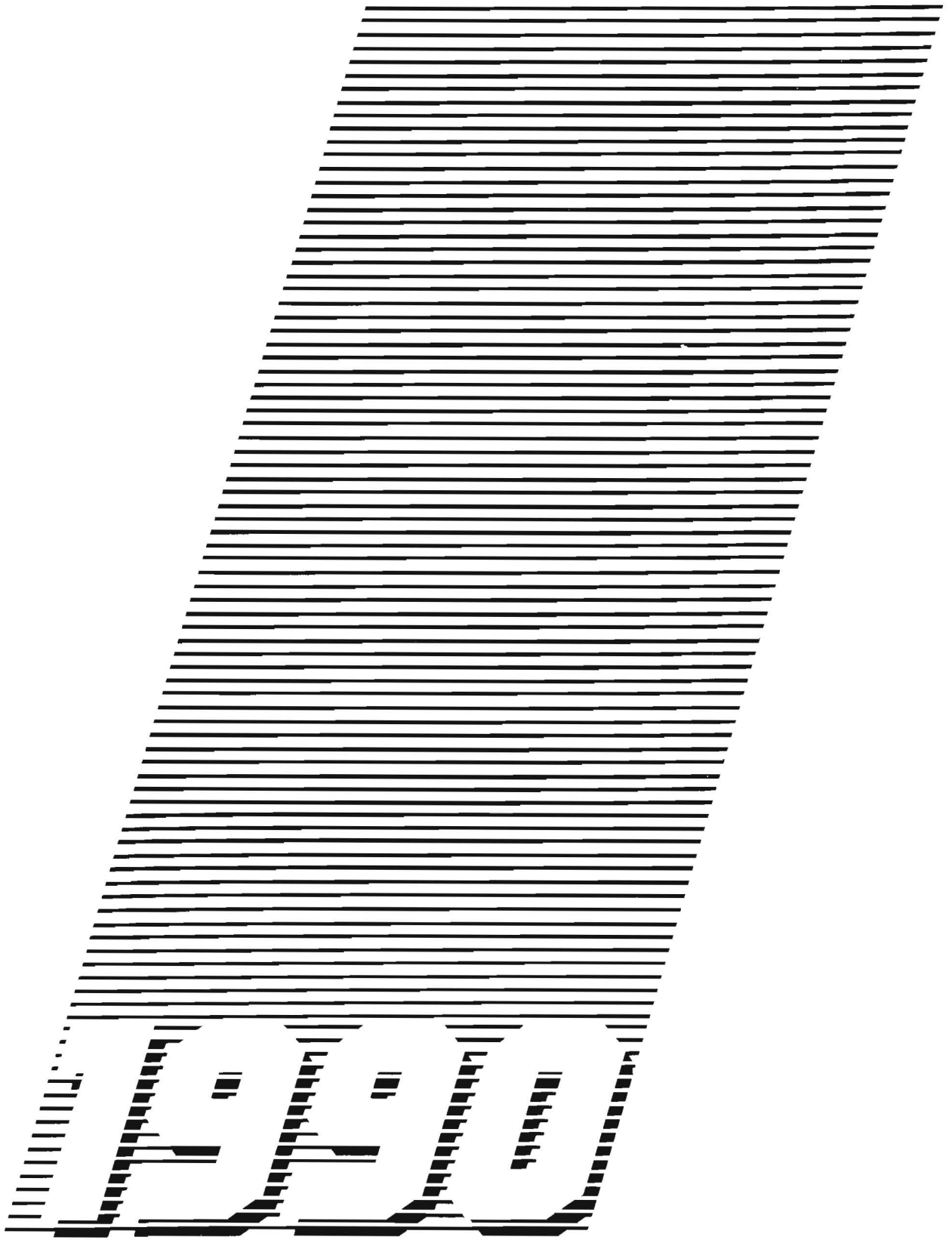

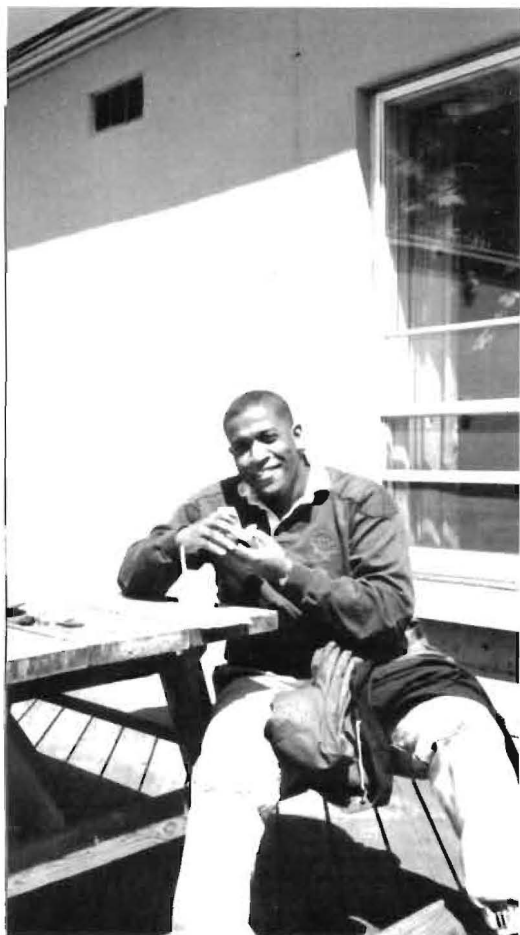

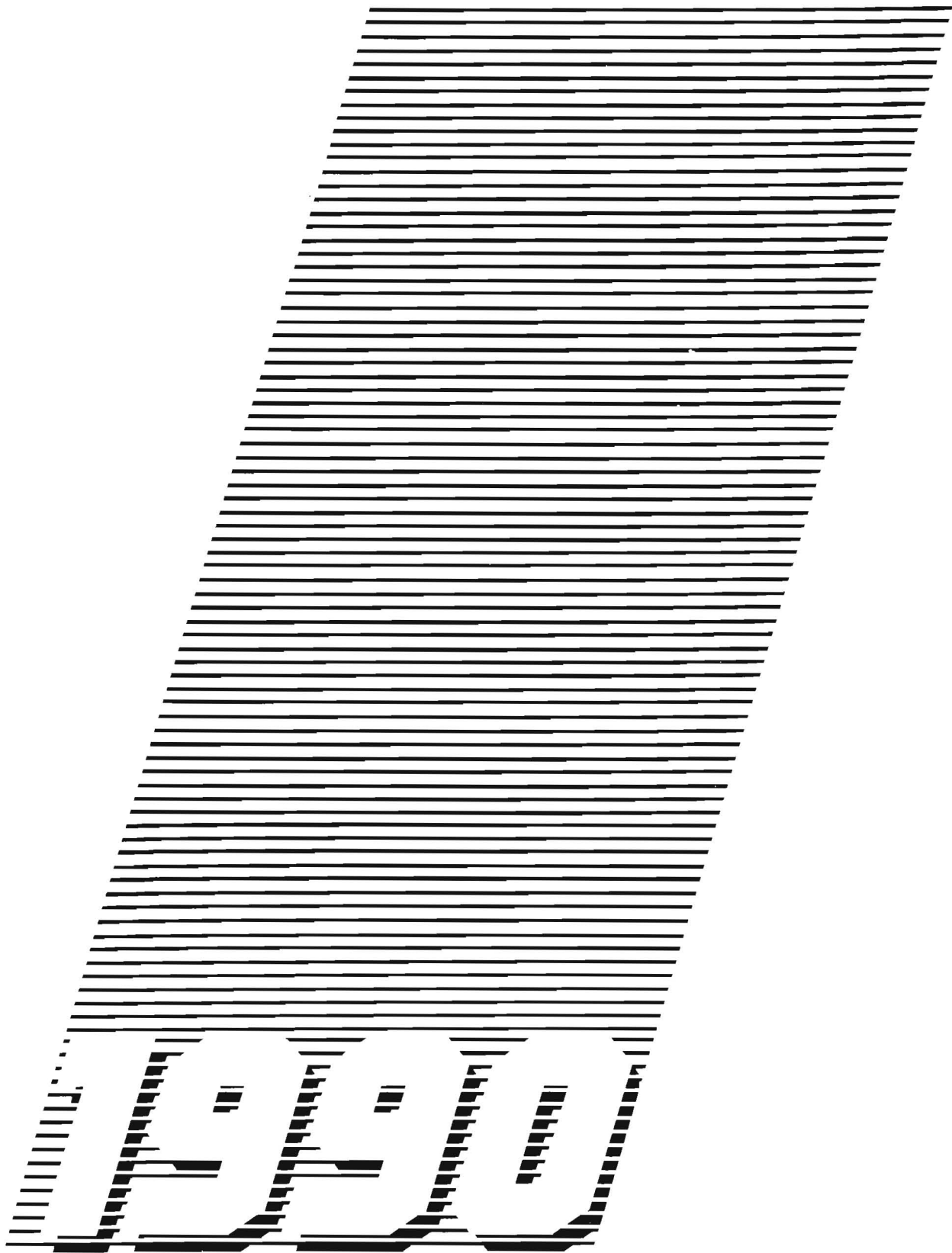

Ray Boyd nearly matched their total throwing in 42 as our Saints beat their Eagles 110-91.



Second semester looked to be much brighter as UCONN transfer Howard Goodrow and returning junior Joq Quintal were activated and proved to be just what the "Iron Six" needed as they looked to make the NAIA District V playoffs for the second time in as many years. In his first game donning the blue and white, Goodrow threw in fifteen points and pulled down 8 rebounds against a ferocious Potsdam State squad—unfortunately all for naught as the SAINTS were crunched 114-63.

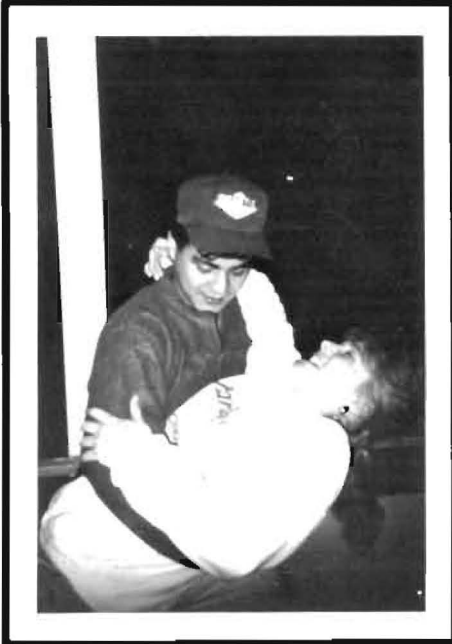

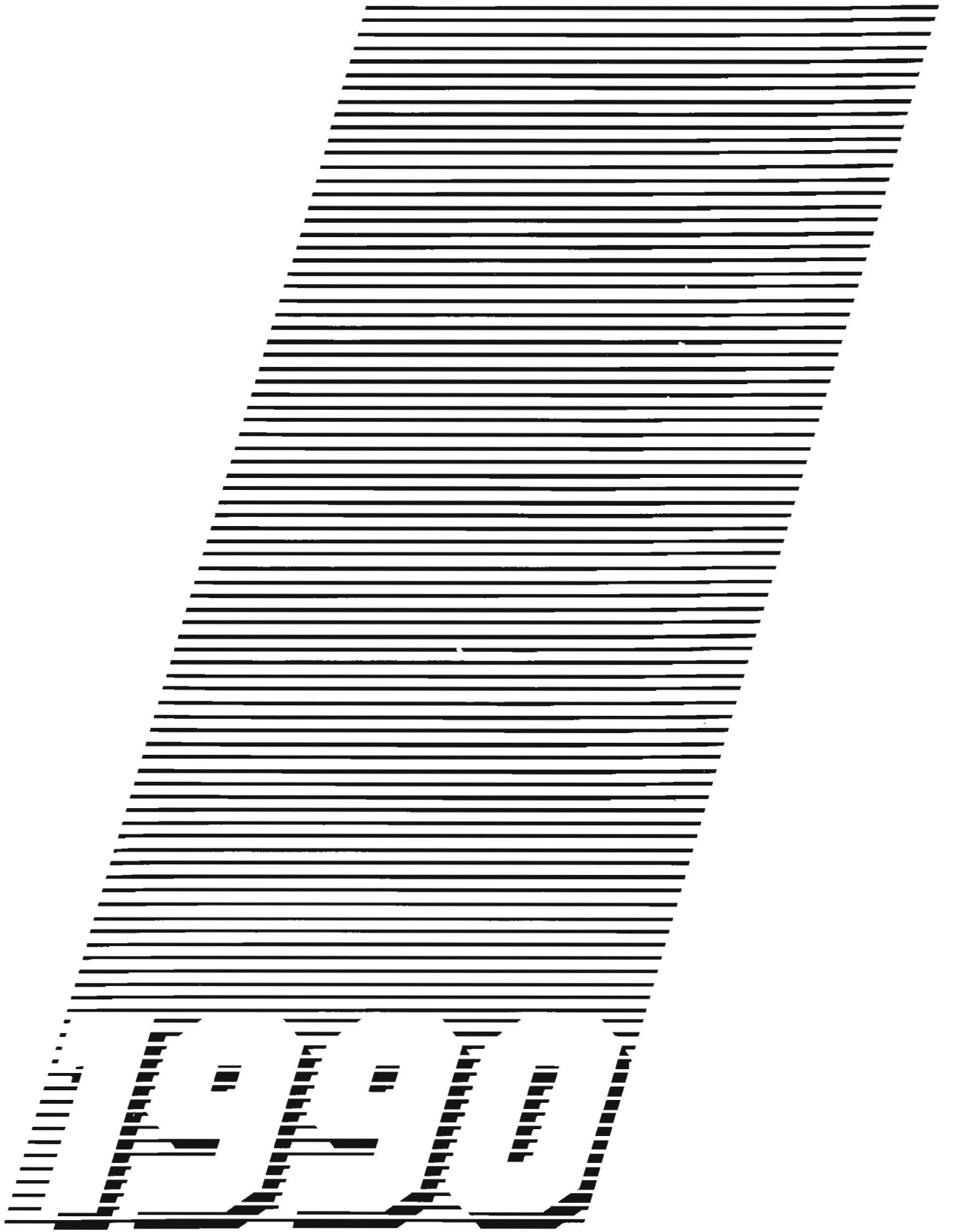

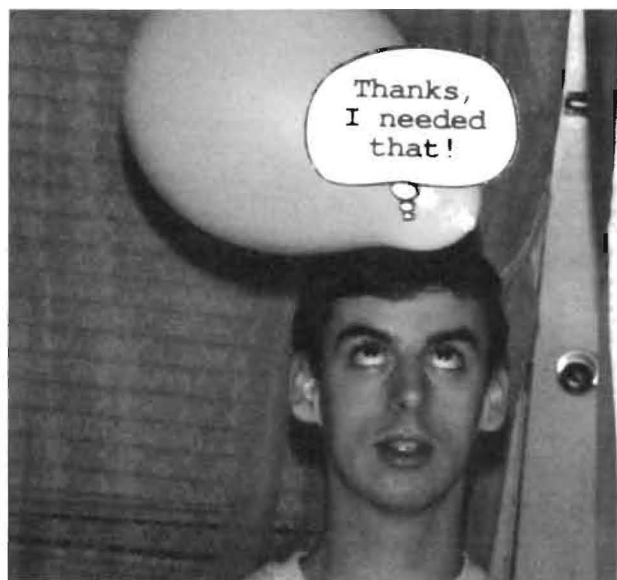

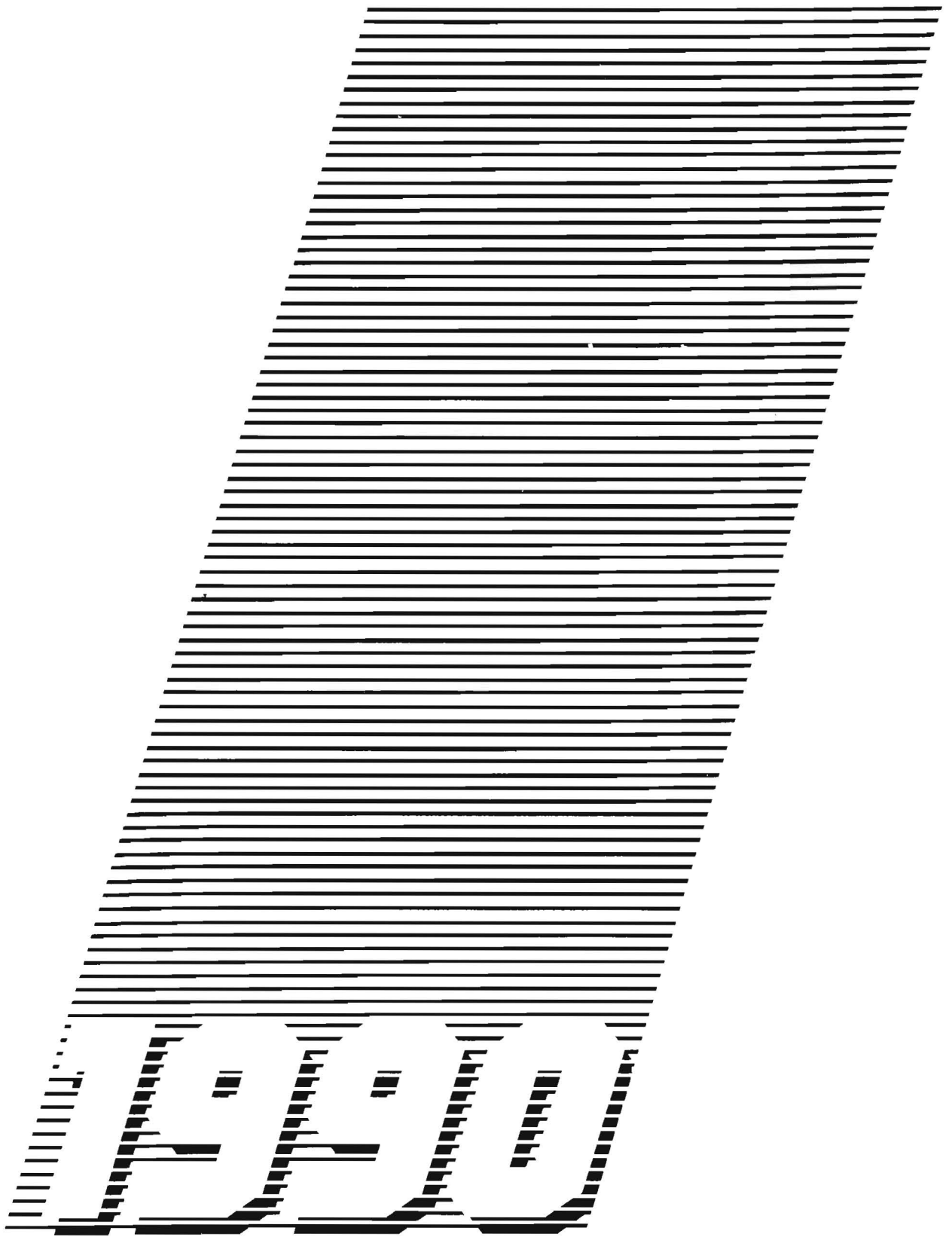

In Search Of The Perfect Powder: The C.S.J. Ski Club

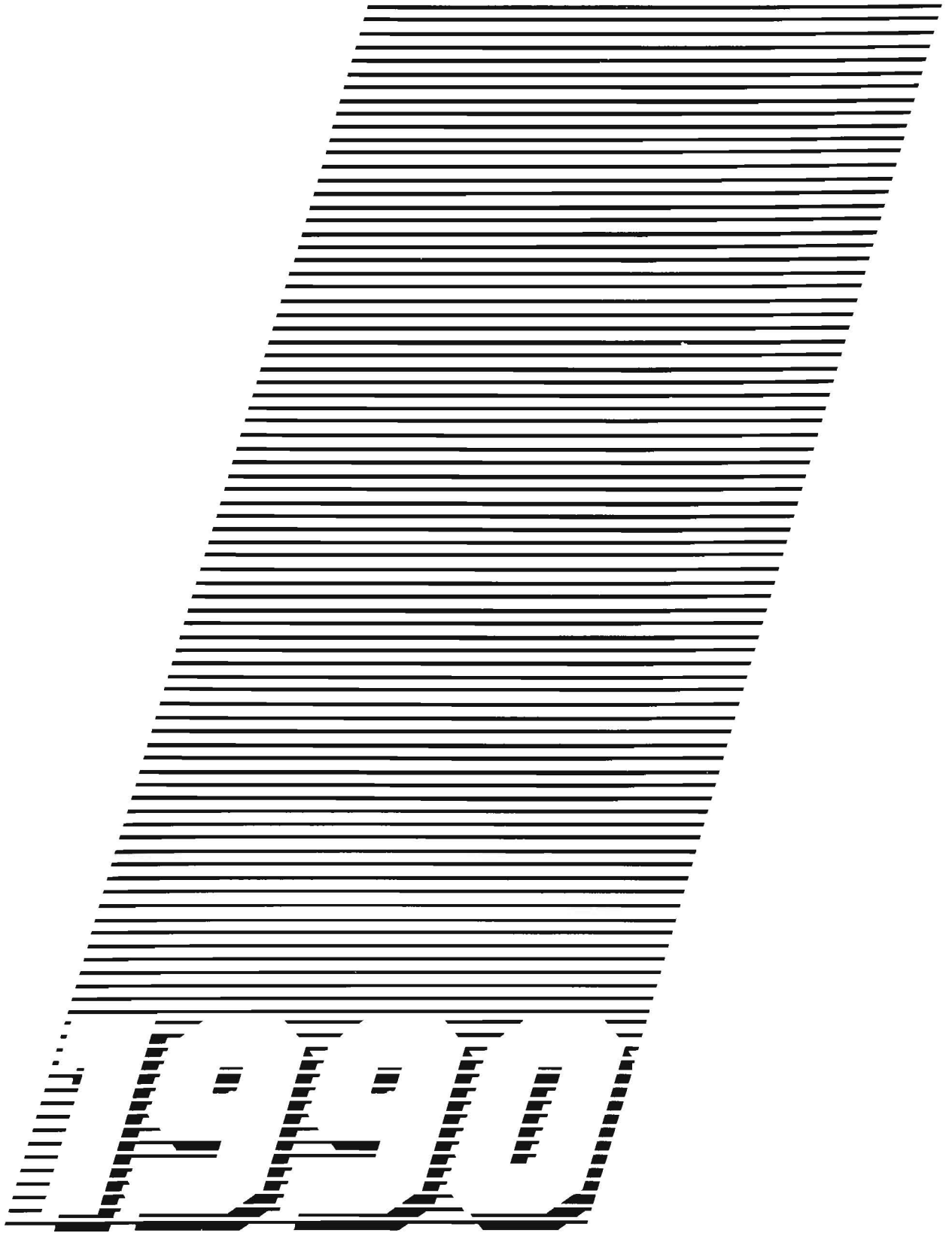
